1 us and looked at seeing our willingness to put in 2 license plate recognition cameras. Although I'm a 3 huge supporter of them and I think they're very 4 beneficial, that wouldn't be the primary place 5 that we would put them if we wanted to pay for 6 them, they have offered to pay the entire amount for those license plate recognition cameras. Just to give you a little bit of 9 background about what they are, there are 10 thousands of them in the Chicagoland area. We 11 have -- DuPage County Sheriff already has them on 12 Smith Road just east of -- or just west of 13 Route 59. They're putting another one near Smith 14 and Munger. Route 25, Kane County Sheriff's 15 Police has them there. Bloomingdale has about 25. 16 Bartlett has them. St. Charles has them on Dunham 17 south of North Avenue. There's thousands of them

18 in the Chicagoland area.

19 So they've offered to pay for the two that
20 will be there. The way that they work is they're
21 automated, so they run most of the plates that it
22 can catch as they pass the location there, and
23 that's tied to the police department.
24 We would get an instant alert if there is

1 a vehicle that's in a national or state database

where maybe a car was stolen or it was somebody
wanted for burglary or any other hot-list item
that may be in the database, state or federally or
beyond, really. That would hit and we would get
an instant alert. And so we could then respond to
look for that vehicle in that area.

And so it really is a great public safety
tool. It's what they've been using all on the
Chicagoland expressways with a lot of the stolen
cars that you're seeing. We obviously have the
cameras at Army Trail and Powis already. And so

15 funded by this residential homeowners association.

17 covers a two-year contract. That covers
18 installation. It's all self-contained. There is
19 no electricity that needs to run from power or

13 it's really not much of a difference for us with

14 the exception of we've got this opportunity to be

21 So it's a great opportunity. If at the
22 end of two years the HOA does not wish to pursue
23 it any further, you know, we can -- the Board can
24 certainly discuss where that would go from that

1 point on. But we could certainly then terminate

2 the contract and move on if that was the case.

So it's a great tool, and it actually will protect anybody that's passing through that area

5 with an automated response and immediately goes to

6 the police vehicle. So it's -- technology is

7 great. It's actually, I think, one of the main

8 reasons why Chicago and the area of the western

9 suburbs have been successful with a lot of the

10 cases that we've seen -- that we see every night

11 on the news.

12 And all day long, I hear cases coming up
13 from license plate recognition cameras. So it's a

14 great tool, a great opportunity, and that's why

15 we're happy to have it. And I think it will make 16 our village safer at a great cost to us.

1 data at that time as well. So more to come on 2 that. But thank you to everybody who spent their time on that. Hopefully, it wasn't too difficult to navigate.

I just want to recap here some of the activities that we're doing and have done from the grant aspect. We have -- as President Phipps 8 talked about with the congresswoman that she was going to meet with, we applied yesterday for a 10 federal grant for \$115,000 for replacement 11 vehicles for some of our aging fleet that would be 12 coming up in the next year to two years. So that 13 was one that we applied for.

The speed sign that was approved tonight, 15 that's part of a grant, thanks to Dan Lynch. He 16 had mentioned it at a previous meeting from ComEd. 17 We have applied for a \$10,000 grant to apply 18 towards -- it's a matching grant. So if we spend 19 \$10,000, they'll give us \$10,000. That would 20 actually allow us to get four speed signs.

And so we, unfortunately, had the one on 22 Army Trail that was manufactured in 2009, and that 23 one is no longer. We had it sent out and they 24 said that it is not repairable. So we were hoping

to be ahead of the game, and now we're right now breaking even just trying to get that one over on

Army Trail.

I can tell you, because my office faces that area, that that sign works because we are --6 I am seeing -- visually seeing those cars creep up on some of the speeds. So we do want that sign 8 back. And we've also had day shift, in 9 particular, focusing on traffic enforcement in 10 that area.

So if we can get that grant and get 12 additional signs, then we would have to decide 13 where the rest of those should go. Certainly, 14 Dunham Road is a road that we keep hearing and 15 West Army Trail would be some of the other 16 locations.

17 We're also considering moving the speed 18 sign on Powis and flipping it the other way. I 19 think it's been, you know, in that one spot for a 20 little while. And I think it would help some of 21 the issues that Public Works has been working with 22 with that turn or that curve to be able to give 23 people notice when they're going southbound. So 24 something that we're looking at with that.

So that would be that grant there. We

talked earlier this fiscal year about the \$54,000

grant that we got for replacing some -- purchasing

additional radios and some of our in-car

computers. That was awarded. We are going

through the process of actually getting the money

from them. So it's probably how my daughter feels

when she tries to get money from me. It's a

little bit of a process.

10 We actually also applied for an

11 opportunity for a federal grant for \$75,000 to go

12 towards body-worn cameras. So most people know

13 that that is mandated. For our Village, it's

14 mandated for 2025. Most departments are going

15 earlier to it. It is a huge benefit.

We've seen many cases, most recently in

17 Naperville, an officer-involved shooting in

18 Lombard, an officer-involved shooting where the

19 body-worn cameras certainly told that story

20 quickly and helped in that investigation.

So I think, from a safety perspective, for 22 our staff, for people that we come in contact

23 with, and certainly overall for, you know, the

24 liability for the Village as well and the

exposure, that those really help. And so I really

don't want to wait until 2025 to be able to move

forward with that.

So when we say a body camera grant for

5 75,000, that's a five-year -- that would cover a

five-year agreement -- a five-year contract for

that. So it's in the \$15,000 a year range. Just

to kind of give a perspective for that. So we

applied for a federal grant for that.
