This year, St. John's hosts community veterans at the Memorial 9:30 AM Sunday Service on Sunday, May 29. West Kish holds its service at 11AM and on Monday, as is tradition, provides its parking and lawn for Valley View residents and others to have front row seats at the parade. The annual Sunday services may be the spiritual accompaniment to the Monday Memorial Day parade and celebrations. We praise God for the gift of the promise of life eternal through the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ while we remember veterans for their sacrifice and service to our country and the world.

When we partake of the Lord's supper or take communion the "words of institution" remind us of Jesus' last supper with his disciples and give us his words to them "Do this in remembrance of me." As a church, joining together to 'do in remembrance of Christ,' is the soul of our worship, our liturgy, our mission, our outreach, our life. As members of a community, our country, and our world joining together 'in remembrance of' those who helped preserve this freedom of worship is central to our Memorial Day celebrations.

There is a link here between 'remembrance' and 'the words of institution.' In the verb form "re-membering" is not just 'looking back on' but putting ourselves back together as members of one entity. The Latin verb form "instituere" translates "to set up" or "set in motion."* It is to 'begin' or to create a new precept or way of thinking about things. God asks us to be a part of the new work of love, justice and peace begun in the life, death and resurrection of Christ. In communion, God nurtures us in doing this together. We are asked to make this the core of who we are, committing our God given talents to this mission.

In this year's memorial services and Memorial Day celebrations we are particularly reminded that being on the front in any war or crisis involves thousands vesting their talents behind the scenes as well.

Don Smith, Edna Chester's brother, is probably St. John's and possibly Belleville's oldest vet. He may have been Mifflin County's last draftee into WWII and was told based on his IQ, that his skills could best be developed in organization and administration. So as a young draftee he put his shoulder not to a rifle but to winding a mimeograph machine! He moved up the ranks in the office until it was time to send him home. Back in Belleville we know him now as 'Water Don,' having administered the water department of the village for decades.

Nancy Simmons, one of our speakers this year, a member of East Kish Presbyterian, is a veteran of the Navy nursing corps, a corp which spans providing triage, skill, compassion, care, counseling and perhaps even a hand-held in passing for those in the full scope of service.

Col. Dirk Remensnyder of the National Guard, our guest speaker for the Memorial Day Services, and son of long time St. John's member Dorie Remensnyder, most recently was posted and in charge of tactical logistics in response to personnel and supply shortages during the Covid epidemic.

This Sunday we will also honor the many in our churches who have been central to our community celebrations on Memorial Day: Kenny Wyland and Ted Carothers for organizing and facilitating these events; Ron Carson and his sons for their needle in a haystack vigilance to making sure every veteran buried in the Valley is honored with a flag or flower. We thank all those listed in our bulletin and all those we may have inadvertently omitted for their dedication to veterans and service people.

Most of all we thank and honor our God - Creator, Savior and Holy Spirit - who gives us that core commitment to serve others with love and unity until the day Christ's Peace is fully realized on Earth. May we live in to this mission as we remember those who died for it. And may all God's people say "Amen."

News from the Backyard: May 2022

The Backyards in April: During the month of April, Backyard Ministries continued its monthly deliveries and began a new door ministry in the Jefferson Park neighborhood in Altoona. We are also excited that Bible to Schools is partnering with our church partners in Johnstown to restart a Backyard Club this summer in the 400 apartment Oakhurst homes neighborhood. Praise the Lord. We are also excited about the 22 neighborhoods containing more than 2000 families that now have a church ministering regularly right in their neighborhood.

Neighborhood Prayer Needs: Please pray for these neighborhood friends: an elderly man who lost his brother after a long bout with cancer, a husband and father continuing to recover from a severe bout with covid, a man who continues to work hard to control his temper, a family of three with a lot of illness issues, a woman who lives alone who is struggling to pay her bills, a family that lost an adult child, a woman who is caring for her husband at home and struggling to feel that she is doing all she can for her beloved and very ill spouse, for all those caring for the sick, for a man in desperate need of a job in Pittsburgh, for others who are seeking work that will lead to better life opportunities, and for the many who have serious medical issues.

Praise the Lord for these blessings: an elderly woman who had a severe bout of illness and was home alone for some time but blessed to have God see her through a very difficult time, the friends who have been able to move out of the neighborhoods to a home, those who continue to have employment, a husband and wife who continue to minister to their grandchildren, growth in many of our friends as we see the effects of encounters with God on daily life, and the many who have recovered well from the virus and other illnesses of this winter.

<u>Upcoming Special Needs:</u> Backyard Ministries has the following immediate needs:

- (1) BYM needs church partners to deliver food and Bible study papers monthly in the following neighborhoods: Pleasant Village (Altoona), Homewood North (Pittsburgh), and Glen Hazel (Pittsburgh).
- (2) BYM has a constant need for the following: fruit bars, individual size bags of cookies, individual size apple sauce, individual size crackers, individual size chocolate and vanilla pudding, individual size packages of muffins, Macaroni and Cheese, and Ramon noodles.
- (3) Special: BYM is collecting coloring books, drawing pads, crayons, and colored pencils for engagement at new doors.
