What We Believe

The Bible

We believe that the Bible is the Word of God and contains one harmonious and sufficiently complete system of doctrine. We believe in the full inspiration of the Word of God. We hold the Word of God to be the only authority in all matters and assert that no doctrine can be true or essential, if it does not find a place in this Word.

The Father

We believe in God, the Father Almighty, the Author and Creator of all things. The Old Testament reveals God in diverse manners, by manifesting his nature, character, and dominions. The Gospels in the New Testament give us knowledge of God the "Father" or "My Father", showing the relationship of God to Jesus as Father, or representing Him as the Father in the Godhead, and Jesus himself that Son (St. John 15:8, 14:20). Jesus also gives God the distinction of "Fatherhood" to all believers when he explains God in the light of "Your Father in Heaven" (St. Matthew 6:8).

The Son

We believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, the Second person in the Godhead of the Trinity or Triune Godhead. We believe that Jesus was and is eternal in his person and nature as the Son of God who was with God in the beginning of creation (St. John 1:1). We believe that Jesus Christ was born of a virgin called Mary according to the scripture (St. Matthew 1:18), thus giving rise to our fundamental belief in the Virgin Birth and to all of the miraculous events surrounding the phenomenon (St. Matthew 1:18-25). We believe that Jesus Christ became the "suffering servant" to man; this suffering servant came seeking to redeem man from sin and to reconcile him back to God, his Father (Romans 5:10). We believe that Jesus Christ is standing now as mediator between God and man (I Timothy 2:5)

The Holy Ghost

We believe the Holy Ghost or Holy Spirit is the third person of the Trinity, proceeds from the Father and the Son, is of the same substance, equal to power and glory, and is together with the Father and the Son, to be believed in, obeyed, and worshipped. The Holy Ghost is a gift bestowed upon the believer for the purpose of equipping and empowering the believer, making him a more effective witness for service in the world. He teaches and guides one into all truth (John 16:13; Acts 1:8, 8:39).

The Baptism of the Holy Ghost

We believe that the Baptism of the Holy Ghost is an experience subsequent to conversion and sanctification and that tongue-speaking is the consequence of the baptism in the Holy Ghost with the manifestations of the fruit of the spirit (Galatians 5:22-23; Acts 10:46, 19:1-6). We believe that we are not baptized with the Holy Ghost in order to be saved (Acts 19:1-6; John 3:5). When one receives a baptismal Holy Ghost experience, we believe one will speak with a tongue unknown to oneself according to the sovereign will of Christ. To be filled with the Spirit means to be Spirit controlled as expressed by Paul in Ephesians 5:18-19. Since the charismatic demonstrations were necessary to help the early church to be successful in implementing the command of Christ, we therefore, believe that a Holy Ghost experience is mandatory for all men today.

Northeastern College of Theology seeks to offer the highest quality curriculum and reference materials. Resources are subject to change at the discretion of the Executive Board of Directors, and not all subjects are offered every year.

Student Nondiscrimination Policy

Non-Discrimination Policy - Northeastern College of Theology does not discriminate based on nationality, ethnic origin, age, or gender. However, we reserve the right to evaluate acceptance or refusal based on irreconcilable dogma and unethical conduct which are considered applicable. Upon admittance, we reserve the right to reevaluate, if deemed necessary, each student for relevant irreconcilable conduct or dogma. We guarantee the rights, privileges, and the availability of programs and activities to all active students of the College.

Privacy Rights of Students

Privacy Rights of Students: STATUTE 20, UNITED STATES CODE, 1232g and regulations adopted pursuant thereto. The code provides for an institution to establish a category of student information termed directory information. All information, such as health and medical records, disciplinary records, records of personal counseling, required student and family financial income information records, transcripts or student permanent academic records, student placement records and other personally identifiable information shall be open for inspection only to the student and such members of the professional staff of the Institute as have responsibility for working with the student. Such information will not be released to second parties without consent of the student. Except as required for use by the president in the discharge of his official responsibilities as prescribed by laws, regulations of the state board, and board policies, the designated custodian of such records may release information from these records to others only upon authorization in writing from the student or upon a subpoena by a court of competent jurisdiction.

