# THE ASSURANCE OF PARDON | APOLOGETIC CORNER

# Worship in Focus: The Assurance of Pardon

Part 4 in our Series on the Elements of Worship

Each Sunday, after we have acknowledged our sin before God in the *Confession of Sin*, we are immediately met with **one of the most comforting and powerful elements of the worship service:** *The Assurance of Pardon*. This is not just a liturgical formality or a transitional moment—it is **the very heart of the gospel on display**.

The Assurance of Pardon proclaims the good news that, in Christ Jesus, our sins are truly forgiven. Our shame is past, our guilt is gone, and divine mercy has been poured out upon us. Because Jesus bore our punishment on the cross, we now stand before God as those clothed in his righteousness. United to Christ by faith, we are as precious to God as his own Son. This moment in worship gives us the opportunity to rest in that truth and rejoice in it.

Historically, some Protestant churches have hesitated to include a formal Assurance of Pardon out of concern that it might resemble Roman Catholic absolution—a practice where a priest declares forgiveness. However, such concerns can be resolved with clarity. The minister is not granting pardon, but announcing what God has already promised to those who repent and believe. The language used in this part of the service should reflect that truth: "Hear now the good news of the gospel," or "Hear the pardon God grants you through Christ." This keeps the focus on God as the source of grace, not the minister as a mediator.

The Assurance of Pardon can be expressed in many ways—through the reading of Scripture, in song, as part of a prayer, or in a responsive reading with the congregation. However it is delivered, it should always point to the certainty of God's mercy in Christ. A simple congregational response like "Thanks be to God" can help reinforce the joy and gratitude that naturally flows from the reception of such good news.

# Assurances of Pardon in Scripture

"For as high as the heavens are above the earth, so great is his steadfast love toward those who fear him; as far as the east is from the west, so far does he remove our transgressions from us."

(Psalm 103:11-12)

"Therefore, since we have been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ." (Romans 5:1)

"There is therefore now no condemnation for those who are in Christ Jesus." (Romans 8:1)

"If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (1 John 1:9)

This moment should not feel routine or muted. When the minister speaks words of pardon, they should do so with warmth, conviction, and joy. The tone, expression, and posture of the one delivering the assurance should reflect the love and compassion of the Father. Hurting hearts need more than a quiet recitation—they need to hear the gospel with life and light.

Ultimately, The Assurance of Pardon is not just a reminder that we are forgiven—it is a declaration that the gospel is real, active, and deeply personal. It proclaims peace to the weary, hope to the guilty, and grace to the repentant. In a world burdened by shame and striving, the church gathers to hear these life-giving words week after week: "In Christ, you are forgiven."

Next month, we will explore *The Doxology*—our sung response of praise to the God who blesses and forgives.

# CIA Cook's Corner

# Amish Sunday Savior Casserole—Gabby Bentley

# Main Ingredients:

- 1 lb ground beef
- 1 medium onion, chopped
  - 1 cup carrots, sliced
  - 1 cup celery, sliced
  - 1 cup frozen peas
- 2 cups cooked egg noodles
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
  - ½ cup milk
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese, divided

# Instructions:

# 1. Cook the Beef & Vegetables

- Heat a large skillet over medium heat.
- Add the ground beef and chopped onion. Cook until the beef is browned, breaking it apart with a spoon.
- Stir in the carrots, celery, and frozen peas, cooking for a few minutes until slightly softened.

# 2. Prepare the Casserole Mixture

- Add the cooked egg noodles to the skillet.
- Pour in the cream of mushroom soup and milk, stirring until everything is well combined.
- Mix in ½ cup of shredded cheddar cheese, stirring until melted into the mixture.

# 3. Assemble & Bake

- Transfer the mixture to a greased 9×13-inch baking dish, spreading it evenly.
- Sprinkle the remaining ½ cup of shredded cheddar cheese over the top.
- Bake in a preheated oven at 350°F (175°C) for 25-30 minutes, or until the cheese is golden and bubbly.

# 4. Serve & Enjoy

- Let the casserole cool for a few minutes before serving.
- Enjoy it on its own or pair with a fresh salad or crusty bread!
