

Bunny Supply List for Beginners

- **Enclosure/Play Pen:** Recommended height at least 24 inches tall, 4ft x 4ft minimum area. If using a hutch, use a playpen attachment to allow for more space. Hutches and cages are too small.

- **Litter Box:** with or without grates, litter pellets, and hay needed. It should be placed in one corner where all food, water, and hay will be placed. Bunnies eat and drink at the same time as they pee/poop. Keeping everything in one area keeps accidents from happening.



- **Food and water bowls:** Recommend bowls vs water bottles. Bottles are harder to clean and constantly leak. Free feeding pellets is okay while a baby is growing. Measure pellets as they reach maturity. Make sure bowls are heavy and not easy to tip over! If you have fences, you can use bowls that can be attached to the walls.

- **Hay Feeders:** Hay should be supplied 24/7 and can be placed in/on the litterbox itself or hanging in front. Hay is 80% of your bunny's diet so you should be keeping it full at all times.

- **Food Brands we recommend:** We feed our bunnies Tractor Supply Producers Pride, which is a Timothy-based pellet. We DO NOT recommend Alfalfa Hay or Pellets due to their high fat and calcium contents and low fiber content. Alfalfa is addictive and can lead to obesity, urinary stones, and soft stools. Timothy, Orchard, and Oat are all great hay types. Most common hay cuts are 2nd cut. Brands we like are:

- **Bedding:** Bunnies do not need bedding like shavings or paper in their enclosure. This will actually confuse them into thinking that bedding is a litter area. If you need to place something down on the floor, we recommend washable floor mats/blankets/rugs to give your bunny traction. Do NOT use Cedar Shaving, it is Toxic.

- **Beds and Hides:** Bunnies are prey animals and need areas to feel safe from “danger”. Houses, hides, and tunnels are a great way to do this. Beds can also be used **ONLY** when the bunny is fully litter-trained. Introducing a bed too early will make the bunny think the bed is a litter area.