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Northeastern College of Theology Admission Policies

Each candidate/student desiring admission to NCT must submit a completed application packet to the NCT Admissions Office. The packet must include a pastor's recommendation, a short autobiography, documented independent study, and a resume of recent work experience. This is required for a complete evaluation. It should include: 1) Company 2) Company location 3) Start date 4) End date 5) Position 6) Responsibilities 7) Accomplishments.

Suppose a candidate/student has attended Bible Colleges or Liberal Arts schools. In that case, the candidate/student should use the request form for an official transcript, available upon request, to be sent to NCT. It must include: 1) Ministry 2) Start date 3) End date 4) Responsibilities 5) Accomplishments 6) Number of hours per week.

If a candidate/student attended any Training Centers or schools where no transcripts were given, a complete list of courses, dates, grades, and the name and address of the location/church where the classes were held must be submitted. This must be submitted on official letterhead and be notarized.

The cost of tuition, materials, and textbooks cannot be determined until a complete evaluation has been done. The price depends upon the required number of courses for each program level. Each review is done in a case-by-case situation.

Transferred Credits

NCT accepts transfer credits from other educational institutions appropriate to the student's degree program in Bible and Theology. Bachelor-level students may transfer up to 72 credit hours of the required courses and 30 credit hours for elective courses. To be eligible for graduation from the NCT Bachelor program, a transfer student must complete a minimum of 54 credit hours of required courses from NCT. The NCT Associate program is exactly fifty percent of the Bachelor program, which requires 144 credits. Only credit hours with a grade of "C" and above will be transferred from other educational institutions. The credit hours granted for occupational experience in ministry depend on the student's position and how that experience relates to a degree program.

Payments

All tuition and fees are due and payable at registration. Students unable to pay the total amount of tuition may be approved upon request under various payment plans.

Refund Policy

Notification of withdrawal from a course must be made in writing. Fees for application, evaluation, and textbooks and materials are non-refundable. After the beginning of classes, refunds for tuition will be made according to the following schedule:

Withdrawals

A student desiring to withdraw from school before the end of a trimester must submit a completed withdrawal form to the Admissions Office. A student who withdraws officially will receive a grade of "W" (withdrawal) in all courses in which a passing grade has been maintained. A student who does not withdraw officially will result in forfeiture of any financial refund that would otherwise be due and receive a note on the transcript of "incomplete."

Adding and Dropping Classes:

A student who finds it necessary to add or drop a class must submit a completed form to the Admissions Office. A student who drops a class without fulfilling the withdrawal requirement will receive a grade of "UW" (unofficial withdrawal). Changes in registration may be made during the first two weeks of classes. Classes may not be added after the third week unless approved by the Director of Admissions. No grade will be recorded on the official transcript when a student drops a class within the first week. Classes dropped after the first week and before the third week will receive a grade of "W" (withdrawal). Classes dropped after the third week will receive a grade of UW (unofficial withdrawal).

Grades

Final grades are based on the student's work, such as homework, quizzes, exams, and written paper. However, other areas are considered, such as attitude, attendance, and participation.

Note: Below "C" is unacceptable for college-level work and receives an incomplete.

Incomplete Grades:

Students who have not completed all requirements for a course because of extenuating circumstances must obtain a Petition for Incomplete Grade form from the office and have it approved by the course instructor. The petition and a final grade sheet will be sent to the office. A \$5.00 charge will be assessed for each petition submitted. All required work must be completed and submitted to the instructor within thirty days of the final class meeting. Instructors will assign incomplete grades: I/B, I/C, I/D, I/F. Students who do not complete the required work within thirty days will receive the alternate grade (Example: B, C, D, F) assigned by the instructor.

Repeating Classes:

Upon approval of the instructor, a student may repeat a course for which a grade of "D" or "F" is received. The last grade received will be used in computing the student's cumulative grade point average.

