## New Programming in 2017

### Mobile Response Team

Portage Health Foundation awarded Dial Help funds to launch a Mobile Response Team (MRT). The MRT responds on-site to requests from schools and agencies to help those in crisis in the four-county area.

The MRT has primarily served youth in local schools, providing early intervention, increased access to services, and connection on-going resources. This includes help for youth unable to access counseling due to financial issues, with a referral to obtain counseling at no cost to the family.



MRT staff also spend dedicated time within schools, so students can drop in for help on their own. With youth suicide rates rising nation-wide, MRT has life-saving potential.

### Community Crisis Training

As part of this same grant funding, Dial Help created a new crisis intervention training for community members, based on their formal crisis line training. The goal is to give parents and others in the community the tools to help loved ones dealing with mental health and crisis issues. Two trainings have been held so far, with more to come.

### Rural Outreach & Coordination

Thanks to a three-year grant from MDHHS Division of Victims' Services, Dial Help staff is working collaboratively with all domestic violence shelters across the UP.

The goal is to strengthen sexual assault services through training, clinical support, and utilization of Dial Help's centralized crisis line, texting, and IM capabilities.



### Emergency Department Suicide Assessments

Dial Help expanded its service area to include UP Health Systems Portage in May of this year.

With years of experience with suicide risk assessments and managing 24-hour response teams, Dial Help was able to fill a void for members of the community seeking services at UPHSP's Emergency Department.



## Yesterday's Investment, Today's Results

In 2016, the Walmart Foundation awarded funds to Dial Help to support crisis line services. In 2017, these funds are at work in the form of program enhancement, training, outreach, and sustainability, to continue vital services to those in need.

# Suicide Prevention

## Second Annual UP Suicide Prevention Conference

Marquette Health Department and Dial Help hosted the Second Annual UP Suicide Prevention Conference on September 15. This conference was part of a collaborative proposal between these agencies, "Communities Uniting for Suicide Prevention," which is in its third year of funding from the Garrett Lee Smith grant.

Over 60 people from across the UP attended the second annual conference at the Ramada Inn in Marquette to network and learn more about suicide prevention, local efforts, and practices.

## First Houghton/Keweenaw Suicide Prevention March

Houghton/Keweenaw CTC and the local Suicide Prevention Coalition merged this year. Their first project was a Suicide Prevention March, held on September 9.

Community members attended to help reduce stigma and support those impacted by suicide. CLK Junior ROTC, Keweenaw Community Foundation, and Tadych's EconoFoods sponsored the event.

## CTC: Youth-Focused Coalition in the Copper Country

Houghton/Keweenaw Communities That Care (CTC) has been working in the Copper Country since May 2016. The coalition is headed by Dial Help's Mary LeDoux, and is a collaboration of professionals, parents, youth, and others in the community. Research shows that the CTC prevention model helps lower rates of youth problem behavior like substance abuse, delinquency, and depression.

This year, the coalition received the results of the CTC Youth Survey, with a number of local schools participating. Based on these results, the community voted for CTC to address two top risk factors. The first is youth having a low perceived risk of drug and alcohol use, and the second is anxiety/depression.

Members of CTC are currently assessing existing programs and gaps in the area to address these concerns.

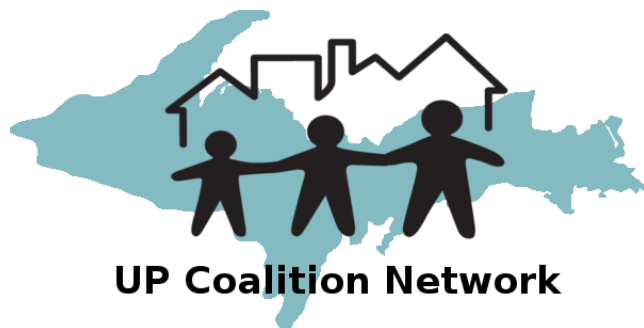

# Packers Fundraiser

In one of the most exciting events of Dial Help's 46 years, the Green Bay Packers brought their Tailgate Tour to Houghton, with all proceeds donated to Dial Help!

The Green Bay Packers Tailgate Tour is a community outreach event that serves as a thank you to loyal Packers fans while also assisting local non-profit organizations. The event featured President/CEO Mark Murphy, six current and former Packers players, kids' games, food and drink, autograph signing, door prizes, silent auction, and a Q&A. Almost 500 people attended to enjoy the Tailgate Tour and raise a total of \$40,000 for Dial Help.

# Coming Soon in 2018

## Expanded Program

Superior Health Foundation awarded funding to NorthCare Network and Dial Help for their joint initiative to address addiction in the UP.

Dial Help will support NorthCare in a variety of UP-wide prevention Initiatives, including: completing the Tri-Ethnic Readiness Survey in all 15 counties; bringing Guiding Good Choices trainers to the UP; and developing/promoting UP-wide messaging around addiction and substance abuse.

Dial Help will also expand their existing Safety Net Program for individuals who are seeking help for addiction. This program is based on SAMHSA's evidence-based suicide risk model, offering follow-up support to individuals via phone or text.

This model shows promise as a support for individuals struggling with addiction. Dial Help will expand their program to offer enhanced navigation of treatment systems to assist people in accessing appropriate addiction treatment; support during treatment; and 120 day follow-up post-treatment to aid in rebuilding sober lives. Overall, Dial Help hopes to increase success for people with addiction who choose to seek treatment.



## Juvenile Justice Response

MDHHS Behavioral Health and Developmental Disabilities Administration awarded funding to Dial Help to develop a 24-hour Juvenile Justice Response Team (JRT) in the four-county area.

The goal of the JRT is to help youth ages 10 to 21 (and their families) address the issues that have resulted in the youth entering the juvenile justice system, and divert youth from further movement into the system. The JRT will provide face-to-face crisis support, linkage to resources, and wrap-around care.

Dial Help is thankful for the support of local schools, law enforcement, and court systems in development of this program. This cross-system collaboration will give at-risk youth the opportunity to move away from the criminal justice system and make healthier choices in this critical period prior to adulthood, interrupting the "school to prison" pipeline.

Free counseling, advocacy, and court accompaniment, with 24-hour emergency response to victims of any type of crime.

### SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER SERVICES

Offering Drug & Alcohol Assessments and Outpatient Counseling for individuals dealing with substance abuse/addiction.

### EMERGENCY DEPARTMENT SUICIDE ASSESSMENTS

Determining suicide risk for patients at UP Health Systems Portage.

### COMMUNITY EDUCATION

Alcohol Highway Safety Classes, Domestic Violence Intervention Program, Anger Management Classes, Community Crisis Intervention Training, Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST), and other trainings as needed.
