	Eosinophilic Meningitis – Rat Lungworm Disease

Gerald Murphy, MD is an Infectious Disease Physician who treated a severe case of Angiostrongylus Eosinophilic Meningoencephalitis while working at Tripler Army Medical Center back in 2010. This led to his participation in the University of Hawaii's International Rat Lungworm Conference in 2011 and later mentored a Family Practice Resident in publishing the case and then co-authored a review of the diagnosis and treatment issues, both published in the Hawaii Journal of Medicine and Public Health.
