

I received assistance with the Blue Envelope Program, which allows individuals with disabilities to display important information for first responders in emergency situations. This program provides a visible sticker for your door or vehicle to indicate the presence of a disability, helping emergency personnel identify specific needs such as interpreters, medical conditions, or medications. The program is free and has been expanding across Ohio, with other states also considering adoption.

It is recommended that SSPs and DSPs have a Blue Envelope in their vehicles for safety purposes, ensuring that first responders have access to vital information to provide appropriate assistance.


Columbus Zoo for the DeafBlind, Deaf, H.H. and Hearing Blind

On September 27, 2025, the Columbus Zoo hosted a special all-day event dedicated to individuals who are Blind, Hard of Hearing (HH), and DeafBlind. The event was attended by over 25 DeafBlind participants, more than 30 CN participants, over 10 individuals who are Blind, and over 10 Deaf/HH individuals. The unique friendship between Barbara Walters and Dr. Robert J. Smithdas represents what is possible when people choose to reach across perceived boundaries with patience, respect, and curiosity. It is a reminder that the most meaningful connections are often forged not in spite of our differences, but because we take the time to understand and celebrate them.

You are cordially invited to celebrate the unveiling of a newly imagined space where touch opens new worlds of experience and connection.

"Over the years people have sometimes asked me who was the most memorable person I have ever interviewed," Barbara Walters reflected towards the end of her career. "They expected it to be a president or a king, maybe a movie star, but it isn't any of those." That person was Dr. Robert J. Smithdas, whom she famously called "the most memorable interview of my career." Their connection blossomed into a remarkable friendship that would span decades.

Dr. Robert J. Smithdas (1925-2014) forever changed the landscape for individuals who are DeafBlind. His work demonstrated that with proper training, DeafBlind individuals can support themselves and fully participate as members of society. As the second DeafBlind person to graduate from college (following Helen Keller by 50 years), he earned his bachelor's degree from St. John's University in 1950, then went on to earn his master's degree from New York University in 1953. He later became a teacher, poet, and passionate advocate who co-founded the Helen Keller National Center.

Honoring Their Legacy

In honor of Barbara Walters and Dr. Robert J. Smithdas, a dedicated space has been designed and is scheduled for completion in October 2025 at the Helen Keller National Center. This newly reimagined atrium was made possible through a generous gift from the Estate of Barbara Walters.

This renovation represents a significant transformation for our campus facility since our original buildings were constructed in 1976. The atrium has been thoughtfully designed with functionality and accessibility as the primary focus, incorporating input from individuals who are DeafBlind to create a tactile, aesthetic, and accessible space for participants visiting or living on campus.

Please join us as we honor Barbara Walters and Dr. Robert J. Smithdas and unveil this space that will welcome future generations of DeafBlind individuals to the Helen Keller National Center.
