*Assurance of Forgiveness

Human teaching and interpretation leads to anxiety and confusion, but divine revelation leads to wisdom and confidence. By what Jesus Christ reveals, the LORD's trust is seen.

The separation, the veil, between us and the LORD is removed to prove we are ready for what the LORD deems best.

Reading of the Scriptures

All Scripture lessons come from the Revised Common Lectionary. Prescribed lessons are <u>underlined</u>, with pastoral inserts to preserve the integrity of the passage.

Hear the Word of the Lord:

Exodus 34:29-35

34 29 Moses came down from Mount Sinai. As he came down from the mountain with the two tablets of the covenant in his hand, Moses did not know that the skin of his face shone because he had been talking with God. 30 When Aaron and all the Israelites saw Moses, the skin of his face was shining, and they were afraid to come near him.

31 But Moses called to them; and Aaron and all the leaders of the congregation returned to him, and Moses spoke with them. 32 Afterward all the Israelites came near, and he gave them in commandment all that the Lord had spoken with him on Mount Sinai. 33 When Moses had finished speaking with them, he put a veil on his face; 34 but whenever Moses went in before the Lord to speak with him, he would take the veil off, until he came out; and when he came out, and told the Israelites what he had been commanded, 35 the Israelites would see the face of Moses, that the skin of his face was shining; and Moses would put the veil on his face again, until he went in to speak with him.

2 Corinthians 3:1-18

3 ¹ Are we beginning to commend ourselves again? Surely we do not need, as some do, letters of recommendation to you or from you, do we? ² You yourselves are our letter, written on our hearts, to be known and read by all; 3 and you show that you are a letter of Christ, prepared by us, written not with ink but with the Spirit of the living God, not on tablets of stone but on tablets of human hearts. 4 Such is the confidence that we have through Christ toward God. ⁵ Not that we are competent of ourselves to claim anything as coming from us; our competence is from God, ⁶ who has made us competent to be ministers of a new covenant, not of letter but of spirit; for the letter kills, but the Spirit gives life. 7 Now if the ministry of death, chiseled in letters on stone tablets, came in glory so that the people of Israel could not gaze at Moses' face because of the glory of his face, a glory now set aside, 8 how much more will the ministry of the Spirit come in glory? 9 For if there was glory in the ministry of condemnation, much more does the ministry of justification abound in glory! 10 Indeed, what once had glory has lost its glory because of the greater glory; 11 for if what was set aside came through glory, much more has the permanent come in glory! 12 Since, then, we have such a hope, we act with great boldness, 13 not like Moses, who put a veil over his face to keep the people of Israel from gazing at the end of the glory that was being set aside. 14 But their minds were hardened. Indeed, to this very day, when they hear the reading of the old covenant, that same veil is still there, since only in Christ is it set aside. ¹⁵ Indeed, to this very day whenever Moses is read, a veil lies over their minds; 16 but when one turns to the Lord, the veil is removed. 17 Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom. ¹⁸ And all of us, with unveiled faces, seeing the glory of the Lord as though reflected in a mirror, are being

transformed into the same image from one degree of glory to another; for this comes from the Lord, the Spirit.

Luke 9:19-36

9 18 Once when Jesus was praying alone, with only the disciples near him, he asked them, "Who do the crowds say that I am?" 19 They answered, "John the Baptist; but others, Elijah; and still others, that one of the ancient prophets has arisen." ²⁰ He said to them, "But who do you say that I am?" Peter answered, "The Messiah of God." 21 He sternly ordered and commanded them not to tell anyone, ²² saying, "The Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, chief priests, and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised." 23 Then he said to them all, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me. ²⁴ For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will save it. ²⁵ What does it profit them if they gain the whole world, but lose or forfeit themselves? ²⁶ Those who are ashamed of me and of my words, of them the Son of Man will be ashamed when he comes in his glory and the glory of the Father and of the holy angels. ²⁷ But truly I tell you, there are some standing here who will not taste death before they see the kingdom of God." 28 Now about eight days after these sayings Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. 29 And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. 30 Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. 31 They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. 32 Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. ³³ Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah"—not knowing what he said. 34 While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. ³⁵ Then from the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" 36 When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.

