6	MR. RICHARD: I don't know if he can or not.
7	They've changed this three or four times, so I don't
8	know.
9	MS. DIMITROFF: Somebody needs to take an
10	action item to figure that out. I got it. Okay. I
11	forgot where I'm going with this. All right.
12	Meeting minutes are approved. Public comment. Does
13	anyone want to address the public?
14	Ms. MOUROUSIAS: Michelle Mourousias, and at
15	the last meeting of December 4th, you guys approved
16	the meeting minutes of October 2nd. There's a
17	couple of problems with those meeting minutes. The
18	first one is that it's listed as there's an
19	attorney present at that meeting, and there was no
20	attorney present at that meeting. It's listed as
21	Kirsten Cass.
22	Second, almost everybody's name from the
23	public is spelled incorrectly. I'm sure everybody
24	remembers at that meeting that the stenographer was

1	late by probably about a half an hour and Bob
2	Handley was taking the meeting minutes. The meeting
3	minutes do not represent the first half hour of the
4	meeting. There are there's no roll call. There
5	is no record of the vote to approve meeting minutes
6	of September 11th, and there were seven members of
7	the public that spoke at that meeting and made
8	public comment and there was no documentation of it.
9	MS. DIMITROFF: Thank you. Can I just
10	finish taking these notes? Sorry. Hey, Bill, I
11	know you took notes, right, at that meeting?
12	MR. HANDLEY: I did take notes because I was
13	going to do the minutes.
14	MS. DIMITROFF: You took notes, but you gave
15	them to the stenographer when he came in or the
16	court reporter. I don't know if he ever gave them
17	back.
18	MR. HANDLEY: No, I've still got them.
19	MS. DIMITROFF: Way to go, Bob. Can we take
20	those and amend? I don't know how that works.
21	MR. HANDLEY: Well, I mean, this is public
22	comment, so we can do whatever we want when we want
23	to do it, but we don't have to do anything if we
24	don't want.

1	MS. DIMITROFF: Okay. Someone else want to
2	speak?
3	MR. MOUROUSIAS: Peter Mourousias.
4	MS. DIMITROFF: Can you spell your last name
5	so we get it spelled correctly?
6	MR. MOUROUSIAS: M-O-U-R-O-U-S-I-A-S.
7	Should be on the sign in sheet.
8	MS. DIMITROFF: Thank you.
9	MR. MOUROUSIAS: Because our public comments
10	weren't included on the record, I just wanted to add
11	to off street parking, the public hearing that you
12	held for that was way back in December of 2022. And
13	when that public hearing was held, there was no
14	documentation as to what was being changed. I don't
15	believe there was a petitioner. Why we're changing
16	off street parking, which I believe our ordinances
17	require. There was no petitioner. I made an
18	example of when we changed the zoning for the police
19	department. Pete Connolly came here and petitioned
20	for a change in the ordinance. There was no
21	petitioner for off street parking. And on tonight's
22	agenda, we've got livestock definitions, animal
23	regulations, and signs. Nobody explained why we're
24	changing these, which I have kind of a problem with

1	the public town hall that we're going to have that
2	nobody knows what the changes are. Those documents,
3	they just got an email saying, hey, there's a town
4	hall about off street parking. But how do you go
5	into this town hall and speak intelligently? How do
6	you have questions prepared when the public doesn't
7	even know what the changes are?
8	So I just wanted to say that again on the
9	record, that I do not believe that I think there
10	should be another proper public hearing. That
11	public hearing was in December of 2022. Since that
12	public hearing, there's a new chairperson on this
13	committee. There's a new committee. Miguel wasn't
14	on the commission at the time. And think about all
15	the residents that have moved in and moved out since
16	December of 2022. I think you should have another
17	public hearing instead of a town hall. Thank you.
18	MS. DIMITROFF: Thank you. Is there any
19	other public comments?
20	MS. RICHARD: Hi, Abigail Richard. I'm here
21	because I heard that there was going to be
22	discussion about the livestock definitions and the
23	off street parking village hall, and there were two
24	things that I just wanted to know more about. I

