

Scholarship and Research

Earlier this year, Dr. Rusty Ward at Francis Marion University published "The Effects of Nonresponse and Follow-up Mailings on a Citizen Survey of Law Enforcement Services" in the peer-reviewed journal, *Police Practice and Research: An International Journal*.

This study examined differences between responders vs. non-responders, and early vs. late responders, in a mailed survey of citizen satisfaction about law enforcement, and whether survey estimates changed with follow-up mailings. While follow-up mailings increased the number of returns, the characteristics and attitudes of responders changed very little with additional mailings. The findings imply that criminal justice scholars and law enforcement agencies that conduct citizen satisfaction surveys might consider increasing the initial sample size to boost statistical precision and power, or targeting unlikely respondents to reduce nonresponse bias, instead of investing in costly follow-up mailings.





Developing a Framework for Assessing Identity Development, Retention and Success of STEM Social and Behavioral Scientist (STEM-SBS): Sociology as a Case

In July 2022, Catherine Mobley (Clemson University) and Chloe Baird (Tufts Medical Center) were awarded a \$867,066 grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF) for their project "Developing a Framework for Assessing Identity Development, Retention and Success of STEM Social and Behavioral Scientists: The Case of Sociology" The NSF's Education and Human Resources Core Research program is sponsoring this award and funds fundamental "curiosity-driven" basic research on STEM education.

There is a growing interest on the part of several organizations, in recognizing and fostering applied sociology. Also, the (NSF, American Sociological Association and other organizations have called for more research on the status of the social sciences in general, and sociology in particular, within the STEM research enterprise. This three-year project is one of the first to empirically examine identity development of sociologists and addresses the growing need for trained STEM-SBS researchers who can address complex societal challenges. In this project, Catherine and Chloe will investigate:

- Why sociology students and professionals choose to pursue a sociology degree and career;
- How sociology students and practicing sociologists conceptualize their professional and science identities;
- What factors contribute to or hinder retention, success, and identity development in sociology;
- How other social identities (e.g., race, ethnicity, gender, etc.) intersect with and influence the development and enactment of professional and science identities; and
- How competing demands and differential access to opportunities shape entry and retention of a diverse student population into sociology.

The study is among the first to investigate professional identity of sociologists. Catherine and Chloe will investigate pathways of interest of professionals at all levels by interviewing undergraduate students, graduate students and practicing sociologists in a variety of STEM-SBS research careers. They will also interview stakeholders in sociology to learn more about key issues pertaining to career pathways in the field and sociology as a STEM discipline.

Catherine and Chloe look forward to sharing their results as the project unfolds. If you are interested in or currently investigating identity development of sociologists or social scientists, Catherine and Chloe would love to hear from you!

Dr. Danielle Lewis has joined Newberry College as an Assistant Professor of Sociology. Dr. Lewis completed her Ph.D. in 2015 at the University of South Carolina. Her experimental research examined power and social values within exchange networks. She has published in sociological journals, presented at national conferences, and served as a judge at CUSSS. Dr. Lewis is a member of the American Sociological Association and the South Carolina Sociological Association. Prior to joining Newberry College in a full-time position, Dr. Lewis was an instructor at the University of South Carolina and an adjunct instructor at several schools, including Newberry College.

Food Research Symposium @ Clemson

Clemson University College of Behavioral, Social and Health Sciences hosted a three-day Food Summit and Food Research conference on Clemson campus from September 13-15th in partnership with Aramark Food Services, Clemson University College of Agriculture, Forestry and Life Sciences, the Clemson University Watt Center, and with support and funding from USDA-NIFA.

The focus of the three-day event was on food systems and Farm to Institution and included a Food Summit focused on building farm businesses through local sourcing and procurement, and a Food Forward Research Symposium. The topic of food and nutrition security was examined, including a presentation on university food insecurity given by SCSA member Dr. Catherine Mobley. The 3-day event featured several farmer panels with farmers from the Southern Region who shared, from their vantage points, farm stressors, barriers and needs to build farm businesses; as well as a session focused on **BIPOC** Sourcing and Supplier Diversity. USDA South Carolina Director of Rural Development, Dr. Saundra Glover provided a plenary address on her vision for rural development in South Carolina. Dr. Alton Thompson, Executive Director of 1890 Research Directors was the keynote speaker and addressed the role of land grant institutions and socially disadvantaged farmers in sustainable food systems. Dr. Kim Niewolny, Director of Food Systems and Community Transformation shared the impressive food systems work being done at Virginia Tech. Farmers from the Gullah Farmers' Alliance also presented at the Summit. South Carolina Sociological Association members, Dr. Leslie Hossfeld and Dr. Catherine Mobley spoke at the event. Sociologists from Clemson, Virginia Tech, Furman, and NC A&T also gave presentations.

Over three hundred people attended the three-day event, including farmers from the southern region, providing rich networking opportunities and information sharing for all participants. You can read the <u>full article about the symposium</u> on the CU website.

Like Research, Like Guitar Ken Horne, B.S. Sociology Major, Clemson University

I am a fourth-year Sociology major at Clemson University. This summer, I had the opportunity to be a Research Assistant with my professor, Dr. Catherine Mobley, on a project funded by the National Science Foundation. Together, we are using the sociological perspective to explore the experiences of first-generation Black students in engineering. Being a member of this research team has been one of my first in-depth experiences with research. Early on, it occurred to me that there are definite parallels between engaging in research and playing the guitar – one of my favorite things to do when I am not working on school assignments!

I try to practice music several times a week, strumming tunes on my MAB Speed of Light guitar. Every night after playing, I think about the lick or riff I am working on. Then, when I play the next day, I may change the picking attack, adding that little nuance of sound I missed the day before. Soon, I hear a new tune emerging or a sound I hadn't considered before. The possibilities are endless.

How does that relate to my research? After I finish my research for the day, I often think about the articles I have read or review my research notes. I realize I may need to examine a theme more deeply or I see a need for a different approach. So, I will change my methods and use other modifiers and keywords. Eventually, I get the shape of the idea I am seeking.

With those weekend breaks from research, it is often tough to get the brain to focus on the project again the following Monday. The lack of focus could last a day or just a few hours, as with any song I have been working on. If I don't play the guitar for a few days, I find it difficult to focus and replicate what I had produced the previous week. It takes some time to strum the guitar and get back into the groove, similar to my research project when I've had to step away for a few days.



Just like playing guitar, research is a process accomplished one step or chord at a time. We can't learn new songs in one day and have them sonically pleasant, especially if we have an audience who knows that music-making consistency is a must. Similarly, research takes practice, and the findings must make sense when presented to a well-versed audience, particularly those familiar with the research methods. If not, we produce results that aren't fully grounded in the data, or we may lessen our chances of getting funding for our research. The same goes for playing guitar: a terrible performance may lead to no audience, no growth, and sometimes, no money.

Perhaps one of the most important lessons I have learned from guitar playing and conducting research is that PERFECT PRACTICE MAKES PERFECT! Guitar playing and engaging in research are both crafts engaging various audiences for different purposes. I look forward to my continued lessons as I move forward in my guitar hobby and career as a sociological researcher!

Her 6 weeks of research, guided by Dr. Daniel Cooper and other mentors at USC-Columbia, resulted in a preliminary study titled "Exploring Parental Messages about Race, Gender and Sexuality for African American LGBTQ Young Adults." For this summer project, Ms. Jackson conducted qualitative in-depth interviews with four African American participants who identified as being part of the LGBTQ community.

We are very proud of Ms. Jackson's accomplishments in this research mentor program and look forward to her furthering her studies in higher education after graduation from Morris College this year.
