

Guide to Operating the Possession Arrow at the Basketball Score Table

1. Understanding the Role of the Possession Arrow

- 1. **Purpose**: The possession arrow indicates which team will get the ball on the next jump ball.
- 2. **Responsibility**: Usually, the clock operator manages the possession arrow, but sometimes this task can be handled by the person doing the scorebook.
- 3. **Referee Communication**: The possession arrow must be visible to the referee to confirm which team has possession on the next jump ball.

2. Setting Up the Possession Arrow

1. Check the Lights:

- The arrow device has lights that indicate possession, but the lights may not be visible from your position.
- Observe the light direction as you toggle the switch—whichever way you flip the switch will determine which team has the next possession.

2. Start of the Game:

- o Each team begins the game shooting at the basket opposite their bench.
- o In the first half, align the arrow toward the basket that each team is shooting at to show who will have the next possession.

3. Tracking Possession During the Game

1. Initial Possession:

- o If the white team, for example, gains possession after the jump ball, they will have the first possession.
- o The opposing team (e.g., red team) should be indicated as having the next possession by lighting up the arrow in their basket direction.

2. Flip the Arrow on Jump Balls:

- A jump ball occurs when both teams simultaneously hold the ball and there is no clear possession.
- Flip the possession arrow to alternate which team will get the ball on the next jump ball.

3. Updating After Possession Changes:

- o After each jump ball, wait until the ball is inbounded to flip the arrow.
- The referee and scorebook will track which team has the next possession.

4. Monitoring and Adjusting

1. Quarter and Timeout Checks:

 Each quarter and during timeouts, referees will check the score, the book, and the possession arrow alignment.

2. Referee Signals:

 Referees may carry a token to track possession and will switch it between pockets for each change.



o If you're off on possession, they may signal you to adjust the arrow. A hand gesture from the referee may indicate it's time to switch the arrow direction.

3. Error Correction:

 Don't worry if you miss a flip; referees can assist in correcting the arrow direction.

5. Wrapping Up

1. Final Checks:

Ensure the possession arrow is correct at the end of each quarter.
