Meet Marlene Salvatora

I grew up as a horse crazy girl, and living next to a horse trader who bought and sold horses on a regular basis that I got to ride was almost as good as owning my own. After watching the movie *Run Appaloosa Run*, I knew that was the type of horse I wanted. At the age of 13, my father finally realized it was time and bought me my first horse. Yes, a two-year old Appaloosa colt named Cherokee Handprint Chief (*ApHC #216124*); it was love at first sight. He was a dark bay with a white blanket and spots. He was a stallion until the age of 13, when I started competitive trail riding and having to camp overnight with him made me a bit nervous. We spent many years together, until the age of 25 when he passed. He was my heart horse that did whatever I had the notion to do, from the show-ring to competitive trail riding. I've had a few more Appaloosa's in my life, but for the last good many years I've have my 23-year old grade Arab gelding that I use to trail ride and camp with my endurance friends on their training rides. When his pasture buddy, my daughters retired horse, passed this last July at the age of 30, I needed to get him a pasture mate to keep him company, and of course I knew it had to be an Appaloosa.

Now, it's not that I haven't kept my eye out for my next spotted partner. It was that I had a horse to ride and didn't really need another. You see, I boarded horses for a good portion of my life, and having two was easy.

Being on the up side of 60, I knew what was on my list for a next horse; one that had been trail ridden and was safe. You know, one of those been-there done-that type of horse that would take care of me. A horse that had experience with camping; one that liked to move out enough to keep up with my endurance friends, but not pull my arms out of their sockets. Easy going, not buddy-sour, with no bad habits and I also preferred a gelding.

So the search took me back to where I purchased my last Appaloosa; a breeding farm not far from me. Hydaways PJ Sunchic was a great little mare that I bought as a four-year old; an easy going, steady Eddie type that did not care what the other horses were

doing. You could let her set for weeks, jump on, and she was the same horse. She placed first and was Best Condition in the one 25-mile endurance ride we did.

Well, it seemed Mr. Baker was low on inventory to sell, but I needed a spotted fix, so my daughter and I went to look anyway. When we arrived, he was busy bringing in horses for feeding, so I looked around and there standing in a round-pen was a dark bay with a blanket and spots, having conformation similar to my first horse. I had to take a closer look. He explained that this was a mare, was four-years old, and in for training but was for sale. UGH, not at all what I was looking for, but there was that something about her. We walked around the farm to look at the foals that were born that year, and also some yearlings he had for sale. I was in spotted heaven. He did have a couple of five-year olds, but they just didn't tug at my heart like the mare.

After watching her ridden for the second time, being told she was great on trails, watching her being ridden into a flock of noisy, wing-flapping geese, up and down some embankments into a creek, over some downfall, then up the other side of the hill to round up a flock of sheep, the next trip down MSF Sunchic Fandango (ICAA F4-2773) was in my trailer coming home with me, and I now had an Appaloosa in my pasture again!

The Procrastinator Special

Have you put off transferring the ICAA horse you purchased? Have you looked and saw the fee was higher after putting this off, so put it off even longer? Have you been sitting on multiple transfers, not wanting to pay the fee for someone else's negligence in not transferring that horse to themselves and now you have two transfers; one to the seller and one to you, the buyer?

From July 1st to September 30th, 2021 you can send in your late and/or multiple transfer(s) for the same low fee of \$10 (member rate), regardless of how old the transfer is and/or how many there are for each horse.

We're feeling generous! To give those with current transfers a break, we'll transfer your horse for only \$5!

NOTE: If you have old transfers, please be sure to mail the certificate and transfer to the new ICAA address at PO Box 427, Whiteface, TX 79379!

Summer Sizzler Special

From July 1st to September 30th, 2021 we've cut the registration fee in half! This is a special price that normally requires registering a herd. For most horses, this will only be \$10 (member rate).

As per the rules, all horses must have a negative 5/6-Panel test (from any reputable lab), and stallions/mares must have their DNA Profile on file with AGI (using our form if not already on file).

Our next virtual show will be a combined halter and performance show, with videos being due August 29, 2021. Be watching the ICAA website and Facebook page for more information on this upcoming show.

A few things learned by the participants:

- Horses need to stand calmly and correctly, as they would for any in-person halter show.
- Horses need to trot willingly from point A to point B, with the camera placed so the judge can see the movement of the horse and with the handler not blocking the view.
- Horses should be calm and easy to handle, showing their training to lead, trot, and stand quietly willingly.
- The videographer should keep the whole horse in the video without cutting off body parts when walking around the horse. Remember, the camera is the judge's eyes.
- Be sure you are videoing in landscape, not portrait, and that your settings are such that the videos are clear.

A few things learned by those putting on the show:

- Be a little clearer with some of the rules, as some of the participants have never done this before, and while it seemed clear to us, it was not always for the entrants.
- Be a bit more clear on what a Get of Sire/Get of Dam class is and how to make the videos for those.


Good news! "Friendship Spotted" is published and available on Amazon and Barnes and Noble. The links to it are below.
