The Nicene Creed

On June 19, 325 AD some 300 bishops and teachers from around the Roman Empire met in Nicaea (modern-day Iznik, Turkey) in a first ever ecumenical council to discuss issues of the Christian faith. The product is the following creed, which is still in active use in many forms:

We believe in one God, the Father Almighty, Maker of all things visible and invisible.

And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, begotten of the Father the onlybegotten; that is, of the essence of the Father, God of God, Light of Light, true God of true God, begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father; by whom all things were made both in heaven and on earth; who for us men, and for our salvation, came down and was incarnate and was made man; he suffered,

and the third day he rose again, ascended into heaven; from thence he shall come to judge the quick and the dead.

And in the Holy Ghost.

Amen.

Reading of the Scriptures

Hear the Word of the Lord:

Colossians 1:15-23

1 ¹⁵ He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation; ¹⁶ for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. ¹⁷ He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. ¹⁸ He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. ¹⁹ For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, ²⁰ and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross. ²¹ And you who were once estranged and hostile in mind, doing evil deeds, ²² he has now reconciled in his fleshly body through death, so as to present you holy and blameless and irreproachable before him— ²³ provided that you continue securely established and steadfast in the faith, without shifting from the hope promised by the gospel that you heard, which has been proclaimed to every creature under heaven. I, Paul, became a servant of this gospel.

Ephesians 2:1-22

2 ¹ You were dead through the trespasses and sins ² in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. ³ All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else. ⁴ But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us ⁵ even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ—by grace you have been saved— ⁶ and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, ⁵ so that in the ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. ⁶ For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God— ⁶ not the result of works, so that no one may boast. ¹ or we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life. ¹ So then, remember that at one time you Gentiles by birth, called "the uncircumcision" by those who are called "the

circumcision"—a physical circumcision made in the flesh by human hands— ¹² remember that you were at that time without Christ, being aliens from the commonwealth of Israel, and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. 13 But now in Christ Jesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. ¹⁴ For he is our peace; in his flesh he has made both groups into one and has broken down the dividing wall, that is, the hostility between us. 15 He has abolished the law with its commandments and ordinances, that he might create in himself one new humanity in place of the two, thus making peace, ¹⁶ and might reconcile both groups to God in one body through the cross, thus putting to death that hostility through it. ¹⁷ So he came and proclaimed peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near; 18 for through him both of us have access in one Spirit to the Father. ¹⁹ So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are citizens with the saints and also members of the household of God, ²⁰ built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, with Christ Jesus himself as the cornerstone. ²¹ In him the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; ²² in whom you also are built together spiritually into a dwelling place for God.

Luke 1:1-4

1 Since many have undertaken to set down an orderly account of the events that have been fulfilled among us, ² just as they were handed on to us by those who from the beginning were eyewitnesses and servants of the word, ³ I too decided, after investigating everything carefully from the very first, to write an orderly account for you, most excellent Theophilus, ⁴ so that you may know the truth concerning the things about which you have been instructed.

This is the Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God!

Sermon Nicea Sunday

There are certain events and celebrations in our faith which are so central to what we believe and who we are: Easter (the day of the Resurrection), Christmas (the day of the Incarnation), Pentecost (the day of rebirth by the divine spirit), and many others which the Christian calendar is built around. But there are also many other celebrations and events which are lost in the shuffle of history, overlooked in their significance, but are also wholly important to who we are and why we believe. This year marks a significant celebration to anyone of the Christian faith, if they choose to recognize it for what it is. On June 19, 325 AD some 300 bishops and teachers from around the Roman Empire met in Nicaea (modern-day Iznik, Turkey) in a first ever ecumenical council to discuss issues of the Christian faith. The product is the following creed, which is still in active use in some form:

We believe in one God, the Father Almighty, Maker of all things visible and invisible.

And in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of God, begotten of the Father the onlybegotten; that is, of the essence of the Father, God of God, Light of Light, true God of

true God, begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father; by whom all things were made both in heaven and on earth; who for us men, and for our salvation, came down and was incarnate and was made man; he suffered, and the third day he rose again, ascended into heaven; from thence he shall come to judge the quick and the dead. And in the Holy Ghost.

