Typically we interpret Jesus' invitation to Thomas as Jesus' way of proving who he was. It makes sense to us that Jesus had to confront Thomas' doubt with concrete, physical proof that it was indeed himself who was crucified and had now risen from the dead. I'm quite sure it's all the proof any of us would need. It would be interesting however, to contemplate another motive in the mind of Jesus. Maybe there is another motive which might serve Thomas better in his role as disciple and witness to the power Jesus had over death. What if Jesus' intention was not to reveal something about himself, but to reveal something about Thomas? What if Thomas' examination of Jesus' wounds was just a way to get Thomas to examine his own wounds?

I'm reminded of Father Henri Nouwen's book, The Wounded Healer, and the immutable truth that it is in our suffering that we find the strength to offer hope and healing, and that it was Jesus who first proved it, and better than anyone. Some say that all of us carry our own scars of life. We all have those nail marks in our hands and feet, and the gash in our sides that have been healed over, time after time, with every small resurrection we experience. Life can do that to us. We've all had insults and accusations flung at us, sometimes from out of nowhere, failures and disappointments, tragedies and grief, love lost and hearts broken, hopes dashed and dreams shattered.

These leave scars, wounds healed over yet still visible, that mark the struggles and pain and deaths we all endure. But they also make us more sensitive and sensible, more loving and compassionate, more aware and more attentive. These scars are our own nail marks. They are traces of our own Good Fridays. But they are also reminders of our own Easter Sundays and our own escape from the tomb of sin and death. Jesus proved who he was to Thomas, but he also proved that nails and lances could not do him in. He showed Thomas, and us, that he could rise above the cross, and the death it bore on its beam.

At this point in our lives, we're well beyond needing proof of who Jesus is. But we seem to need a constant reminder that in his death and resurrection, Jesus conquered sin and death for all of us. We need reassured that driven nails and thrust lances have no real power over us. Jesus died on the cross and he bore the marks to prove it. But in his resurrection, he left the tomb empty, and we've walked out of that tomb right along with him. Life gives us plenty of opportunities to hang on our own crosses and we may well have the marks to prove it. But the dawn of Easter joy is the dawn of our salvation, and by the marks, maybe not on our hands or our sides, but perhaps on our hearts, we have the chance to show others that sin and death, pain and suffering, can never do us in, just like Jesus proved to Thomas.
