To one J.B. Speed School of Engineering and School of Medicine alumnus, philanthropy is all relative

FOR BOBBY BAKER '78, '82,

the University of Louisville isn't just where he trained to become a physician – it's where he met his wife, Julie, and where their son, Alex Baker '12, '13, later earned his bachelor's and master's degrees.

"I attended UofL for nine years. First at the Speed School, then in medical school and internship," Bobby said. "Being a Cardinal is in my blood. I will always remember UofL for giving me a start in life to become the doctor that I wanted to be."

That gratitude, coupled with deep family pride, inspired the family to establish the Dr. Bobby and Julie Baker Foundation, with Alex joining in leadership. Together, they are working to ensure today's students, especially those from rural backgrounds like Bobby's hometown, can access the same opportunities that shaped their own lives through the UofL Medical Scholarship.

"Our mission is to help the vulnerable," Bobby said. "I realized that there were people like me who likely did not even have medical school on their radar because it was just too expensive for them to even consider. So, helping a student from my hometown not only makes it possible for them to become doctors, but it also helps the community attract doctors who know and love their hometown."

Though new, the Bakers' scholarship program is already making a difference. "The guidance counselor at Washington County High School told me there is no question this scholarship will make a difference

"I hope all our future generations will know how much I cared about UofL, my hometown and the potential of students there who only needed that opportunity to make a dream a reality," Bobby said.
