INTRODUCTION

A New Mandate for a New Age

Every generation inherits more than a moment in history; generations inherit a divine responsibility. Whether recognized or ignored, every civilization is called to answer a question that transcends economics, politics, education, technology, and culture. It is the same question that has echoed throughout human history from the very beginning of time.

The servant who buried his gift lost both the opportunity and the privilege that had been entrusted to him. The lesson is unmistakable. God measures stewardship through multiplication. That biblical principle forms the foundation of *The Mandate of Excellence*.

The title of this book was chosen deliberately. The title does not simply advocate excellence as a worthwhile aspiration or a desirable personality trait; it argues that excellence has become a divine mandate. Excellence is the visible evidence of faithful stewardship. It is the disciplined pursuit of becoming everything God created us to become so that we may contribute everything God created us to contribute. Excellence is not rooted in pride, self-glorification, or personal ambition; it is rooted in obedience. It is our response to the extraordinary trust God has placed in every human life. The History of Replacement

Throughout human history, civilizations have risen and fallen not merely because of resources, geography, or military power, but because of their ability to adapt to changing realities. Every major economic age of human existence has transformed the very

definition of human value and framed individual purpose. With each new age, the human skills, behaviors, and contributions that once ensured one's survival became less relevant, less necessary, and in many cases, obsolete. The 2.5-million-year history of humanity is, in many ways, the tumultuous history of replacement—replacement of what and who no longer has intrinsic value in the world.

The Hunter-Gatherer Age dominated human existence for tens of thousands of years. Survival depended upon physical endurance, hunting skill, environmental awareness, and the ability to gather food from the natural world. Those abilities were the clear determinants of who lived and who died. Entire communities were organized, or disappeared, around these anthropic competencies.

Then the Agricultural Revolution emerged approximately 10,000 to 12,000 years ago as the economic focus of mankind. This prehistoric transition established humanity's shift from nomadic hunting and gathering to settled farming methodologies that ultimately created the permanent communities.

As farming spread across civilizations, the hunter-gatherer economy began to disappear. The Agricultural Revolution replaced the majority of the hunters and gatherers, as value of hunting and gathering was diminished by the increased value of farming and colonizing. No longer did societies require large populations devoted exclusively to hunting and gathering. Human value shifted. The world demanded different skills. Farmers, land managers, animal breeders, irrigation specialists, and food distributors became the new drivers of civilization. The old economy gave way to the new, and a vast percentage of the workforce that once held economic value found its role diminished—replaced.

Next came the Industrial Revolution. The Industrial Revolution began in Great Britain in the 1760's. The world transitioned from agrarian, physical labor economics to machine-powered manufacturing and factory systems requiring, for the first time, skilled-labor. While the Industrial Revolution roughly spanned only approximately 100 years, it transformed economies globally by de-valuing physical labor and valuing intellectual skill.

Machines transformed productivity. Textile manufacturing and iron production factories replaced agricultural fields as the dominant engines of economic growth. The steam locomotive became a primary means of transportation. Millions who once worked the land discovered that the future belonged to manufacturing, engineering, logistics, and industrial organization. Agriculture did not disappear, but it no longer employed the mediocre, under-educated, under-achieving, majority of society. Highly educated humans did not leave institutions of higher learning and join their parents and grandparents in the fields to pick fruit. They used their intellect to design and build machinery that replaced

the physical human labor that once dominated the industry. Once again, human value shifted. The old agricultural economy surrendered its dominance to the new industrial economy.

There was a second Industrial Revolution from the late 1800's to the early 1900's. This was the time in history in which electricity, assembly lines, automobiles, and the oil and gas industries appeared. Not much changed in human value between the times of the first and second Industrial Revolutions, but then came the Third Industrial Revolution; better known as the Digital Age or the Digital Revolution of the mid-to-late 1900's.

