


Brian Palmer, ELCA Missionary to Liberia Reverend Brian Palmer, ELCA pastor and missionary for the Lutheran Church in Liberia, has lived and served in Totota, Liberia since 2010. Liberia is not on the list of must-see destinations even for missionaries, nevertheless, Brian has not only served his initial four year call, but also signed up for two additional two year terms. He has no plans to leave Liberia; in his words, "I love the people in Liberia." Continued on next page Members of the World Outreach Committee hosted Brian for a Perkins (birthday) lunch in June 2018. Brian was in the States for his two year family and Synod visit. He spent most of his time preaching and meeting churches in the Upper Susquehanna Synod from whom he receives most of his support. We enjoyed his compelling stories of life in Liberia. He shared his warmth and passion as a teacher and preacher of theology to lay evangelists, deacons, and seminary students at the Louis T. Bowers Lay Leaders and Ministers in Training Center in Totota and the Gbargna School of Theology. His experience as a nuclear engineer and his natural curiosity to solve problems have led him to become "Mr. Fix It" in the region. Until the recent arrival of a Danish missionary couple, Brian also served as the community medic. He is relieved to pass this role to a trained nurse, the fellow missionary and spouse of the couple. Post-pandemic, my friend Pastor Richard Nyakaana is again visiting from Uganda. Pastor Richard provides pastoral oversight for 11 churches in Uganda, 5 of which he founded, and is an international evangelist, trained at Billy Graham's Amsterdam '86 & 2000. He has done evangelistic rallies at high schools and colleges in Uganda and surrounding countries, and more recently at churches in the United States, for over 23 years. His ministry (New Song Churches, ISCEM) provides schooling support and resources for 65 orphans in Uganda, and built/staffed a school. They are also working to provide 5000 Bibles to his local tribe in their native tongue.



Richard is also a Gospel singer, music instructor and song-writer, with several popular albums playing on local Christian radio in Kampala, Uganda's capital. He typically sings, plays his guitar, leads familiar praise songs (in English, the national language of Uganda), and often teaches Ugandan African songs with great enthusiasm before his preaching. He has started a school in Uganda to teach worship-leading and music for other church leaders and musicians, which provides all his personal income and some of the funding for his ministry.

Richard received Christ as his Savior during the terror-filled genocidal reign of Idi Amin in Uganda. He is no stranger to tragedy, having lost all of his 8 brothers and sisters, some to the AIDS epidemic in Africa, his first wife to a stroke, and his first son to an accident at age two. However his deep faith in Jesus enabled him to persevere in life and ministry, leading hundreds of people to Christ and becoming a church-planter. Today he is remarried, and his wife Claire and three children are a great support to his ministry. Richard radiates the joy of the Lord!

Grateful for the American missionaries who brought Christianity to Africa, Richard is fulfilling a calling to mission work in America, and does evangelistic rallies and mission conferences at churches in the United States for several months each year. After a revival message on repentance at Calvary Baptist Church in Eau Claire, WI, even some elders of the church came forward to repent with tears in their eyes at the time of commitment. Richard wants to help call America back to her spiritual roots and the American church to its first love of Jesus!

Richard is available to minister to any groups or churches that may be interested. He has sung and preached in our church in Jersey Shore with a great response, and we have helped support his missionary work. In July 2017 he preached a 5-day multi-church evangelistic crusade attended by about 500 each night. Donations to his mission or scholarships to support more orphans are always welcome. 

Pastor Ela arranged to meet with Kate Sillman on July 1, and at that time neither knew that would be Kate's first day of her three-year term as our General Presbyter! Kate who has been serving as Interim General Presbyter since Joy Kaufmann retired was sworn in as General Presbyter at our June 28 Presbytery meeting which Ela and Seulki attended.

On July 1st Past Ela met with Kate Sillman. Dr. Kate Sillman's former students at Penn State University for the previous 20-plus years probably wouldn't have guessed that she spent her Sundays not only being active in her church in Winburne, PA, but also sharing her gifts in the pulpits of other Presbyterian congregations around the region. That's because Kate is an unassuming, low-key person, which are also the qualities that leadership in the Presbytery of Huntingdon were looking for when they went searching for an interim general presbyter. "There's a steep learning curve but I'm doing my best and I feel that I am serving a need at this point," Kate continued.

A former vice moderator of the Synod of the Trinity, Kate has completed the Certified Lay Preacher program at Huntingdon and later tackled the Commissioned Ruling Elder class at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary, getting that certificate in 2015. She has been helping to fill pulpits in Huntingdon for several years but is regularly found on Sunday mornings at Winburne Presbyterian Church (her home church in Clearfield County) preparing the music, leading the choir and being the organist.

