From Fr. Kevin

What a festive day! The church is beautiful! The day promises a new season! Everything is looking up as we recall that day when the crowds welcomed Jesus with palm branches waving and shouts of Hosanna. So goes the day, today. But we know what's coming, and all we can do is ask, "What happened?" How does a festive and hopeful Palm Sunday turn into a dark and deadly Good Friday?

Today we hold up our branches in honor of our Savior, and by the end of the week he will be hanging on a cross, abandoned and left to die. How does this happen? At what point do we tuck our palms away in bibles or on the mantle and forget the whole affair? When do we weave our palms into pretty artistic crosses and part company with Jesus on his way to death?

We've heard him speak of the Kingdom of God and forgiveness and healing and hope. When does that hope die? Is it when Jesus asks us to take up our own crosses? When he asks that we do more with our faith than go to church once a week? Is it when we see him spending too much time with scoundrels and sinners, or when he demands we be understanding and open to the people who live lives that don't measure up to our own moral and ethical standards? To this very day, Jesus continues to disappoint many people who would have otherwise been his followers. He is not the political icon that some try to use to condemn beliefs, attitudes and lifestyles that conflict with our own.

He is not the scourge of an angry God, sent to comfort the self-righteous and destroy the heathen and the scoundrel. He comes to transform human hearts and to re-ignite spirits in the love of God who is waiting for us to realize the divine dream for a world steeped in peace and justice. Hopefully these palms will help us understand what our baptism demands of us. As we welcome Jesus on this Palm Sunday weekend, hopefully we will be able to imitate the Jesus of love in all his suffering, as well as in all his glory.
