Smart lighting is the best lighting!





The 5 Lighting Principles of Responsible Outdoor Lighting

2 Targeted: Direct light so it falls only where it is needed. Use shielding and aiming to target the direction of the light beam.

1 use ful: use light only if it's needed. All lighting should have a clear purpose!

4 Controlled: use light only when it is needed use timers and motion detectors

5 warm colored: use warm color lights where possible. limit the amount of Blue-white light
