PRELUDE

WELCOME and ANNOUNCEMENTS

Welcome on this third Sunday of our Lenten Journey. The first three weeks of Lent emphasize self-examination, repenting for those things we regret, and finding willingness to face those sins or weaknesses we have tried to deny. This is the time when the scripture and the pastor's message may cause us to feel uncomfortable with ourselves personally or ourselves as an element of our current society, "that sinful generation."

SILENT PRAYER

Gracious God, whose power is made perfect in weakness, whose wisdom appears as foolishness in this world, we thank you for the scandal of the cross. In Jesus Christ, you overturn all our usual ways of behaving and believing. You scatter our false notions of discipleship as easily as coins are spilled from a box. You correct our notions of piety and order with fierce passion. Do not let your church become content or contained as an institution. Raze to ruins what is distorted in us, and raise us to new life as a community so that we may be the body of Christ in and for the world. With fear and joy we ask this in Christ's name. Amen.

*OPENING WORDS/CALL TO WORSHIP (from Ps. 19 and 1 Corinthians:1)

Leader: Heaven is declaring God's glory; the sky is proclaiming God's handiwork.

There is no speech; there are no words;

People: Their voices cannot be heard by us.

Leader: Yet their sound extends throughout the world;

People: Their words reach the ends of the earth!

Leader: The message of the cross sounds foolish to the world;


People: But to us it is the power of God!

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READING OF THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery; you shall have no other gods before me.

You shall not make for yourself an idol.

You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the Lord your God.

Remember the sabbath day, and keep it holy.

Honor your father and your mother.

You shall not murder.

You shall not commit adultery.

You shall not steal.

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.

You shall not covet your neighbor's house;

you shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or male or female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs to your neighbor.

*CALL TO CONFESSION

Despite all that God has taught us, we still act foolishly; we are still weak. In the cross of Christ, we find forgiveness and grace. We confess our sins, trusting in God's wisdom and strength rather than our own.

*PRAYER OF CONFESSION (from Ps. 19:12–13, Exod. 20:2-17)

Merciful God, how fickle we are; we sin against you without even knowing it. Clear us, we pray, of any unknown sin, and save us from willfully ignoring your way. Let your commandments rule and guide us. Forgive us for worshiping anyone or anything except you; keep us faithful. Forgive us for failing to honor all our relationships—with those closest to us and those who are distant neighbors. Help us to speak words of blessing and kindness, rather than words that belittle or destroy. Turn us away from violence, falsehood, and selfishness. Forgive us for thinking everything depends on our efforts and power, for you are the God who made us, led us out slavery, and has brought us into the community of faith. Help us to depend on you alone and to rest in your peace. In Christ's name we pray. Amen.

DECLARATION OF FORGIVENESS

Brothers and sisters in Christ, as forgiven people, we are now freed to live in grateful response to God, following God's law, which is our guide for full and abundant life: We are freed to worship God and God alone ... freed from having to make anything an idol. We are freed to call on the name of the Lord without abusing God's name. We are freed for a day of worship and rest, freed to love those who gave us birth and nurtured us. Freed from all that binds us, we shall not kill or break sacred bonds; we need not steal or lie, nor crave anything that belongs to another. God's law brings us goodness and blessing; God's grace gives us confidence and joy.

In Jesus Christ, crucified, risen, and coming again, we are forgiven and set free to live in faithfulness with God and with one another! **Thanks be to God!**

PEACE OF CHRIST – Extend the Peace of Christ to those here and opening our hearts to those beyond the walls of our Sanctuary.

THE WORD PROCLAIMED

GLORIA PATRI

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit: as it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be, world without end. Amen.

PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION (from Ps. 19:1–4, 1 Cor. 1:21, Ps. 19:14)

God of Glory, we cannot hear the heavens proclaim your handiwork, though the speech of the skies must be magnificent. We cannot hear what day and night are singing about you, though their song must be both bright and deep. Yet, somehow you are made known to us through our own foolish proclamation. It is only by the power of the Holy Spirit that your Word can be heard in our words. Open our ears to what you are saying to us today, we pray; and perhaps we may also hear echoes of your glory in the broad firmament above. In Christ's name we pray. Amen.

FIRST READING 1 Corinthians 1:18-25

The message about the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart." Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this age? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, God decided, through the foolishness of our proclamation, to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks desire wisdom, but we proclaim Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and foolishness to Gentiles, but to those who are the called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For God's foolishness is wiser than human wisdom, and God's weakness is stronger than human strength.

GOSPEL READING John 2:13-22

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables. Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!" His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me." The Jews then said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews then said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?" But he was speaking of the temple of his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.

JOYS AND CONCERNS

*PRAYERS OF INTERCESSION (Exod. 20:12-175; Gal. 5:1)

Unifying God, you have called us to live before you and with one another in all faithfulness. Unable to live as you intend, we inflict harm and hurt on others and on ourselves as well. In all these ways, we know we grieve your heart also. Hear, then, our prayers of intercession. Restore us to communion with you and one another that we might live in the freedom you have bestowed.

Do not let us turn inward as a church, lest we shut out or neglect those who long for a community of welcome and companionship.

Send us out in love, with open eyes, ears, and hearts. Make us true neighbors to one another and true children of your own calling. We pray in the name of Christ, who has come to set us free. Amen.

DOXOLOGY



POSTLUDE

Question for Reflection:

The third Sunday of Lent focuses on the gift of God's law. John Calvin (1509–1564) described three uses for the Ten Commandments: First, they show us how to live before God and neighbor, and expose our sins in failing to live as God intends. Second, they instruct our civic or common life, showing us how to live responsibly in the freedom God gives. Third, rather than show us what we must do in order to receive God's grace and love, the commandments show us how we should live because we are a people who have already received God's grace and love in Jesus Christ. Does God's law restrict or enhance our freedom as human beings?

Household Prayer: Morning

God of heaven and earth, I listen this morning for the sound of your glory: in the songs of birds, in quiet conversations that begin the day, in easy laughter among friends, in sunlight's warmth, pattering rain, or silent snowfall. Give me ears to hear your glory in its many forms. Give me eyes to see your glory in its many guises. Throughout this day, I, too, will proclaim your glory, your grace, and your love so that I may be a part of the chorus of praise that stretches to the ends of the earth. In Christ's name I pray. Amen.

Household Prayer: Evening

God of freedom, I thank you for claiming me as your own and for setting me in the midst of the community of faith. Today the news was filled with stories of people who do not live according to your commandments, with grievous results. Lives are shattered as your ancient tablets of stone are broken again and again. And I struggle, too, in my own ways, to live before you and my neighbors in faithfulness, generosity, and love. As the day comes to an end, I pray for forgiveness for myself and for this weary world, confident of your grace and mercy.
