

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Potter County has some of the cleanest water in Pennsylvania. There are many brooks with icy water flowing off the mountains. The brooks flow from a continental divide near the Village of Gold into three different watersheds. They are the Genesee River, the Allegheny River and Pine Creek, which leads to the Susquehanna. Not only are trout found here (both native and stocked), but also muskies, carp, suckers, bullheads and bluegills. Potter County is a great place to fish, thanks to our watersheds.

My watershed depicts a Virgina Opossum drinking out of the Genesee River. The Genesee River flows north into Lake Ontario, the St. Lawrence Seaway, and the Gulf of Mexico, where it connects with The Atlantic Ocean. It is part of the only triple divide east of the Mississippi River, along with the Allegheny River and Pine Creek Susquehanna. Opossums or "possums" are marsupials that are (usually) nocturnal and burrow underground. They usually prefer to live in areas such as the forest, or wet marsh-like type habitats. Possums are omnivores who eat nearly anything, i.e. fruits, nuts, garbage, small animals, fish, and even crayfish.





The beaver is North America's largest rodent. Beavers build dams in lakes, rivers and large streams with deep enough water around the dam to create a barrier against predators. Beavers tend work at night and are amazing builders, carrying mud and stones with their fore-paws and timber between their teeth. Beavers eat soft plant foods, including grasses, fems, mushrooms, duckweed, algae, leaves, stems and roots of water plants such as cattails and water lilies.

My poster shows a beaver dam that I observe on my daily trip to school. It is located on SR 1011 in Potter County, Ulysses, Pennsylvania.

The water source for the beaver dam is the Genesee River. The Genesee River flows North into Lake Ontario, St. Lawrence River and the North Atlantic Ocean. The Genesee River is one of 3 rivers that make up the only Triple Divide east of the Mississippi. The other rivers are the Allegheny and the Pine Creek-Susquehanna.


