In 1994, my wife and I moved to Dunnellon to help plant Springs Presbyterian Church. As the church family began to grow, it became apparent the Lord was bringing together special group of people who had a common interest in the welfare of children in our area who were in need of foster care.

We purchased 28 acres which was large enough to accommodate both the church and the children's home. After we completed the church, we started to take those steps required to make our dream of a home for foster children become a reality. We named it "Covenant Children's Home" as it reflected the level of commitment we knew would be required to truly make a difference in the lives of these young people. We wanted them to know that we are unconditionally committed to them.

The formal organizational meeting for the CCH corporation took place on August 25, 2002. For a time, things progressed very slowly. A major milestone was reached when the first residence was completed in 2009 and called "Faith House." A second residence called "Hope House" is now under construction.

It is perhaps one of the most difficult endeavors a community of believers could undertake. But thanks to the dedication and commitment of those involved, the continued support of all those who believe every child should be well cared for regardless of their circumstances and most importantly the Grace of God, the dream of providing children in need with a place to call home has become a reality. Many thanks to those who, over the last ten years, have helped it to become a reality and also those who will be making it possible to serve our children for the next ten.
