II: Special Topics & Discussion (45)

Presentation: <u>How does equity relate to substance use prevention?</u> with Andreanne Britton Carboneau, ACBC Consulting

Andreanne Britton Carboneau, Equity Consultant, gave a presentation
with an overview of terms related to 1) understanding that equity is an
important component of effective substance use prevention and 2) that it
is imperative to integrate principles of equity into all of AHL's work. Please
review the linked presentation.

Overview: A portion of the presentation looked at definitions of Diversity, Inclusion, and Equity, social determinants of health, and root causes of disparate health outcomes, as well as data that demonstrates people with substance use disorders do experience disparate health outcomes.

- Populations more at risk for SUD include: adolescents, those with co-occuring mental or behavioural health disorders, those with disabilities, LGBTQ, and those whose primary language other than English. Data was cited for national, state and local indicators for these populations.
- People/populations are at risk for substance use, not because of who they are but what they experience.
- "Social determinants" of health for substance use include:
 - Societal and family stigma, lack of proper health care, socioeconomic status (including houselessness), homogeneous social networks, especially networks with an established culture of drug use, etc.

- Root Causes: Racism, Poverty, Ageism, Structural Inequities, Religious Prejudice, etc. *To facilitate change in health outcomes we need to focus on root causes.*
- Discussion: Examples of equity-centered approaches coalition members are doing in Lynnfield (there are many positive examples)
 - Schools: New Equity Initiative, ELL Curriculum Support, New Parent Engagement Specialist and outreach to parents, IEPs for Students with Disabilities, great METCO program and more.
 - Library: working to collect diverse set of books, audio books (visual disabilities), e-books, mindful of the ramp at the library
 - Senior center: Give a senior a buddy (hands on approach) to ease in joining the program-way of establishing a comfortable, supportive network
 - Faith Based-working to engage youth
 - YMCA working to not have technology be a barrier to using Y services. E.g. Pool sign-up requires an AP that is hard for some.
 - Rotary all clubs are offered training in DEI
