Call your Representative - Vote NO on HB 3085 and HB 3447 HB 3085 removes all criminal penalties for possession of any amount of marijuana and automatically expunges any criminal record for someone convicted of a similar offense.

HB 3447 reduces the penalty for possession of ALL drugsfrom a felony to a misdemeanor for possession of 40 Oxycodone, 5 Ecstasy pills, 40 LSD tablets, less than 3 grams of Heroin, Fentanyl, Meth, Ketamine, less than 4 grams of Morphine, Pentazocine, less than 5 grams of Cocaine, and ANY AMOUNT of other substances. Pot smokers won't get vaccine priority

Under Illinois' vaccination Phase 1B+ — which took effect on Feb. 25 but hasn't been implemented locally — <u>smokers are among those prioritized for vaccine shots</u>. However, Jordan Abudayyeh, a spokeswoman for Gov. J.B. Pritzker, said that phase doesn't include pot tokers because the state is following guidance put forth by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control. While Pritzker was instrumental in leading Illinois' push to fully legalize marijuana, **cannabis is still prohibited on the federal level.**

Biden White House Sandbags Staffers for Pot Use

Dozens of young White House staffers have been suspended, asked to resign, or placed in a remote work program due to past marijuana use, frustrating staffers who were pleased by initial indications from the Biden administration that recreational use of cannabis would not be immediately disqualifying for would-be personnel, according to three people familiar with the situation. Related: Five people are no longer employed at the White House, while additional staffers are working remotely. In many of the cases involving staffers who are no longer employed, additional security factors were in play, including for some hard drug use, the official said.

Prevalence of driving under the influence of cannabis in the U.S

Christopher P. Salas-Wright and colleagues analyzed data from the National Survey on Drug Use and Health using a sample of adults interviewed between 2016 and 2018. They find that 4.5 percent of US adults nationwide report they drove under the influence of marijuana, ranging from 3 percent in Texas to 8.4 percent in Oregon.

But the percentages increase among frequent and daily users: **57 percent of daily users and 63.8 percent of those with a cannabis use disorder drove under the influence of the drug**. The latter also were more likely to be under the influence of other drugs, to take part in illegal behavior, and to suffer from mental distress.