1 wasn't able to find much information online. 2 mom of four kids, and I'm pregnant, and so I was 3 trying to find, like, definitions for what --4 MR. HANDLEY: Congratulations. 5 MS. RICHARD: Thank you. For what defines 6 livestock, and, like, I looked up all this on the 7 zoning thing and I searched for goats, cows. 8 only thing that pops up is horses or chickens, but 9 yet then I hear, you know, this person's had their 10 goats taken away or we're not really supposed to 11 have goats, but as long as your neighbors don't 12 complain or whatnot. And I guess as a rural person 13 who moved here from Ohio, I have three and a half 14 acres here in Wayne. I don't know that I should be 15 having to consider that a goat is such a huge, 16 horrible thing that I could get a fine for. I do 17 not currently own goats, but I know people who do, 18 and they're a lot less obnoxious than the dog next door barking for 14 and a half hours and running at 19 20 my kids. And I wasn't able to find anything that said I couldn't even have them. 2.1 22 So, you know, if I were to move to Wayne and 23 wanted a goat, I would have no idea that that was 24 against the law or rules or regulations. So that

1	was one of my main concerns, because I feel like
2	that needs updated and the public needs to know
3	about it because a lot of people have absolutely no
4	clue. And the only reason I know is because the
5	whisper of people who have goats illicitly or
6	whatnot is, you know, be nice to your neighbors and
7	it'll be fine. And I like to be above board, but I
8	also think that's wrong if my neighbor can have ten
9	dogs barking at all hours of the night, and I'm
10	going to get in trouble if I decide my child wants
11	to go for 4H.
12	So anyway, I like better laid out
13	definitions for what is allowed and not allowed.
14	And then if we're going to change that, the public
15	needs to know. I have three and a half acres. I
16	think it's my right to know what I can or cannot
17	have. And I am not on Facebook, so I don't know
18	where that information gets disseminated from, but I
19	didn't get a flyer or anything, so I would have no
20	idea.
21	And then my second thing is for changing off
22	street parking regulations, I have four kids. So
23	what happens if all of my children own a car and
24	want to park their cars in my driveway? What do I

1	do? Do they have to rent a U-haul space and then
2	take an Uber every day to get their car? So just a
3	lot of questions with that and how that makes sense,
4	and that seems kind of discriminatory, like, oh, no,
5	are we not, like, okay with big families anymore?
6	So just a little more transparency on that. And
7	before we go changing things, perhaps the public
8	needs to have some sort of a say and more of an
9	opinion on that, because otherwise, you know, what
10	are my kids going to do when they all buy a car when
11	they're 16?
12	MS. DIMITROFF: Thank you. Any other public
13	comment?
14	MS. CUNANAN: Yeah, just quickly. I have
15	two things. Anna Cunanan.
16	MS. DIMITROFF: Can you spell your last
17	name?
18	MS. CUNANAN: C-U-N-A-N-A-N. Anna, A-N-N-A.
19	Just two things quickly. Number one, I'm curious,
20	what is the specific process? I read a number of
21	the transcripts of the planning commission over last
22	spring and summer into the fall, and it was clearly
23	stated that the thought was that another public
24	hearing was needed with all the changes that were

1	being made since December 2022. So would the
2	process be to have another public hearing? And why
3	did it go to the board? It sounds like it went to
4	the board prematurely. And then could the board
5	have just passed it back to the plan commission,
6	given that we had a plethora of residents here that
7	were against the changes for off street parking
8	specifically, and then could you then, you know,
9	review those and make changes as necessary and send
10	it back to the board? Is it legitimate to say that
11	you need as a plan commission to have another public
12	hearing? Town hall is one thing, and it's great,
13	but it's not a formal formally documented municipal
14	meeting or event. So my guess is you're going to
15	plan on having a public hearing in the future after
16	this town hall.
17	And number two, just to help in reading
18	these transcripts, I see there's a lot of
19	interruptions, and I know it's tough when you have
20	seven people and trying to have these conversations,
21	but in some cases, a commissioner will ask a very
22	thoughtful question, and it doesn't get answered