"It's been really neat meeting with the different people," she said. "I enjoy being around the different folks in the presbytery. One thing I'm seeing is that one person doesn't have to do everything. My leadership style is joint leadership, a collaboration. I like to encourage people to use their gifts and their strengths. I enjoy seeing other people succeed."

Kate has quickly learned about the differing views of those in Huntingdon during her short time as the interim general presbyter. Trying to keep people focused on the missions and ministries of the presbytery is one thing that will challenge her during her stay.

"I want to encourage people who have different viewpoints to work together and be able to share those

without causing any ill feelings, be able to have respectful dialog without getting upset about it," she said. "That's a challenge to create that safe space for people to share without being afraid to.

"I pray for each pastor in our presbytery every day," she said. "There's no way I would try to do this without constant prayer. I feel God's love, care and grace in everything I'm doing."



The Rev. Forrest Claassen, co-executive and stated clerk of the Presbytery of Los Ranchos, has been elected the new executive of our Synod of the Trinity, effective Jan. 1, 2022.

Claassen succeeds the Rev. Susan Faye Wonderland, whose contract is expiring after 13 years with the Synod, including the last seven-plus years as transitional executive. The Synod of the Trinity, created in 1717 and the oldest synod in the PC(USA), comprises 16 presbyteries in Pennsylvania, most of West Virginia and part of Ohio. Those presbyteries include 1,046 churches and 132,348 members, making this Synod one of the largest in the denomination.

"When I think about what Trinity has called me to do, I see a convergence," Claassen said. "All sorts of ministry experiences over the last 25-plus years have led to this." Claassen is a graduate of Stanford University, where he received a Bachelor of Arts in psychology, and Princeton Theological Seminary, where he earned a Master of Divinity.

Prior to his service in Los Ranchos, Claassen served as stated clerk of the Presbytery of the Inland Northwest from 2009 to 2013, pastor at Clarkston (WA) Presbyterian Church from 2005 to 2013, co-pastor to a tri-cultural congregation in Southeast Alaska, stated supply minister for a Haida village church in the Presbytery of Alaska for five years, moderator and then chair of General Council of the Presbytery of Alaska, and commissioner to the 212<sup>th</sup> General Assembly in Long Beach, CA.

"We are grateful for the leadership of Rev. Susan Wonderland, who has been pivotal in helping our presbyteries address current issues facing modern churches," Synod Co-Moderators Martha Jordan and Charles Best said in a joint statement. "We are looking forward to working with Rev. Forrest Claassen as we continue to explore how to be innovative as the Body of Christ."



News from the Backyard: July 2022

The Backyards in June: June is always a big month for neighborhood ministry. All Backyard Clubs function in the month of June welcoming children to engage in playing games, sharing snacks, learning about Jesus, learning the fruits of the Spirit, and praying together. Currently, churches are ministering directly in 22 neighborhoods without Backyard support. This means more than 2000 families now have a permanent church presence in their neighborhood. Our new ministries at Glen Hazel in Pittsburgh and in the Jefferson Park neighborhood of Altoona continue to grow. We meet new families and deepen our relationship with others every week. There were also special events going on in several neighborhoods this June including Backyard Club kickoff festivals and cookouts. So blessed to see the creativity of our partnering churches as they minister to neighborhood families. Finally, we had the opportunity to help several families dealing with special needs.

Neighborhood Prayer Needs: Please pray for these friends in need: a young man undergoing cancer treatment, a woman raising her grandkids, a family desperate to get out of their unsafe neighborhood, the conflict going on between residents and others at Hartman Village, a family who has to rent a car to get to work because they don't have the resources to get their car fixed, parents with adult children in rehab, a man who is working hard to remain calm and patient and to trust God with things he can't control, those who have recently moved, a couple who are taking preaching classes, the many with serious health issues, a woman diagnosed with cancer whose doctor told her there was no treatment for the cancer she has, a woman whose mom passed away and who had to make a bunch of difficult decisions in the process, those with difficulties interacting in a healthy way with others around them, those who have found homes outside the neighborhoods, a woman whose brother passed away, the constant gun violence in our neighborhoods, a woman getting married this fall, and that the kids of the neighborhoods would come to know who Jesus is and to find hope in His love and grace.

<u>Upcoming Special Needs:</u> Backyard Ministries has the following immediate needs:

- (1) BYM needs church partners to deliver food and Bible study papers monthly in the following neighborhoods: Pleasant Village (Altoona), Homewood North (Pittsburgh), and Glen Hazel (Pittsburgh).
- (2) BYM has a constant need for the following: fruit bars, individual size bags of cookies, individual size apple sauce, individual size crackers, individual size chocolate and vanilla pudding, individual size packages of muffins, Macaroni and Cheese, and Ramon noodles.