Intent to Graduate:

Each candidate qualifying to graduate from NCT must file an Intent to Graduate form with the Admissions Office at least six weeks before the time of graduation. All candidate forms must be forwarded, along with pertinent required information, to the Home Office.

Life-Earned Credits

NCT recognizes life-learning experience and will issue credit up to the Bachelor program for such experience. NCT Administration must determine such credit during the candidate's evaluation process.

Application For Advanced Standing

To apply for Advanced Standing, enclose all of the requested information on the enrollment application and the appropriate fees. Make your check payable to NCT. You will be given a detailed report of your advanced standing in the degree program of your choice.

Northeastern College of Theology Degree Programs and Requirements

Distance Degree Students

- 1. Distance students are enrolled in an educational program that promotes communication through our Learning Management System (LMS). Students will receive their books, homework tests, and other information from the Home Curriculum Office. Completed assignments must be submitted Home Curriculum Office via the LMS Student portal.
- 2. Distance Degree courses are in-depth studies.
- 3. Having "Distance" stamped on your material or your degree is not required.
- 4. Tuition payments for correspondence students are SENT to the Home Curriculum Office. ACH is also available.
- 5. Homework is an open note or book that does not need to be proctored (monitored by someone).
- 6.Quizzes and exams for each course must be proctored for the student taking exams.
 The forms are to be attested appropriately and returned to the NCT Home
 Curriculum Office with all pertinent information to their work.
- 7.Student records are maintained in the Home Curriculum Office. The Home Curriculum Office must maintain all student information, applications, autobiographies, requests for evaluation, financial agreements, transcripts of completed courses, and transcripts or credit hours transferred into NCT.
- 8. No graded homework or term papers will be returned to the students. Students will receive a grade sheet with their grades for the course or courses.

COURSE # CREDIT HOURS

ABS - 101 [2] Matthew: The Kingdom Is Presented and Rejected

Course Description: In this course we examine examples of major changes that happened during the Intertestamental period, which affect our understanding of the Gospels and explain the distinctive gospel emphases of Matthew. Textbook: —New Testament Survey by Rick Griffith. ThM. PhD

ABS - 102 [2] Mark: Kingdom Life Is Shown in Discipleship

Course Description: In this course we appreciate the background information about Mark, which will help you personally interpret his message for today, and evaluate Mark's introduction of Jesus to see if He arrived according to messianic expectations. *Textbook: —New Testament Survey by Rick Griffith, ThM, PhD*

ABS - 103 [2] Luke: The Universal Savior Advances the Kingdom

Course Description: In this course we explain the five events that show God's sovereign hand in preparing His Son for ministry, assess Jesus' call that you live a life of discipleship, establish a plan to avoid personal sin under intense persecution, and evaluate the importance of each factor that is needed to accomplish Jesus' mission. *Textbook: —New Testament Survey by Rick Griffith*. *ThM. PhD*

ABS - 104 [2] John: Deity Became Man to Bring Eternal Life

Course Description: In this course we examine the background information about John and why he selected the material that he did to help you personally interpret Christ's message for today, understand the information regarding Jesus' deity presented in each sign, and evaluate Jesus' claims and His mission for your life. Textbook: —New Testament Survey by Rick Griffith, ThM, PhD



COURSE # CREDIT HOURS

ABS - 105 [2] Acts: The Universal Savior Is Proclaimed in Sovereign Kingdom Progress

Course Description: In this course you see the fulfillment of the mission to take the gospel to the end of the Roman world (Acts 1:8), explain the roles of key individuals in fulfilling this mission to various people groups, appreciate how the disciples' trials in Acts were an opportunity to spread the gospel, and discern the hand of God in the growth and spread of the church. Textbook - New Testament Survey by Rick Griffith, ThM, PhD

ABS - 106 [2] James and Galatians: The Outcomes of Justification by Faith

Course Description: This lesson covers both James and Galatians because this course looks at the New Testament books in historical order. Using the historical order allows you to place the events in chronological order and to see how each New Testament letter relates to its times. Textbook - New Testament Survey by Rick Griffith, ThM, PhD

