



A Message from Commissioner Manny Ramirez

Howdy,

What an incredible six months it has been since we began working to move Northwest Tarrant County into the 21st Century! We have hit the ground running and have tackled decades old challenges to make our county the best place to live work and raise your family. Our hardworking team in Precinct 4 has continued to exceed expectations and we are all laser focused on the vision of making Tarrant County the most efficient and effective county in the nation. I am thankful for the thousands of community members that I have had the privilege of speaking with over the past several months. Your input, feedback, and guidance has been invaluable.

Together we have undertaken the daily work of establishing a common-sense and responsible government, based on low taxes, public safety, and smart infrastructure.

To lower your property tax burden, we passed a historic countywide 10% Homestead Exemption for all property owners. This is the first exemption ever offered by Tarrant County and will provide much needed financial breathing room for our residents.

To improve traffic and mobility, we are working on a comprehensive roadway and infrastructure plan to ensure our roads and bridges keep up with our growth. We have incredible opportunities in Northwest Tarrant County to build needed roads and bridges <u>before</u> the growth expands. Some specific projects that we've successfully kicked into gear include the West Bonds Ranch Rd corridor and the Hwy 199 project. We were successful in partnering with our state and federal partners to receive more than \$17 million to build a bridge at Hwy 287. We will have many more great announcements about ongoing projects soon!

To make our community safer, I instructed the County Administrator to review the permits for Temptations Strip Club in Western Tarrant County. This business was a hotbed of criminal activity including stabbings, shootings, drugs, and murders that strained our law enforcement resources and created a dangerous environment for our community. Once alerted to issues and violations, immediate action was taken and after a hearing, the Temptations operating permit was revoked. In addition, I asked the District Attorney to pursue a public nuisance lawsuit. This location has made life difficult for our residents for more than a decade, and we were able to shut it down within 45 days.

None of this success would be possible without the input and feedback of our incredible citizens, and without the hard work and dedication of your Precinct 4 staff. It is an honor to work alongside these incredible professionals and a privilege to represent this county. Building and Repairing County Roads: A Commitment to Quality and Safety

Maintaining and improving county roads is a crucial responsibility that ensures efficient transportation and connects communities. Our Precinct Field Operations supervisors regularly assess county roads, monitor their condition, and identify areas that require attention. Road builders are trained to identify failures such as cracks, wheel rutting, asphalt movement, and base/subgrade issues that can compromise road integrity.

Knowing the history of a road is vital for determining the appropriate repairs or maintenance required. Our experienced supervisors of Precinct 4 document the work completed on specific roads, allowing them to make informed decisions on the necessary repairs. They meet to discuss which roads should take priority based on factors such as traffic volume, proximity to schools, community input, and other relevant considerations.

When working on a road, we understand the importance of thoroughness and avoid making half-hearted or incomplete repairs. This commitment to quality ensures that repairs are effective, efficient, and minimize the need for future interventions. While this approach may delay lower priority projects, it ultimately saves time and resources by preventing recurring repairs.

What we do

A county-maintained road (CR) is a public road that has been accepted for maintenance by the commissioner's court and is in the unincorporated areas of the county.



Project management plays a vital role in successfully executing road repairs. The process typically involves several steps, although some may be omitted based on project requirements. Initially, vegetation along the road shoulders is cleared to prevent it from mixing with the subgrade material, which could lead to future failures. Overhanging trees that obstruct machinery clearance are also trimmed.

Next, a milling machine is used to grind and remove the necessary amount of material from the road surface. The removed material or "millings", can be reutilized for many purposes such as driveways, walking paths, or filler for other projects. You can request having the material delivered to your property by calling (817) 306-4000.



For reconstruction projects, the roadbed is further stabilized using Portland cement, followed by a curing period of seven days. In cases where reconstruction is unnecessary, an overlay of fresh asphalt is applied to the milled surface. After completing the pavement work, measures are taken to address the drop-off at the edge of the pavement, usually using a machine called a "road widener" to prevent vehicles from veering off the road.

The final stage involves striping the road to ensure clear and visible markings for drivers. This task is typically carried out by the Transportation Division, with Precinct 4 supervisors overseeing the process.

Recently, Precinct 4 completed a mill and overlay of the 3800-4800 blocks of Silver Creek Rd. The main focus was a mill and overlay, aimed at improving the road's rideability and addressing cracking issues. A section of the road was reconstructed due to structural concerns. The project involved 2,390 dedicated man-hours, \$118,429 in equipment, and \$908,700 in material costs. Our well-trained and talented crew were able to complete this project without the need of contract labor or equipment resulting in significant savings to taxpayers.



In conclusion, the members of the Precinct 4 Road and Bridge crews exemplify the dedication and expertise required in building and repairing county roads. By prioritizing thoroughness, quality, and safety, they ensure that roads are reliable, efficient, and meet the needs of their communities.
