ARE YOU CALLED TO THE RELIGIOUS LIFE?

MY CALL TO RELIGIOUS LIFE

My call is hard to put into words--because I feel like the call is still going on. As a child I was always fascinated by the pictures and movies we saw in school about all the work the Missionaries were doing in faraway lands. That inspired me a great deal and I began to feel a strong desire already then that I was being called to do something like that—giving of myself, caring for those in need, helping to make a better world--not knowing how or when or where.

Without my realizing it, the religious Life was being supported in my family life. We often prayed the rosary together in the evenings before bed, especially during May, October, and Lent. (I must say I was not fond of that as a child--I found it very boring and couldn't wait till it was over. I even tried to shorten the decades from 10 Hail Mary's to 7 when it was my turn to lead.) But apparently something was happening even though I was being defiant. I was learning that prayer was important in my life.

I went to St Francis Convent School in Tiffin for my high school education and there I continued to be inspired by the dedication and joy of the Sisters there. After first vows, I began to teach first graders and loved it. Even though I did not understand the necessity of all the rules and regulations of Religious life at that time, the joy and enthusiasm of living the Franciscan charism deepened in me and gave me strength to carry on.

When it became possible to choose Missionary work in Mexico, I put my name on the list. Even in the midst of the struggles with language and the culture shock when I arrived in Chiapas, MX, I loved being with the people and sharing in their joys and sorrows, always being inspired by their courage and deep faith in what seemed to me to be the most extreme poverty and destitution such as I had never seen or experienced before in my secure and protected life. The call deepened as I was challenged to rethink my concept of poverty. In 1996 I spent 5 months in El Salvador with our Companion Community there and again the poor changed me. Inspired by the works and words of Oscar Romero, I shared something of his feeling of helplessness because of deaths and disappearances all around him. Nevertheless, he saw God in the situation and in the faces of all who came to him for help or reassurance in their struggles. I shared something of that feeling of helplessness. It became clearer to me each day I was there that there was nothing I could do to change the desperate situations of destitution, hunger, illiteracy, and homelessness. My call was to walk with them, listen to them, hold their babies, share the gospel with them, and eat bread and beans with them in their humble homes of sticks, tin, or dried mud. Yes, God's poor changed me.

But all through the ups and downs of the passing years, the call remained firm--that I was in love with my God, and my God was in love with me. And by that time I had come to the realization that God was wherever I was-and that serving God's people with love and joy was really what the call was all about. The place and circumstances didn't matter so much. It is much bigger than being a Missionary in a faraway land. The call is ongoing--it is listening all along the way and allowing God to lead me to wherever I am needed. Right now I am walking with my Hispanic brothers and sisters here in Canton, and they teach me so much about life and joy and sorrow and poverty and deep faith...and so the call continues....



ARE YOU CALLED TO THE PERMANENT DIACONATE?

The vocations team has asked me to write about how I received my call the permanent diaconate. Looking back, it's hard to define one moment when I 'heard the call.' Each of us is on the 'Road to Jerusalem,' and it seems that there are multiple moments during our journey when God meets us where we are. That certainly has been my experience. Growing up in the 50's in a strong Catholic family, being an altar server, having an older sister become a nun and an older brother become a priest were positive influences, along with the priests in the parish. Eventually entering seminary myself, I discerned a call to the priesthood. After 4 or 5 yrs. I discerned the priesthood was not the vocation in which God was calling me to service.

Eventually I got a job, and married (my first vocation). Cathy and I raised a family, and remained active in whatever parish we belonged. There were nudges over the years – the pastor asking me to direct the choir. Making a Cursillo was definitely a big nudge. It was a defining experience for me, deepening my relationship with God, actually making me keenly aware of that relationship. After our family moved, at another parish I was asked to be involved in Youth Ministry and to teach the Confirmation class. Later the priest started a small faith-sharing group ministry, and my wife and I provided one of what was called a 'Lighthouse,' because the ministry was called LIGHT --- Living in God Holds Together. We discussed the Scripture Readings for the coming Sunday, shared faith experiences within our group, and did a service project for the parish. This experience was also a seminal moment.

As I reflect on my call to diaconate, I realize that at almost every step along the way, in my job and other activities, God was inviting me, nurturing me, and preparing to answer this call.

Most deacons are married. I know I could not do this without my wife's support and encouragement. She too gave me direction as I discerned this call, a call which I didn't answer until I was 64 yrs. old. I have been a deacon for 12 yrs. and it is a great blessing to be able to serve my parishes – old guy, young deacon. Please keep me in your prayers, as I will keep you in my prayers as you discern your vocation! Go in Peace!

St. Ambrose

Patron Saint of: Beekeepers, teacher, scholars & bishops

When St. Ambrose was just a baby, a swarm of bees is said to have settled on his face and left behind only a single drop of honey—a sign, according to his father, that the child would grow to speak with wisdom and sweetness.

Years later, Ambrose became a respected governor in Milan. When the Church suddenly needed a new bishop, the people began shouting, "Ambrose for Bishop!" Even though he wasn't yet baptized, the crowd's enthusiasm was overwhelming. Within one week, he was baptized, ordained, and consecrated Bishop of Milan on December 7, 374.

As bishop, Ambrose gave away his wealth, donating his land and using his resources to care for the poor. His generosity and strong leadership made him deeply loved—and, at times, even more influential than the emperor.

Ambrose is also remembered for his wise counsel to Augustine of Hippo.

He famously said:

"When I am at Rome, I fast on Saturday; when I am at Milan, I do not. Follow the custom of the church where you are."

This guidance lives on today in the common saying: "When in Rome, do as the Romans do."

Today, the body of St. Ambrose rests in the Basilica of Sant'Ambrogio in Milan, alongside Saints Gervase and Protase—a lasting reminder of his holiness, leadership, and unwavering faith.