ABS - 107 [2] 1 & 2 Thessalonians: The Rapture and the Tribulation

Course Description: In this course, we examine how to live out a Christian lifestyle based on the imminent return of Christ, understand the imminence of the Rapture and the basic facts about the Day of the Lord, and set for yourself the Christian goal to be blameless before Christ at His coming, proclaim how to live with faith, love, and endurance at a high spiritual level, as the Thessalonian church lived, and follow Paul's personal example of spreading the gospel, despite persecution and suffering, instead of living for personal gain. Textbook - New Testament Survey by Rick Griffith, ThM, PhD

ABS - 108 [2] 1 & 2 Corinthians: Church Function and Apostolic Authority

Course Description: In this course, we contrast God's wisdom with human wisdom, clearly state the major issues that surround the gospel in Corinth, apply Paul's teachings about church problems to your church situation, live as an ambassador for God in practical ways, and appreciate trials as an opportunity to spread God's Word. Textbook - New Testament Survey by Rick Griffith, ThM, PhD

ABS - 109 [2] Romans: God's Righteousness Comes by Faith

Course Description: In this course, we explain what Paul means by the gospel in Romans, show biblically why all people are condemned under sin and deserve death, describe how righteousness is received, know how to live a sanctified life that is pleasing to a holy God, and clarify the difference between the promises to Israel and the promises to the church. Textbook - New Testament Survey by Rick Griffith, ThM, PhD

ABS - 110 [2] Ephesians and Colossians: Unity in Christ and in His Deity

Course Description: In this course, we explain the significant emphases Paul makes in both Ephesians and Colossians, trace the major themes throughout each book, make applications in your own life from Paul's teachings on positional truth, and explain how Paul expected believers to best testify about God to a watching world. Textbook - New Testament Survey by Rick Griffith, ThM, PhD



COURSE # CREDIT HOURS

ABS - 111 [2] Philemon and Philippians: Christ's Forgiveness and Attitude

Course Description: In this course, we illustrate the work of Christ from both Philippians and Philemon, critique Paul's handling of the reconciliation between Philemon and Onesimus, discern and defend the major themes of both books, teach selfless concern though biblical examples as it is vital for living the Christian life, and esteem the work of Christ on our behalf and scorn the works of the flesh. Textbook - New Testament Survey by Rick Griffith, ThM, PhD

ABS - 112 [2] 1 & 2 Peter: Righteous Suffering and Knowledge Against False Teaching

Course Description: In this course, we examine the role of suffering in the maturing Christian's life, value sufferings in light of Christ's return, strive to put on the divine nature, which gives a more intimate relationship with Christ, and trust that God judges the ungodly—especially those who are guilty of sexual sin and who despise proper authority—while He protects the righteous. Textbook - New Testament Survey by Rick Griffith, ThM, PhD

ABS - 113 [2] Hebrews: Christ's Superiority as the High Priest

Course Description: In this course the author shows the Hebrew believers the superiority of Christ as the High Priest and of Christianity over Judaism. He exhorts them to endure persecution rather than to return to their former life under Judaism. *Textbook - New Testament Survey by Rick Griffith, ThM, PhD*

ABS - 114 [2] 1 & 2 Timothy and Titus: The Pastoral Epistles

Course Description: In this course, Paul exhorts Timothy to courageously guard his personal life, Christian doctrine, and the local church, so that he can safeguard the Ephesian church against ascetic and speculative false teachers, and to faithfully practice and preach the Word despite hardship. He encourages him to persevere against false teaching and apostasy. Textbook - New Testament Survey by Rick Griffith, ThM, PhD

ABS - 115 [2] John's Epistles and Jude

Course Description: In this course, John writes a general letter that encourages his readers to obey God's commands to love others. He writes to protect them from Gnosticism, which does not accept that Christ was both fully God and fully human, denying one or the other, and teaches a Christian woman and her children, who show hospitality to missionaries, that there are limits to love. These people are warned not to exten d the same hospitality to false teachers, which would aid the spread of destructive heresies. John encourages Gaius to continue his support of missionaries. 
