





<u>Home Repair Block Grant Program—IFA</u>

The Iowa Finance Authority (IFA) launched a new program with \$4 million. The grant is pretty flexible. As a pilot project, a city can design the boundaries of the rehab projects, the type of units involved, the number of units, ownership or rental, and size of overall project up to \$1 million grant.

Work must be in the direct vicinity of the downtown area – namely about a block around the ring of the downtown – and be affordable housing for those below 80% of the area median income. We recommend you determine where your project may be located. Contact CVPD about additional information for the project design and outreach to the intended properties.

The goal of the program is to work with towns already working on downtown revitalization by enhancing the quality of the area around the downtown. A 25% match to the grant amount is required, but the sources of the match can be flexible and does not necessarily have to come from local general funds. Applications are due in March but please contact CVPD as soon as you determine you have interest in the program.

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City Codification Services - Does your code need updated?

Under the Iowa Code, Section 380.8, cities are required to re-codify or update every five years. This ensures that the codebook is up-to-date and that changes are properly documented. CVPD can provide codification services to do this work on a contractual basis.

Chariton Valley Planning & Development maintains a model code of ordinances through consultation with an attorney which is current with the Iowa Code and is hired by the Iowa Association of Regional Councils (ICOG). The COG will work with the city clerk/administrator to prepare a new Code of Ordinances and update the current codes with updates. Chapters from the model code may be added or removed from the city's code depending on the individual city's needs, ordinances specific to the city will be added based on the city's latest ordinances and amendments. CVPD will provide a draft code to the city for review with their attorney, and upon completion of review discuss any revisions requested by the city. CVPD will then prepare a final version of the code incorporating the revisions and assist with adoption procedures. Currently, the City of Albia is in the process of updating their codes collaborating with CVPD.

<u>Resilience Toolkit</u>

The Iowa Association of Regional Council Of Governments (ICOG) in conjunction with its member Councils of Governments have worked on a Resilience Toolkit for small business, nonprofit and communities.

The purpose of this toolkit is to help entities with preparing to be resilient, managing to be resilient, marketing to be resilient and financing to be resilient. This year the Centerville Lakeview Elementary School was chosen and will receive 4 new bottle refill/water stations in the gymnasium.

CVPD serves as administrator of funds in the region, providing strategic planning assistance to community 5-2-1-0 committees, program guidance, and fiduciary oversight. The 5-2-1-0 Healthy Choices Count initiative, brings evidence-based strategies for healthy living into communities, schools, early care and out-of-school programs, health care practices and workplaces. Preserving Properties Program

The Most Endangered Properties Program started in 1995 to educate Iowans about the special buildings, sites, and structures that are slowly and gradually slipping away from us. Preservation Iowa designated 7 properties as 2021 Most Endangered Properties and some of these properties have been highlighted in other preservation publications since their designation.

In the past 25 years, Preservation Iowa has designated over 200 archeological sites, churches, landscapes and a variety of other buildings in 69 Iowa counties.

If you know of an important building that is threatened, Preservation Iowa encourages you to nominate it as one of the 2022 Most Endangered Properties. A panel of judges reviews each nomination based on four criteria:

- * The (historic) significance of the building, site, or structure.
- * Present Condition.
- * The urgency & nature of the threat.

* The possible solutions that would remove threats to the place.

HFI - New Homes for \$90,000 including delivery!

Homes for Iowa, Inc. (HFI) is a nonprofit organization aiming to increase the supply of affordable housing in rural areas. In partnership with Iowa Prison Industries, houses are being constructed at a



new Housing Production Center at the Newton Correctional Facility.

The program will allow inmates to learn trade skills such as plumbing, electrical work, and carpentry. Iowa Association of Regional Councils of Government manage the program in coordination with HFI and other community partners.

CVPD is your local contact for inquiries and applications. The homes are purchased directly from HFI and delivered to the designated site for \$90,000 for a 3 bedroom 2 bath home. Households earning up to 100% of the state-wide median income are eligible buyers of the finished home.

Developers/Homeowners are responsible for lot acquisition, site preparation, foundation, utility hook-ups, concrete work, and any additions such as the garage.

Transportation Planning - Updates!

The CVTPA Long-Range Transportation Plan looks out to 2045 and provides the long-range vision, policies, and decision-making framework that will guide investments in the local transportation system over the coming years. The plan covers all modes of transportation in the state, for both people and goods.

The RPA 17 will also be updating the Regional Trails Plan during this process. The document will present current trails located in the 7 county region as well as identify possible expansion or improvements. The region has prioritized regional trail connectivity and intend to support local trails committees by hiring a consultant to develop feasibility study.

The newly developed State Long Range Plan has provided a significant outline of measures the local planning affiliations can follow. However, it is essential to provide locally driven data and challenges for the region. RPA 17 is now in the process of updating the local document and hosting public transportation meetings. Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program

The primary goal of the Assistance to Firefighters Grant (AFG) is to meet the firefighting and emergency response needs of fire departments and non-affiliated emergency medical service organizations.

Since 2001, AFG has helped firefighters and other first responders obtain critically needed equipment, protective gear, emergency vehicles, training, and other resources necessary for protecting the public and emergency personnel from fire and related hazards.

This application has a short window for you to develop a competitive application. It opens on November 8, 2021 and will close Friday, December 17, 2021. In order to be eligible, you must have.

-SAM.gov registration: Update your city's SAM.gov registration. It must be renewed annually. An application cannot be started until your city has an active SAM's number.

-a complete needs assessment of your equipment, gear, and vehicle needs and condition. The most competitive applications will have completely documented the existing condition of equipment and why your department needs to update it or add to your inventory.

-Obtain an informal cost quotation. Please note that once awarded a formal bidding process will need to be completed.

RPA 17 UPDATING TRANSPORTATION PLANNING DOCUMENTS

DOT's Regional Planning Affiliations are funded through FHWA and FTA sources, as well as local financial support. RPAs provide the Iowa DOT with the following required items.

- **Transportation Planning Work Program (TPWP)**—outlines the annual transportation planning activities each MPO/RPA will undertake during the next state fiscal year.
- **Public Participation Plan (PPP)**—outlines the process each MPO/RPA will follow to adequately involve the public in the their transportation planning activities.
- Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP)—provides direction and guidance for each MPO/RPA to make efficient transportation investment decisions over a 20-year planning horizon.
- **Passenger Transportation Plan (PTP)**—promotes joint, coordinated passenger transportation planning programs and provides needs-based justification for passenger transportation projects.
- **Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)**—identifies the capital and non-capital transportation projects proposed for federal-aid funding or action for each MPO/RPA over the next four-year period.

RPA 17 (CVPD) will be completing new PTP, PPP and LRTP over the next two years. Annual document completion include TPWP and TIP.

RPA 17 TAP applications for enhancement projects are due annually December 1.

Eastern Goldfinch



The Eastern Goldfinch is lowa's state bird. It was chosen as the state bird because it is commonly found in Iowa and often stays through the winter. In late July or early August they build there nests from plant materials and line them with thistles. The blue white eggs of the Eastern Goldfinch incubate for 2 weeks and young birds leave the nest when they are 2 to 3 weeks old.
