

For the Love of Horses

I am often asked if I've always been into horses. For me, the answer is an easy yes. I was horse crazy from the time I was born. That little spirit that connects you to the most beautiful of all creatures has always been there. I did not grow up with or around horses; my "stable" was always being filled with the imaginary horses I picked out from movies and television. However, I always knew it would be an Appaloosa I would one day own from a dream I had as a child, of a black blanketed horse standing by a tree in my back yard.

Just like every little girl who wants a horse of their own, I begged my father incessantly. One day an opportunity arose where I could lease a horse for the summer from an agricultural high school that I would later attend. My father had thought once I discovered the expense and work associated with horses, I would give up my desire to own one. When you love something, it does not feel like work and the effort only deepens the connection. Thus began my resolve to purchase my own horse. I worked and saved until I found my first horse, or should I say, he found me.

I was 14 and had gone with a mentor to look at some horses. The horses were standing in cow stanchions of a converted dairy barn. There was a little spotted gelding who stared at me so I inquired about him. It was January and extremely cold, it had turned the muddy ground into frozen cups that was difficult to walk on. My mentor had thought it best not to purchase him as the ground made it difficult to accurately assess his movement. My search continued and come March, I found myself back at that same barn. When I walked in the gelding looked directly at me as if he was saying, "You came back! Take me home and I will be your best friend forever!" This little black and white gelding reminded me of chocolate chip ice cream and "Chip" became my best friend. He was three years old and lived to be 29 when he developed penile cancer. His

loyalty, heart, stamina, personality, sense of humor and devotion sold me on the breed. He also had Arab blood and the grey gene and eventually lost his color that only materialized when he was wet. He was such an amazing little horse who liked to steal doughnuts and drink Dunkin' Donuts coffee. He stood steadfast when we bumped into a black bear crossing a road while in Maine and would come running when I called his name whether in the pasture or loose. He truly was my best friend. Chip made my dream come true of owning a horse.

Growing up with Chip inspired me to want to raise these very special horses and I had acquired a stallion and mare to begin my dreams. Unfortunately, life throws those speed bumps along the way and I had to give up on those dreams but not before I had been given a gorgeous, black and white filly by my stallion "Sky" and out of "Flicka". Unfortunately, due to a pasture accident where she slid on wet grass and broke her leg in front me. I lost her also.

Shortly after, I had to part with my remaining horses but the embers of that dream banked for now, continued its low burn.

After several years of being "horseless", I could not help myself but to begin to window shop. I thought perhaps a couple of nice mares to trail ride with my husband would be nice and perhaps get a foal later on if I chose. Then one day a gorgeous, loud spotted colt appeared on my newsfeed on Facebook. I stared at him for so long, I had to make his image my screen saver. I believe my husband took pity on me and asked where he was located. To my surprise, he was only an hour away! He said lets go see him and we made the arrangements to visit the farm.

The owners, Tom and Karen Freund of Mount Hope Stables in Columbia, Kentucky, were absolutely wonderful and I felt like we had known each other our whole lives. They made us feel welcomed and as we enjoyed lots of horse talk, a family grew from a newfound friendship. They took us around their farm and introduced us to all their beautiful horses. We walked out to see the foals and meet that little colt who, at once, had me hooked. He peeked out from behind his dam and nodded his head at me.

My husband laughed and said a challenge has been issued. That ember previously banked, now flared to life. Not only did this colt have my heart, but a filly decided my husband was her "person". My husband, SpiritWolf, became enamored with this filly and both foals would later come home with us. As we watched the two grow, the dream I once had was now fully ignited and with SpiritWolf's support, WillowWolf Appaloosas was born. MHS Mintaka of Orion and MHS Wanderlust Gypsy took over where Chip had left off. I know Chip is up there galloping through green pastures, happy to know he was a part of something special and will remain close to my heart always. One thing I learned, was never give up on your dreams, because your dreams never give up on you.

REMOVAL/SUSPENSION OF MEMBERSHIP

Bylaws Article IX – Standards of Representation and Ethics:

"Any trustee, district representative, staff member, employee, or member who misrepresents the purposes or intent of the association, or who engages in criminal, fraudulent, unethical, or suspicious activities, or activities unbecoming a member or subversive to the purposes of this association, or who seeks to use his or her position to receive personal monetary or valuable gain (beyond that authorized by these bylaws or the trustees), or seeks to unfairly profit from his or her position, shall immediately be removed from said position in the association and be suspended from all involvement in the affairs of this association by the Board of Trustees pending further investigation."

Jan Dobson has had her rights to membership with the ICAA revoked. ICAA Membership owned, original ICAA files/records of all of her horses, her son's horses, and those horses she bred that were sold to other members, as well as her family's membership files were stolen while ICAA records were temporarily in her possession. She also sent libelous, defamatory letters against the ICAA to those members who own the horses bred by her and her son.

Scott Dobson has had his membership suspended for two years. Scott had knowledge of the theft of the above named records and failed to inform the ICAA.

SUSPENDED HORSES

All horses owned by other than the Dobson's that were suspended due to the theft of their records have had their suspensions removed due to the return of the stolen records. The Dobson horses owned by them are still under suspension until requested fees are paid on each.

Parliamentarian of ICAA

Lora Tipton has been appointed parliamentarian of the ICAA in addition to previously being appointed the ICAA's bylaws advisor. Lora is very knowledgeable of how meetings should be run properly and will be sitting in on all membership, BOT, and joint BOT/DR meetings.



Homemade Horse Treats

Ingredients:

- 3 cups Oats
- 1/2 cup flour
- 2 large carrots, chopped or grated
- 1/4 cup Molasses or Honey
- 1 cup applesauce
- 1 large apple, diced or chopped
- 1 TBSP Vegetable Oil or Coconut Oil

Instructions:

- 1. Preheat your oven to 350 F.
- 2. Grease a cookie sheet to keep the treats from sticking OR line the cookie sheet with parenthent paper instead of using grease if you prefer.
- 3. Finely chop or grate 2 large carrots into small pieces. A food processor works great for this if you have one.
- 4. Mix the oats and the flour together in a large bowl until they are combined well.
- 5. Now you can stir in the applesauce and molasses. Mix well.
- 6. Roll the treat mixture into small balls (or whatever size you want to give to your horses).
- 7. Place the uncooked treats onto the greased or lined baking pan and bake at 350 F for 15 minutes.
- 8. Let your horses enjoy as an occasional treat!
