Instead, the administration claimed procedural difficulty, choosing to maintain the highest possible level of pain to force the Democrats to concede on the political negotiation.

The Father That Does not Feed

The word “Congress” derives from the Greek root kongros, which mean “father.” A father provides. A father protects. A father makes sure that his children eat before he does. But in this shutdown, Congress has failed that role. The president has failed that role. In other words, The U.S.

government is supposed to represent the people, and yet its actions defy the most fundamental instinct of leadership, because all they do is talk, posture, and delay. Meanwhile, children go hungry, families lose benefits, and the poor are left to suffer. The rich and powerful continue their lives uninterrupted. No protests. No urgency. No sacrifice. Just silence. Since a government is considered a parent to its nation, America's government would be guilty of neglect.

The Truth Behind the Post

Trump's social media post was not a promise; it was a performance. It was designed to shift blame, to appear compassionate, and to maintain pressure on Congress while avoiding responsibility. But the truth is simple: if Trump truly wanted to fund SNAP, he would have found a
