Main Plot Points

The Household of Leonato

Leonato is Hero's father. Beatrice is his niece. Antonio is Leonato's brother, though not Beatrice's father. Ursula and Margaret are Hero's waiting gentlewomen.

The Party of Don Pedro

Don Pedro, commonly referred to as the Prince, is friends with Leonato and arranges for his group to stay at Leonato's for a month at least. Don Pedro and his brother, Don John, have recently resolved a quarrel, but the concessions he had to make don't sit well with Don John. Borachio and Conrad are Don John's men. Claudio is young, earnest, and in love with Hero. Benedick rounds out the group.

BENEDICK AND BEATRICE

Benedick and Beatrice have known each other for a while and, although once they were fond of each other, they have long had only insults and witty jibes for each other. They claim to hate each other, but when their friends decide to match them up, it doesn't take much to turn their feelings to love—they simply devise ways to make their friend "accidentally" overhear a conversation about how much in love the other is with them.

DON JOHN'S PLOT(S)

Determined to sow chaos, Don John plots to break up Claudio's engagement to Hero. First he convinces Claudio that Don Pedro is trying to steal Hero for himself. When that fails, Borachio comes up with a plan to make it appear that Hero is entertaining a lover, when in fact it was Margaret who had a tryst with Borachio in Hero's room. But when Don Pedro and Claudio see the scene that Don John and Borachio set for them, they believe that Hero is unfaithful and decide to shame her at the wedding the next morning.

THE CURSED WEDDING

Claudio refuses to marry Hero, calling her unfaithful before the friar, her family, and others. Although she denies it and Beatrice backs her up, Leonato joins with Don Pedro and Claudio to rail against his daughter. The friar suggests they pretend Hero is dead upon Claudio's words, making her seem more innocent. Benedick stays with Beatrice, rather than following Don Pedro's group, and the two profess their love. He says he'll do anything she asks. She replies, "Kill Claudio." He balks at this, although in the end he agrees to challenge Claudio.

Toxic Family and Gender Dynamics

The words of men are believed over those of women. A father wishes his daughter dead rather than so disgraced. A daughter allows for terrible harm if she's lying. A friend grieves in powerless anger. It ends with the hallmarks of comedy—weddings and villains getting their due. But be aware that the road there is rough.

THE CONSTABULARY

Dogberry and **Verges** head up the local **watch**. They direct the watch to keep a special eye out at Leonato's house since the wedding is the next day. The watch overhears a drunk Borachio telling Conrad about the plot he helped Don John with, and they arrest Borachio and Conrad. Dogberry tries to bring them to Leonato, but only manages to annoy and confuse him. Eventually they end up before the **Sexton** who says that Hero has in fact been so disgraced, and sends them back to face Leonato.

ALL'S WELL THAT ENDS WELL

Hero having been proven innocent, Leonato first makes Claudio publicly mourn Hero at her ancestral tomb and declare her innocence, and then contrives another wedding to "his brother's son." It is, of course, Hero. Surprise! In front of everyone, Benedick asks Beatrice to marry him; she gets flustered and says no. They have a battle of wits, then agree that they will marry after all. THE END!

I HE END

The "Nothing" Much Ado Is About

As Benedick says, "There's a double meaning in that."

The first obvious interpretation of *nothing* is that the most dramatic conflict of the play centers on a scandal that never happened. The title serves as a summary of the action.

In Shakespeare's time, "nothing" would have been pronounced more like "noting," which becomes a pun on how the characters observe each other and create situations for others to observe. It seems like someone is always lurking, eavesdropping, creating and spreading rumors. If everyone minded their own business, a lot of the trouble could have been avoided.

Much Ado About Nothing is famously about the traditional roles and expectations of men and women. In Elizabethan slang, *nothing* (or *no thing*) refers to a woman's anatomy. In case you wondered what that kerfuffle at the wedding was all about.




SAMPHIRE SAVAGE (SECOND WATCH,
