RAVES

Rapid Assessment Visual Expeditions

(RAVEs) produce a comprehensive assessment and portrait of a timely conservation issue and threat in a short period of time. The gathering of some of the world's best conservation photojournalists, along with environmental and cultural writers, videographers, bloggers and other storytellers, draws the attention of local, national and international media to the issue. Some of iLCP's most recent and well-known RAVEs have addressed:

- Great Bear Rainforest (coastal British Columbia, Canada), which highlighted the risks from Canadian tar sands related oil tankers;
- Chesapeake Bay Watershed (spans six mid-Atlantic states in the U.S.), which highlighted the importance of The Chesapeake Clean Water and Ecosystem Act;
- Aysen Region of Chilean Patagonia, which supported campaigns to stop development of five dams on two stillwild rivers);
- Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula, which underscored the threat of deforestation. and tourism on protected areas, important unprotected areas, and specific flagship

Also in 2013, iLCP has plans for a marinebased RAVE in the Danajon Bank region of the Philippines. This area is a rare and threatened double-barrier reef system. Working with Project Seahorse, iLCP will coordinate the photographers, deliver communications products for various audiences, and produce a photo exhibition for Project Seahorse to use in venues throughout Asia.



Special Projects

In addition to iLCP's photographic expeditions, we leverage our Fellowship's expertise in ways that further enhance and expand the impact and influence of our conservation mission.

Leveraging Fellowship Projects: Each iLCP photographer is personally engaged in projects other than iLCP's photo expeditions. These projects address the major ecosystem types and conservation issues around the planet. From mountain to marine ecosystems, from the tropics to the Arctic, they address deforestation and dams, mining and drilling, climate change and community development, endangered species and biological corridors, cultural erosion and economic sustainability. This places iLCP in the enviable position of being able to leverage the power of our Fellows' collective conservation reach. We work with our photographers to promote their projects to iLCP's network of partners, funders and media contacts.

Specialized Field Expeditions: These expeditions do not fit the established format of a RAVE or Tripod, but they still enlist our story-telling expertise in a conservation project or issue. For instance, we can help a long-term conservation research project tell its story, or contract with a Foundation to provide our services to its grantees. Given the breadth of our photographers' experience, we can apply iLCP's expertise to a wide variety of unique conservation opportunities anywhere in the world.

TRIPODS

Tripod expeditions involve a single photographer, and increasingly a videographer, who produces powerful imagery in support of a long-term, ongoing conservation program, project, or campaign.

Mesoamerican Reef—Honduras: In 2012, iLCP worked with the Honduran-based Center for Marine Ecology on three Tripod expeditions. These expeditions captured—in both images and video—the story of innovative community-driven efforts to conserve marine biodiversity and provide sustainable livelihoods in the Honduran Mesoamerican Reef region, including the Moskitio Coast, off-shore cays, and Honduran Bay Islands. Our visual media products were presented to the President of Honduras, and helped convince him to make new major marine conservation announcements.

Greater Yellowstone Coalition Exhibition— Wyoming: In 2011, iLCP partnered with the Greater Yellowstone Coalition (GYC) to document the natural heritage of, and threats facing, the Absaroka-Beartooth Front (bordering Yellowstone National Park to the east). GYC is using these images to engage audiences critical to convincing federal land management agencies to protect this region. To that end, GYC and iLCP are planning a photo exhibition in the renowned Buffalo Bill Historical Center in Cody, Wyoming.



iLCP was founded on the premise that top-quality imagery adds great value and effectiveness to conservation projects or campaigns. Often many NGOs and other conservation interests do not understand the degree of impact top-quality imagery can have on their work. iLCP works to increase the international conservation community's effectiveness by advancing a series of conservation story-telling techniques.

Conservation Photography Workshops: iLCP is developing a training program that explains the "why" and "how" of using top-quality imagery to advance conservation. This workshop has three components, and can be adapted to any programmatic or geographic context.

- Reference examples of how high-quality imagery have been used to bolster, if not ensure, the success of a conservation effort.
- Explain what makes a good conservation story-telling image (still or video).
- Provide advice and strategies for how high-quality imagery, and the story behind collecting the imagery, can be used to advance conservation

iLCP Speakers Bureau: In fall 2012, iLCP will launch a Speakers Bureau to facilitate our Fellows serving as speakers at conferences, annual meetings, etc. This is a great opportunity to promote a strong conservation message through amazing imagery with fascinating storylines—to a staff, Board, membership, or the general public.

Themed Photo Exhibitions and Publications: Through themed photo exhibitions and publications featuring the collective work of iLCP's photographers, iLCP can stir the public's appreciation for, concern about, and action toward conservation. Given the breadth of iLCP's work over the years, these exhibitions can cover almost any global, regional or local conservation topic or issue.