During the first three centuries of the Christian faith it grew and spread out of the region of Judea to throughout the Roman Empire. A persecuted and misunderstood faith which challenged the conventions of Roman life, and life in general. Revealed through the Jewish people and culminating in the teachings and works of Jesus of Nazareth- later called 'the Christ', the anointed one. It was in 306 AD when General Constantine won a decisive battle to secure the Roman emperorship, and established Christianity as a recognized religion in the Empire. It was not that Constantine 'legalized' Christianity but gave legal and recognized status to the Christians and their practices. It allowed them to build churches, participate in public life, and even receive tax-exempt status like many of the pagan institutions. But it also revealed a widening gap within the faith, between those who debated whether Jesus Christ was truly divine or merely human. Those who held the latter position, called Arians, said that Jesus was a created being subordinate to God and rejected the idea of the Trinity.

Now, it could have been pragmatism on Constantine's part, or a desire for divine truth, which made him call for all the Christian leaders to gather. Pragmatism, because the faith being used to unite the empire was at risk of being broken; or faith, because Constantine was baptized as a Christian during his reign. But the call was put out and all the bishops and teachers gathered to discuss these issues and call upon the Holy Spirit to reveal what the LORD desired them to have. It was a desire and yearning I feel is reflected directly from the Gospels, in Luke 1:1-4. The story of Jesus, the teaching of the fellowship, was not done haphazardly. There were many who were there to see these miracles, hear these teachings, and witness what the divine was revealing through the person of Jesus Christ. All of these told their story, they were collected and became part of what united the people together during periods of persecution and hardship. When it seemed like the world was against them, they rested in the hope that the LORD, through their faith, would enable them to live.

Colossians 1:15-23 and Ephesians 2:1-22 are both letters of St. Paul to the various Christian communities of his time. Reminding them under hardship, controversy, and confusion what the reason is for the faith they have. Before any problems came their way it was Jesus who was in their midst, to bring them to belief, and show them what was most important in this life. By his intervention came the knowledge of sin and the realization that a life based solely on individual desire, control, and power was a meaningless life destined for self-destruction. But in seeing and experiencing the warmth of the teachings of Jesus, the effects of his works, one could see the divine in a way which restored harmony and peace within those struggling. Jesus provides the foundation and assurance needed to understand what is true and capable, and what is

meaningless and destructive. And this is what enabled our faithful ancestors to resist times of persecution and subversion of the faith, because of what they experienced their LORD giving them first.

That Nicene council sought unity for the fellowships under their care, and a desire to understand where the LORD was leading his people. Arianism attempted to do this by denying who Jesus was as the outstretched arm of the Father, and now is the dustbin of history along with other human-made efforts at unity. The creed was a result of faithful service, striving for truth, and acceptance of what the Holy Spirit had to teach. Nicaea was not an attempt to bring unity, it found unity as it truly enters this world in our most uncertain times. That is why the creed endures after 1700 years, and why it remains a statement many return to when the work of the Church becomes muddled or confused. For the fellowship it is a handy reminder of how the LORD works, so we might keep it with us for those times of change and doubt.

We might wonder what a 1700-year-old statement of faith from an ancient past impacts what we do today? It is because those ancient Christians were more like us than we care to admit; had the same struggles, doubts, factions, and arguments we have within the Church right now. There is a famous story from Nicaea involving the teacher of Arianism, Arius, and the bishop St. Nicolas. We know St. Nicolas as being the patron saint of children, from where the image of Santa Claus comes from. Well, during that meeting Arius made a comment which angered St Nicolas causing him to get up and slap Arius across the face! It is shocking to us but also fits with some of the arguments and rhetoric we see in our world today. Nicaea was not filled with superhuman teachers and leaders, they were human and had struggles just like us. But it was how the Holy Spirit pulled them, allowed them to set aside their struggles, in pursuit of what was better. That is what is available to us, is the solution to all the Church schisms and controversies, and issues in our world right now. The LORD governs and reigns in all situations, and the gospel is good news in all situations and circumstances. If only we place that first and foremost in all we do, striving toward divine truth and understanding, the LORD will bless us with unity and give a solution to our strained relationships and problems. Unity does not come from right doctrine, teachings, or stories- but from the LORD. And will use it to create a true, powerful people who will answer the needs of creation.
