- Demonstrate improved skills and confidence with OMT that addresses complaints such as headaches, shoulder and foot pain.
- Explore different OMT techniques, such as BLT/MFR, articulatory, and muscle energy (DO participants).
- Feel more comfortable using their hands as a treatment tool to assist their patients with common complaints such as headaches, shoulder and foot pain (DO participants).
