#### Meet Bre Ramirez ERB Spotted Acres

In 2018 a small piece of heaven was purchased in Northern Utah, with a 5-year vision of being self-sufficient. What started out as a 1941 house and some empty acres, quickly developed into a homestead raising black angus beef, Nigerian and Nubian milk goats, Yorkshire swine, and a fun variety of Ameraucana or Welsummer chickens. With a strong passion for all critters, owner Bre Ramirez has an extra special place in her heart for the Appaloosa horse.

Today, ERB SPOTTED ACRES is home to many well known Appaloosa bloodlines, and all are 100% foundation bred. These horses are linked back to several famous appaloosas and the Nez Perce tribe. Bre herself is from Crow heritage and is very proud to be part of the "Walks over Ice" family in Montana, where appaloosas are a big part of everyday life.

When Bre was asked what her biggest accomplishment to date was, she replied, "I have been blessed in so many ways. There are so many good people out there that have been breeding these exceptional rare beauties (ERB) for 30 years, and I have been blessed to purchase some. A few months ago, my family took a road trip to visit Charles Potts in Walla Walla. Washington where he showed us his beautiful Blue Creek Appaloosa herd. Every horse was in exceptional condition, very friendly, and just happy. That weekend we purchased two mares and a stallion. I am very proud to own these three beauties and I still cannot believe they are in my barn."

ERB SPOTTED ACRES is one of the few breeders in Utah that produces 100% foundation bloodlines, including the Indian shuffle gaited genes. Below are a few examples of those lucky horses that call Bre's farm their home.




SUMRALL GUN SMOKE (F5/GAP 5/100% FPD, Stallion)

Bre was asked what her goal is with breeding and what would be one recommendation when purchasing an Appaloosa. Bre replied, "It's really easy to be captivated by the unique leopard spots, snowcaps, or blankets, but I am more so interested in bloodlines, conformation, and overall kindness. I have come across some stunning, well-bred horses, but their personality was sour and their eye was not kind, so I quickly passed. I have no interest in breeding any animal that hasn't proven its ability to be well-rounded. Prior to bringing home any new addition, make sure they are 6-panel clean and vaccinated. personally am shocked that some registries allow members to register equines that are not 6-panel negative. It's irresponsible and in my opinion, these registries are just interested in the financial aspect and not the quality of these animals. It's just sad to see positive horses bred, and these horses also have a 50% chance of their foals being positive. New, or uneducated, or experienced buyers all need to have any equines tested prior to purchase".





#### Registering/Testing/Ownership By Cynthia Evans

Why is registering, testing, and transferring ownership of your horses so important? I can tell you from my own experience how important these activities are.

We purchased our first horse, a grade Appaloosa, from a Falon Taylor online auction. We were just looking for a good riding horse and we had not had horses since we were kids. He's a great horse but since this was an online auction we know very little about his history. Several years later we purchased another grade Appaloosa from a rescue in California. This horse was a gift to our granddaughter, and he has turned out to be a great horse for kids. It did not take long for us to fall in love with this breed!

I reached out to the sellers of both horse's multiple times without success. I still have no information on their pedigree, registrations, show records, breeding etc... For Zeke, we have photos of him and his dam. I know he was foaled in California in 2010 and that's it. I have no further information on him. I had Zeke tested and reached out to the ApHC but I was unable to find his dam and sire. I've posted these pictures in multiple Facebook groups hoping someone might recognize his dam. I've searched the ApHC and All Breed Pedigree on the chance that perhaps he was registered with his name. I would give anything to know more about him. I would especially be interested in his pedigree as I would happily purchase another Appaloosa from this pedigree.

My experience has made me very passionate about making sure all my horses are registered and tested.

I think everyone knows how important testing is. Some of these diseases are fatal. I know there are people who purchase horses without being aware these diseases exist. I would hate for someone to unknowingly purchase a horse with one of these diseases. If we want to continue progressing this breed forward, then we must all test our horses and not pass these along to future generations.

Registering, testing and transferring ownership takes some hard work, but it's worth it in the end. However, once we've got them registered and tested we need a good strategy for storing these records.

Recently, I read about a woman who had a house fire and lost all her transfer reports and registration documents for her horses. Not all her horses had been transferred into her name. She was able to reach out to all but 2 of the people she purchased her horses from.

This post made me really stop and think about the need for having a digital backup of my registration certificates and any other important documents. I, too, have been known to procrastinate a bit on getting my horses transferred into my name. Think of a horse's registration certificate like the title to your truck; how important it is to immediately transfer the title, and all the hoops a person has to jump through if that title is lost, especially if it wasn't transferred. Many times previous owners can't be found to help fix anything with a replacement transfer and signatures. If a registration certificate is lost or destroyed, an Affidavit for Reissue of a Registration Certificate has to be filled out, signed by the owner of record, and notarized. If you never transferred the horse into your name, this means tracking down the person who sold you the horse; the owner of record. You do not want to get yourself into this position by not having transferred the horse. YOU need to be the owner of record on every horse you own. More often than not, a registry cannot help you in this situation.

I use a software program to store information about all of my horses. It stores everything about my horses including where they are registered, testing results, Coggins tests, vacations, farrier records, etc. After reading that post, I've scanned all my testing results, registration certificates, etc. into this program. The data is stored in "the cloud" and I'm able to access it from my iphone, ipad and computer at any time.

You don't have to have a software program to store this information. There are several ways to scan and store this information digitally. For example, computer backups, thumb drives, M-Disks (touted to last up to 1,000 years), or external hard drives. If storing data on physical devices like a thumb drive, you should regularly check and make sure that the physical device has not become corrupted. If storing it on a physical device, make sure you store it somewhere outside your home or in a fireproof box. Use a safety deposit box, fireproof box at home, or even send a copy to a friend or family member. The safest by far is to store at least one of these backups off site.

In most cases you can request reprints from registries and testing facilities but it's going to take time and money to do so.
