



Antelope, bears, elk, lynx, bighorn sheep, wolverines, wolves and other wide-ranging or migratory animals travel from one important habitat area to another through wildlife movement corridors—the lands in between our best habitats. wildlife refuges, wilderness areas, and roadless areas—without conserving the ecological links that tie them together—tragically creates "islands" of habitat. These islands of habitat may eventually lead to the loss of local populations of wildlife, as they become isolated from each other. This is why habitat fragmentation has been acknowledged as a primary cause of species decline throughout the world.

American Wildlands is known as the "wildlife corridors" group because of our efforts to use the best science and computer technology to identify and conserve critical wildlife movement corridors throughout the Northern Rockies. We are thrilled to share our information with a diversity of conservation interests: Montana Fish, Wildlife and Parks; Montana Department of Transportation; U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service; U.S. Forest Service; Bureau of Land Management; Western Governors Association; county planners; The Nature Conservancy; Yellowstone to Yukon Conservation Initiative; Heart of the Rockies land trusts; and many more organizations. Our on-the-ground efforts to maintain these critical habitat connections complements the work of local, state, regional and national groups that focus on conserving the region's large core habitats.

This year, American Wildlands is celebrating thirty years of conservation programs and accomplishments. Over those thirty years, the primary focus of the organization has remained the same—to use science, respectful advocacy, community engagement and the most cutting edge conservation tools as the foundation of our efforts to protect the vast wild lands and abundant wildlife of the west. During the last fifteen years, we have focused on the Northern Rockies. Working from our offices in Bozeman, Missoula, and Dillon, American Wildlands has a staff of eleven with a combined 80+ years of conservation experience, and a Board of Directors that live throughout the region.

Ultimately, we measure our success by the ability for wildlife to travel and live throughout the Northern Rockies, as well as the ability for local people to make deliberate choices about managing their land in a manner that conserves the abundant wildlife and big, open landscapes of the region.

Floating on air currents like swimmers carried by waves, they played in the wind for an hour, at times acting like a single, pulsating organism, before finally settling on a large tree.
