- 18 look for when you're sitting on the interstate. What
- 19 are you looking for? What types of vehicles, what
- 20 behavior, what speed, what -- everything that you take
- 20 behavior, what speed, what everything that you tak
- 21 into consideration when you're saying, "I've got
- 22 probable cause to stop that guy."
- 23 A. I'm looking for driving behavior. I mean,
- 24 you watch a thousand vehicles. A thousand vehicles
- 25 does everything normal, then you have one car that

- that not everybody does. I mean, you watch a thousand
- 2 vehicles, everybody's in the fast lane. I mean, if
- 3 you're not doing nothing wrong, you don't mind the
- 4 police.
- 5 Q. So, at that point, you see this vehicle
- 6 acting erratically, and you pull out and start
- 7 following him?
 - A. Yes, sir. You get your probable cause.
- 9 Q. How do you get your probable cause?
- 10 A. Well, sometimes you get it, sometimes you
- 11 don't, whether it be license plate light, turn
- 12 signals, speeding, going past the fog line. I mean,
- 3 whatever they're doing.
- 14 Q. Whatever their infraction is?
 - A. Yeah.
 - Q. In other words -- so you've answered my
- 17 question. You're not necessarily looking for anything
- 18 that's indicative of drug-running? You're looking for

- 22 Charles, but it's pretty well known that Jennings has a
- 23 drug problem.
