

A MAN WHO SERVED GOD AND THE PEOPLE

Ulysses Floyd was born on December 4,1928 in a house on Little Talbot Island, Florida to the late Frank Floyd and Sarah Bailey Floyd. Ulysses grew up in Jacksonville, Florida and spent many summers with his siblings (the late Myrtle Telfair and John T. Floyd) with their grandparents in Jones, Georgia.

At the age of seventeen, he enlisted in the U. S. Army and after serving 3 years, Ulysses returned to finish his last semester of High School, graduated (Old Stanton HS) and was eligible to attend Florida A&M College on the G. I. Bill. While attending FAMC, he was a member of the Track and Field Team, Scabbard and Blade (College Military Honor Society), and ROTC. It was during this time that he met the love of his life, Dorothy Evans. They were married in 1952 until her passing in 2013. Ulysses graduated from FAMU in 1953 with a degree in Tailoring and was immediately stationed in Germany. He received an Honorable Discharge from the U. S. Army in 1956 with the rank of First Lieutenant. In 1958, he returned to FAMU and received a second degree in Education.

Ulysses became a member of Our Savior Lutheran Church in April of 1960 and served in many roles

including Elder, Congregation
Vice-President and President.
He later transferred his
membership to Trinity
Downtown and served as

an Usher and Elder.

Ulysses taught for Orange County Public Schools for 32 years. He was active in many community organizations, such as being an award-winning Coach of Gra-Y football and basketball teams, and sponsoring basketball tournaments while a part-time employee with the Parks and Recreation Department for the City of Winter Park. He served on several Boards and Committees, such as the Community Coordinated Care for Children, Inc. (4-C), the Board of Regents for Concordia College-Alabama (LCMS), the Unitary Status Advisory Board of Orange County Public Schools, and as President of the Lake Mann Estates Neighborhood Association. He was a lifetime member of the Doris "Dorie" Miller American Legion, Post #331. He served on several committees and Boards with the Orange County Classroom Teachers Association up to the last moments of his life.

Ulysses was the first African American President of the Orange County Classroom Teachers Association in 1974, the year in which Educators obtained the right of collective bargaining. He worked tirelessly on the committees and Boards of the Orange County Classroom Teachers Association, OESPA-CTA Retired, the Florida Education Association (Active and Retired), as well as the National Education Association (Active and Retired). Ulysses' efforts with the Education Associations earned him many awards and tributes, as well as the nickname, "The Closer."

Ulysses was preceded in death by his **parents** – Frank Floyd and Sarah Bailey Floyd, **wife** – Dorothy Evans Floyd, **brother** – John T. Floyd, and **sister** – Myrtle Telfair.

Ulysses leaves to cherish memories of his life: daughter – Karen Floyd of Orlando; nephews – Anthony (Zeni) Telfair from British Columbia, Canada and Duane Floyd of Jacksonville, FL; nieces – Corliss McCray, Beverly Jones, and Sharon Norman, all of Jacksonville, FL; sister-in-law – Deloris (Willie) Evans Hampton of Orlando; and a host of other relatives, colleagues, and many friends.