The Digital Revolution in America was ushered in by a fundamental transition from analog to digital technology. The world experienced the development and rise of silicon computer chip, personal computers and the creation of the internet; the world-wide web (www....com). The Digital Age changed everything. The industrial workforce that once powered nations began to shrink. Automation reduced the need for large numbers of assembly workers. Information became more valuable than physical and skilled labor. Those who could create, manage, analyze, and leverage technology and information gained increasing economic power and dominance in the global workforce. Under-valued humans were replaced by technology and those trained in technology. The tech-boom was the new King, and the new King did not require as many mediocre under-achieving workers as the previous economic revolutions.

The Digital Revolution gave rise to the Technology Age and the Information Age. All are closely related and considered, economically, part of the Third Industrial Revolution. Connectivity transformed the world into a single marketplace. Information traveled globally in seconds. Entire industries were created, disrupted, and replaced; along with the “no-longer-valued” humans who worked in the industries. The most valuable workers were no longer necessarily those who could manufacture products, but those who could create ideas, software, systems, content, intellectual property, and scalable solutions. And now humanity stands at the threshold of the next great revolutionary transformation: The Age of Artificial Intelligence—The Fourth Industrial Revolution.

Unlike every previous economic revolution, Artificial Intelligence is not merely replacing physical labor; it is replacing routine cognitive labor as well. For the first time in human history, machines are not simply performing tasks; they are making decisions, analyzing information, creating content, identifying patterns, solving problems, and producing intellectual output. Along with Artificial Intelligence there is the blending of physical, digital and biological systems to create virtual reality; creating holographic and 3D digital environments. The world is in constant evolution, and the implications to human are profound.

Historically, human societies required enormous numbers of average mediocre performers to efficiently sustain economic activity. Industrial factories needed physical labor to complete basic and simply tasks. Large agricultural farms needed laborers to pick the fruits and vegetables. Large industrial and distribution warehouses needed material handlers and forklift drivers. Federal, state and local governments needed large quantities of administrators and hourly employees. Large populations of moderately skilled to no-skill workers could still create substantial economic value because human labor itself was scarce. That reality has changed. Artificial intelligence is changing how humanity functions and how the world around us functions. The value of AI is increasing daily.

Artificial Intelligence does not sleep, and it does not require breaks. AI does not forget instructions, and it does not become distracted. AI does not call in sick, and it is never insubordinate. AI can perform many forms of routine work with greater speed, greater consistency, greater accuracy, and lower cost than the above-average human worker.

This reality creates a difficult but unavoidable truth: The market value of mediocrity and under-achievement is collapsing. For centuries there was economic space for under-performance and the under-educated. There was room for average effort and a subpar sense of urgency. There was opportunity for those who merely showed up haphazardly and completed basic tasks with no enthusiasm or little interest in the bottom line. The structure of society, up to a certain age in time, required large numbers of individuals operating at modest levels of productivity. That time has come and gone, and today that space is rapidly disappearing, and once again under-valued humans are being replaced.

In the history of military battle, wars were once won primarily through overwhelming numbers of mediocre and socially under-achieving soldiers. Massive armies were assembled because victory often depended upon the quantity of available manpower, not the quality. The army with the most soldiers available to be killed on the battlefield typically won the battle. Modern warfare increasingly relies upon technology, intelligence systems, precision targeting, drones, autonomous platforms, cyber capabilities, advanced analytics, and AI. Far fewer men and women in secluded command post can now accomplish what once required thousands of soldiers on the battlefield.

The same pattern is occurring across every economic industry. Businesses are learning to produce more with fewer employees. Governments are learning to automate processes. Healthcare is integrating intelligent diagnostics, augmented by AI and Fourth Industrial Revolution technological advancement. Public and private transportation is even becoming increasingly autonomous. Education is being transformed by adaptive learning

technologies. Financial systems are becoming algorithmically driven. The world requires fewer workers and demands greater capability from those who remain.

This is not necessarily a cause for human despair, but it is a call to awaken the essence of human existence to harken to *The Mandate of Excellence* once again. We have answered the call all the previous times in history. It's now time to do it once again. It's not God's punishment. It's just our turn; our turn on the wheel of human evolution.