because there's interruptions and then it goes off

track. So I just want to see if maybe you can be

1	mindful of that to just maybe limit the
2	interruptions and let the commissioner ask their
3	question and get an answer. Thank you.
4	MS. DIMITROFF: Thank you. Any other public
5	comment?
6	Great, okay. So on the agenda we do have
7	discussing the town hall and being ready for that.
8	I'd like to go through a few items, and then I'd
9	like to ask for a subcommittee to help me get this
10	slime deck ready for the meeting. And then kind of,
11	we can high level talk about how that's going to go.
12	MR. HANDLEY: Let the record reflect she's
13	looking at me.
14	MS. DIMITROFF: And just make sure we're
15	ready because it's a week from Thursday. I know
16	that there were supposed to be cards that went out.
17	I haven't seen them. I didn't get a chance to call
18	Patty this morning, and there should be a link on
19	those. I asked them to have a link to the change
20	because it's supposed to be posted on the website
21	site, so I'll talk to her tomorrow.
22	MR. HANDLEY: I got an email about it, if
23	that means anything.
24	MS. DIMITROFF: A public email?

24	it goes to the board.

1	MS. DIMITROFF: We do our draft.
2	MS. TRANCHIDA: We drafts are different than
3	seen it verbatim written out.
4	MS. DIMITROFF: What we did is what he did.
5	Remember, we submitted it one time and I said, oh,
6	no, we're going to have another meeting. We had
7	another meeting. We changed the whole recreational
8	vehicle situation. And then I took that and gave it
9	to him verbatim. I don't believe he changed
10	anything. And then that's the process. That's the
11	process.
12	MR. HANDLEY: Yeah, that's the way it's
13	always been.
14	MS. TRANCHIDA: That doesn't mean it has to
15	stay that way.
16	MS. DIMITROFF: But I'm just telling you,
17	that's the process.
18	MR. SANTANA: But it's a process in place.
19	MS. DIMITROFF: Yeah.
20	MR. SANTANA: And if we're going to be
21	consistent, then we should follow with the process
22	in place. What was presented to the board was,
23	quote unquote, a proposal for an amendment to
24	whatever was submitted to the board. If my memory

1	serves me correct, the board elected to say, hey,
2	we're not going to make a decision. We're going to
3	go ahead and put this back into a town hall meeting
4	so that way we can hear from the people. And then
5	based on what we hear, either we'll make a decision
6	or we'll kick it back to the planning commission.
7	MS. TRANCHIDA: So you're making it sound

4	village ordinance, how many hens are you allowed to
5	have?
6	MS. DIMITROFF: I think it depends on your
7	acreage and your neighbor's acreage.
8	MS. TRANCHIDA: To me, that's ludicrous.
9	Why does it depend on the neighbors?
10	MR. RICHARD: Six per lot, four hens per
11	acre.
12	MR. SANTANA: How many?
13	MR. RICHARD: Six per lot, four hens per
14	acre.

16	MR. SANTANA: Four hens per acre, and a
17	maximum, you said, or a minimum of twelve?
18	MS. DIMITROFF: Max of twelve.
19	MR. SANTANA: A max of twelve. Okay. So
20	there's somebody that moved in relatively new, I
21	want to say eight months. I counted 16 hens on an
22	acre and a half. So I get what you're saying, that
23	we have to draw the line. Something has to be in
24	place. So if I'm going to come in and I'm going to

1	buy a piece of property in the village of Wayne, and
2	my idea is to, oh, well, I'm going to have chickens
3	and horses and cows and this and that, I need to do
4	my due diligence if I want to move into this
5	community, to see what I can or cannot do as far as
6	livestock and animals and hens and what have you.
7	So I understand exactly what you're saying, Greg,
8	because, you know, something needs to be put in
9	place where you need to stop here. And if we
10	already have an ordinance in place, then the people
11	that move into the village of Wayne and/or existing
12	residents of Wayne, they need to abide by that
13	village ordinance.
14	MR. RICHARD: Well, Miguel, just to go a
15	little bit further, one of the speakers tonight said
16	they couldn't find anything about livestock. So I
17	think having rules in black and white will let
18	people know what's what. It's not to everyone
19	thinks this is to minimize and to control people.
20	It's just, you have to know, how are you going to do
21	due diligence if there isn't anything written?
22	MR. SANTANA: Exactly.
23	MS. DIMITROFF: Well, and I think another
24	reason why this commission exists and we're trying

We don't have to do 2.1 anything, right? We don't have to do something. 22 go back and read what was said and see what the 2.3 concerns are. Read what we have and see if we want 2.4 to do something.