This is the Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God!

Sermon Transfiguration Sunday

The Transfiguration of Christ, the event when Jesus revealed his divine essence, the full glory of the LORD before the disciples, is an event which prepares us to enter the Lenten season. A season of dedication, curiosity, and discovery about who it is we are following and taking direction from. What he plans on doing, and how open we are to receiving that plan no matter how outrageous and unbelievable it might seem. The disciples in Luke 9:19-36 had such misunderstanding and confusion while amid confessing his identity. What did being betrayed and killed by the leadership of the nation have to do with being the Messiah? Why did following him entailing taking up an object which represented something so oppressive and meant for death?

Perhaps it is a matter of perspective on our end, when we traditionally give up attachments in this life for the sake of spiritual awareness. The idea of sacrifice does in fact allow room to be made to accept and embrace that divine identity among us, but perhaps there is also more which can be done? The taking on of practices, virtues, and ideas which allow us to explore beyond what we know to be true. Instead of cowering and believing that the presence of the divine means we are lower than dirt, it instead empowers us to see what we can become because of divine love.

That is what St. Paul focuses on in 2 Corinthians 3:1-18.

While speaking to the believers about what makes him, and his associates, affective leaders and teachers he admits there is nothing that makes them special. They are not superhuman, have secret 'insider' knowledge that gives them an advantage, or are more competent than any others. It is the removal of the veil which allows them to speak and proclaim what they do. The veil is used to express the work of the LORD which we cannot do for ourselves, that outside power which must happen to set us on the right course.

Many Christian traditions have the idea of the veil in their practices and worship services. Often described as something with covers something precious, marks it out as holy, and indicates something to be taken seriously. But it also has the secondary effect of showing something to be untouchable, meant only for certain people to approach, which is the opposite of what Christ intends. He is there to show how present the LORD is in our lives, where divine life can be experienced, and can be freely accessed without fear or hesitation. The truth of the gospel being learned, the divine essence of Christ being shown, is a sign of trust that we are ready to accept and internalize such understandings.

At one point, the veil was necessary to protect and to guide. Like what is spoken of in Exodus 34:29-35.

The people of Israel at this point had been without their God, without knowledge of God, for about 300-400 years while in slavery in Egypt. Their time in the wilderness was a period of learning, preparation, and gradual understanding and acceptance. To have Moses come down with the commandments with his face shining a divine afterglow might have confused and terrified the people without understanding. He veiled himself so the people might be taught gradually, so they might learn without distraction. Their eventual crossing into the Promised Land was a divine decree saying, "You are ready." Experiencing the divine essence of Christ, hearing the gospel truth, is a sign from the LORD to us saying, "You are ready." Moses' shining, Christ's glory, is what is made available to us when we embrace this process.

The LORD has thinned and removed the veil, the separation, and given revelation to us because our knowledge and acceptance of it will be for our benefit and healing. As well as for those who surround and look to us as well. The disciples were asked to keep quiet about all these things because the world would not understand yet, until these things came to pass. Only in the Crucifixion, in the Resurrection, will everything make sense and ready the believers to true change and living. The time we wait for it to happen, our time in the wilderness, is something by which we can prepare and know the one who will bring all this about. To see what he is capable of, giving for us to embrace, so our trust can be focused on that which truly matters. The LORD is readying us for the greatest event in human history, deeming us ready to witness it, and knowing it will change us for the better.

You wish us to experience all the highs and lows of Jesus' works in this world so we might understand how grand your salvation is! Everything we are given by Jesus is a sign that you deem us ready to accept to become more like you. By Jesus offering his broken body, in the formed loaf, and in his spilled blood, in the poured cup, he shows the preciousness of life when offered in love to another. By accepting this gift we take on the responsibility of demonstrating this lesson, and articulating the mystery of our faith:

Christ has died, Christ has risen, Christ will come again!

In this table, LORD, you pull back the veil and separation between you and your creation. You invite us to dine, commune, with you and sit together for mutual relationship. May all we receive prepare us, and reveal opportunity, to experience the sacrifice and healing of Jesus Christ in all parts of our lives. **Amen.**
