Messy Story of the Week

The Martinez family was hosting Thanksgiving when tensions boiled over. Two adult brothers — Alex and Ben — had been quietly competing for years. Alex thought Ben was their mom's favorite. Ben thought Alex had been handed too many opportunities.

By the time dessert was served, a pointed comment about “pulling your own weight” turned into a shouting match that had the entire extended family shifting uncomfortably in their seats. The night ended with Ben storming out and Alex muttering, “Good riddance.” The ripple effects? Hurt parents, divided cousins, and holiday plans permanently altered.

Faithful God, Then and Now

Joseph's brothers in Genesis 37 knew all about rivalry. Their father Jacob openly favored Joseph, giving him the famous “coat of many colors.” Resentment grew until it boiled over. In a moment of rage, they plotted to kill him, but sold him into slavery instead.

God's plans for Joseph — to save many lives during a famine — were never derailed. But the road there was paved with jealousy, deceit, and years of family estrangement. The story reminds us: God redeems what's broken, but unchecked bitterness can fracture generations before redemption ever comes.

What We Can Learn

- **Favoritism fuels jealousy** — whether real or perceived (Genesis 37:3-4).
- **Resentment escalates quietly** until a crisis forces it into the open (Hebrews 12:15).
- **God can redeem the worst betrayal** — but His best way is reconciliation before things get that far (Matthew 5:23-24).

Behind the Curtain

In coaching, I've seen sibling rivalry show up in adult children just as intensely as in grade school. The stakes may shift from toys to inheritances, but the heart issues stay the same. Healing begins when parents take responsibility for their part in fueling competition — and when siblings choose honest conversations over silent scorekeeping.

Faith Step for the Week

 *Read together:*

“See to it that no one falls short of the grace of God and that no bitter root grows up to cause trouble and defile many.” — Hebrews 12:15 (NIV)

 *Pray together:*

“Lord, shine Your light on any hidden jealousy or resentment in our hearts. Help us uproot bitterness before it grows, and give us courage to speak truth in love. Teach us to choose reconciliation over rivalry, so our family reflects the grace and forgiveness You've shown us in Christ.”