1	MR. RICHARD: We're kind of lucky here
2	(indiscernible) that most of our commercial is also
3	historic. So we have a historic sites commission
4	that is empowered to vote on a certificate of
5	appropriateness for a sign. So our sign ordinance
6	here, you know, on residential, you know, political
7	signs, for sale signs, that's it. You can't
8	there's a law against having a sign for your home
9	occupation. So the problems with signs for
10	residential, I think, could be easily fixed. But I
11	would propose that commercial signs, we defer to the
12	historic sites commission because they get more, you
13	know, what I would call design authority because of
14	the provisions of the certificate of
15	appropriateness. Does that make sense?
16	MS. DIMITROFF: You mean when they're
17	designing something and proposing it for the church?
18	Let's use that as an example.

3	was going with this, and I see the big vision on
4	here, not only with the industrial park and the jobs
5	that are going to be created in there, but the new
6	townhomes and the homes that are being built, that's
7	going to create an insurmountable amount of traffic
8	that's going to affect our roads and where we live.
9	And I think that collaboratively we need to come
10	together and try to come up with something to deter
11	that traffic because that's going to be crazy.
12	People cutting through Powis and through Smith and
13	through Munger just to get to working back and
14	forth. That's going to be crazy. And it's not even
15	done.
16	MS. DIMITROFF: Odd question. I don't think
17	that is part of this commission, roads.
18	MR. HANDLEY: It harkens back to the Red
19	Gate Bridge, which we was an issue for many,
20	many, many years, and everybody said it was going to
21	ruin the Village of Wayne and St. Charles thought it
22	was going to take all of the traffic up off of 64,
23	and it didn't either.
24	MS. DIMITROFF: Did you was that

1	addressed as part of the plan commission?
2	MR. HANDLEY: Never once as an agenda item,
3	no.
4	MR. IOZZA: No, never.
5	MS. DIMITROFF: It's not in our
6	jurisdiction. Right. So I can bring it up at the
7	board meeting.
8	MS. TRANCHIDA: Okay.
9	MR. SANTANA: If it isn't in our
10	jurisdiction, at least I think it's something that
11	we should either, number one, consider and/or
12	entertain because people who live in the historic
13	district along Army Trail Road and they come to
14	Powis, they start going west on Army Trail Road to
15	cut to Dunham or whatever the case, traffic is going
16	to be crazy.
17	MS. DIMITROFF: So when I say it's not in
18	our jurisdiction, it's not in the plan commission's
19	jurisdiction.
20	MR. SANTANA: Correct, okay.
21	MS. DIMITROFF: So if you want to bring it
22	up to the board, that is probably where it should
23	start.
24	MR. SANTANA: Okay. Thank you.

1	MS. DIMITROFF: Yeah.
2	MS. TRANCHIDA: So I'd be remiss if I didn't
3	bring up the goats to vote on them again. I'm going
4	to keep bringing them up.

20	MR. HANDLEY: Hearing none, the motion
21	fails.
22	MS. DIMITROFF: Motion fails. We do not
23	have a second.
24	MS. TRANCHIDA: Okay.

1	MR. RICHARD: I just went through the
2	ordinance here. There is a rule against animals
3	making too much noise. The keeping of any animal or
4	bird, by causing frequent or long continued noise
5	shall disturb the comfort or repose of any person in
6	the vicinity. So that's prohibited.
7	MS. TRANCHIDA: I know there's one for dogs
8	running at large.
9	MR. HANDLEY: Probably.
10	MS. TRANCHIDA: There is because they have
11	to be on a leash.
12	MR. SANTANA: Yeah, there is. And they get
13	fined.
14	MR. RICHARD: A leash or within 50 feet of
15	and under the control of
16	MS. TRANCHIDA: What was that number.
17	MR. RICHARD: 452(b)7.
18	MS. DIMITROFF: All right. So we've
19	discussed all of our agenda items today. Does
20	anyone have anything else that they wanted to bring
21	up? Is there any other business?
22	MR. HANDLEY: Motion to adjourn.
