Hear the Word of the Lord:

Genesis 11:1-9

nigrated from the east, they came upon a plain in the land of Shinar and settled there.

And they said to one another, "Come, let us make bricks, and burn them thoroughly."

And they had brick for stone, and bitumen for mortar. Then they said, "Come, let us build ourselves a city, and a tower with its top in the heavens, and let us make a name for ourselves; otherwise we shall be scattered abroad upon the face of the whole earth."

And the Lord came down to see the city and the tower, which mortals had built.

And the Lord said, "Look, they are one people, and they have all one language; and this is only the beginning of what they will do; nothing that they propose to do will now be impossible for them. Come, let us go down, and confuse their language there, so that they will not understand one another's speech."

So the Lord scattered them abroad from there over the face of all the earth, and they left off building the city.

Therefore it was called Babel, because there the Lord confused the language of all the earth; and from there the Lord scattered them abroad over the face of all the earth.

Romans 8:1-17 8 ¹ There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus. ² For the

law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus has set you free from the law of sin and of death. ³ For God has done what the law, weakened by the flesh, could not do: by sending his own Son in the likeness of sinful flesh, and to deal with sin, he condemned sin in the flesh, 4 so that the just requirement of the law might be fulfilled in us, who walk not according to the flesh but according to the Spirit. ⁵ For those who live according to the flesh set their minds on the things of the flesh, but those who live according to the Spirit set their minds on the things of the Spirit. ⁶ To set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace. ⁷ For this reason the mind that is set on the flesh is hostile to God; it does not submit to God's law—indeed it cannot, 8 and those who are in the flesh cannot please God. 9 But you are not in the flesh; you are in the Spirit, since the Spirit of God dwells in you. Anyone who does not have the Spirit of Christ does not belong to him. 10 But if Christ is in you, though the body is dead because of sin, the Spirit is life because of righteousness. 11 If the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead dwells in you, he who raised Christ from the dead will give life to your mortal bodies also through his Spirit that dwells in you. ¹² So then, brothers and sisters, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh—13 for if you live according to the flesh, you will die; but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live. ¹⁴ For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. ¹⁵ For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!" 16 it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, ¹⁷ and if children, then heirs, heirs of God

and joint heirs with Christ—if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

John 14:1-14

14 ¹ "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me. ² In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? ³ And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, so that where I am, there you may be also. ⁴ And you know the way to the place where I am going." ⁵ Thomas said to him, "Lord, we do not know where you are going. How can we know the way?" ⁶ Jesus said to him, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. ⁷ If you know me, you will know my Father also. From now on you do know him and have seen him." 8 Philip said to him, "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied." 9 Jesus said to him, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'? 10 Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me? The words that I say to you I do not speak on my own; but the Father who dwells in me does his works. 11 Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; but if you do not, then believe me because of the works themselves. 12 Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. ¹³ I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. 14 If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it.

Sermon Pentecost Sunday

The day of Pentecost is often referred to as the 'birthday of the Church', when the LORD established the believers in Christ with power to proclaim and act in his name. It is an event which reminds Christians what we can, and cannot, do because of the Holy Spirit. What needs to happen in our lives to allow the divine wind to come and carry us where we need to be. It is also the inauguration of a new season in the Church, with the season of Pentecost reminding the Church what it needs to be because of the Holy Spirit acting. We are given divine power, but not for reasons why others are given power. How we are empowered, what we are promised, and what we set out to do demonstrates how we have allowed the teachings of Jesus Christ to capture our hearts. Especially since there is so much already vying to have that place for themselves.

One of the effects of Pentecost was the ability for the disciples to speak, and understand, each other and other languages. Since Jews would have been in Jerusalem from all over the known world to commemorate another holy day: Shavuot, the celebration of when the LORD established the covenant with the nation of Israel; there was a large gathering of people with different backgrounds and understandings.

In giving the Laws of Moses, Israel was established as a people and nation to serve the LORD. In giving the Holy Spirit, the LORD was establishing the Church as a people to serve and give knowledge of the LORD in the same manner. The power given was the power of relation, the ability to connect with other people for the purpose of passing divine knowledge. It echoes the events which took place in primeval history in Genesis 11:1-9, when the LORD confused the languages of humans and scattered them over the face of the earth.

In reading that story, it might be easy to think the LORD went a little overboard with his judgement. For the crime of working together the LORD confused people and scattered them abroad? To understand the story, we must see this even as a judgement and not a punishment. It is meant as an attention-grabbing event addressing human ego, arrogance, and confusion. Within the story the dominant culture would have been the Sumerians, one of the first people groups in that era to establish a formal, organized, and complex civilization. Their belief taught that the realm of the gods were so separated from humans, and the gods would not become involved unless provoked- hence building a tower to the heavens. But the fact the LORD came down to see what was happening showed this belief to be inaccurate, and that way of thinking faulty. Harmony and cooperation between humans would not happen because of a dominate culture or force of belief. The scattering of the nations demonstrated the LORD's power to control the world and everything in it. To show that human efforts alone would not get the job done, and do not need to be done to have the LORD's attention. It is already had but has been ignored.

That is the confidence Jesus wants his disciples to have and to hold, with his promises in John 14:1-14. The guarantee that the way to the LORD is not based on how powerful, capable, or crafty we are. We are not dependent on another human to know and experience what the LORD desires of us. It is a clear sign that Jesus is the way, truth, and life and whenever we see him we will know what is right. And whenever we see the example lived out we will know that person is there to teach what the LORD desires. Again, a sign that the LORD is already present and fills this world and our lives- but are we truly searching for and accepting the way he chooses to appear? Do we desire signs and assurances for what we want, or for what will allow us to be the Church needed?

St. Paul speaks in Romans 8:1-17 what the Holy Spirit does for the believer, and for the Church. The Holy Spirit is there as a demonstrator what the LORD makes possible, helps us to recognize what the LORD does, and gives us the ability to reciprocate what we are shown. He is also there as the great unifier of peoples, the being and force that will connect us together and allow harmony and cooperation. It is that "spirit of adoption" which unites us, because we are all shown what we equally need to be a child of God. In Greco-Roman culture, to be adopted meant to enter into a formal agreement with the whole of the family. To accept what this family was about, who was in charge, what was expected, and what was valued above all else. And in the same

way the family accepted that individual as a full and equal member deserving of the same protections as themselves, no exception. It was a recognition that each party needed to give toward being whole and complete. When believers are adopted into the Church we each recognize and accept we each have needs which the LORD meets, and each one needs that divine touch in order to be here. When we look at others we should see ourselves, one whose place is not guaranteed by ability or privilege but by need. On our own we cannot be here, but the LORD gives that Spirit so we can recognize the needs of our lives and where they truly come from.

The power of the Holy Spirit gives ability to know and relate, to see others as the LORD sees them so we might act in the truest divine sense. We know the Gospel of Jesus Christ can meet the needs of the most hurting soul, and how we bring it to them will show what our motives for doing so are. Are we doing so because we recognize the hurt in their lives, the needs they are deprived of, and the assurance of the LORD's closeness? Or just to fill some quota, accomplish some project, or just to get people to fill our pews? To live by the Spirit, in the truest sense of the word, is to demonstrate the true order and reality of this world emphasized by the teachings of Jesus. And then help others to recognize that truth where they are and with what they know. It is about building others up in this promise and assurance and making them better because they can see the world in a different way than before. The Church is there to set others free from domineering beliefs so they might see and live the way they were meant to since the very beginning. All in this world serves the LORD no matter what, and the Spirit guarantees all will serve him again eventually.
