



MR. Alfred A. Williams

Alfred Augustus Williams was born in the Clarendon Parish of Jamaica on February 29, 1932 to the late Sarah Donaldson. "Maas Feddy" as he was affectionately called, was a sibling to 3 brothers and 2 sisters. He was a man of great faith, raised in the church from an early age. Later he became a deacon at the Four Square Church in Bagnold Spring in St Mary Parish of Jamaica where he also met his wife Virginia, in the summer of 1957.

Virginia always affectionately called Alfred "P", and he in response called her his "baby love," loving nicknames that would last for decades and ring through the halls of their family home. Alfred and Virginia shared three children together, to include their late son, Donald, and daughters Joan "Yvonne" and Elaine "Beth."

Alfred grew up in Jamaica where from a young age he was always working with his hands. He developed a tremendous love for farming, and soon realized he had a "green thumb." If it could be planted, Alfred could grow it, and so he farmed growing pigeon peas, bananas, sugar cane, and much more. But back home in Jamaica his farming included livestock such as pigs, chickens, and goats. He enjoyed selling his vegetables and fruit at the market on the weekends. He also loved hanging out with his brother Jeremiah.

In his early adult years Alfred's love for farming led him to travel back-and-forth between New York, Jamaica, and Florida, working in the apple and orange groves and cutting sugar cane as a seasonal farm worker.

Once he became a permanent resident of the United States, he went back to school and officially studied the trade of welding.



He eventually settled his family in Winter Garden, Florida where Alfred continued working in the Orange Groves. He would bring home wood for the fire every night after work, hence earning him the nickname, "Woodman." That name would stick with him throughout the years amongst his friends.

In the late 90s with the advancement of technology in farming Alfred pivoted and became "The Ice Cream Man" and that's how many know him today. This new-found career afforded him the opportunity to spread love, joy, and faith among the many children and families he served in the greater Orlando area. Alfred was a man of few words and often spoke in parables. One of his favorite songs was "I'm determined to hold on to the end."

He loved his family and was the typical Jamaican father, hard working and extra strict.

Alfred was loved and preceded in death by his: **Son** – Donald Williams (10/31/24), **Mother** – Sarah Donaldson, **Sisters** – Ruth Williams and Adalaide Musgrave, and **Brothers** – Tubal Williams and Vernal Williams.

He leaves many memories to be cherished by: his **Wife of 68 years** – Virginia Williams; **Children** with wife Virginia Williams – Joan "Yvonne" (Winston) Coleman and Elaine "Beth" Williams, and other **Children** – Sandra Hall-Smith and Nemea Augusta Hall;

Brother – Jeremiah Williams; Grandchildren – Maurice Harris, Jualandra Davis, Jr. (JuJu), Quaila (Victor) Bullard, Giavonda Williams, D'Angelo Gideon, Frito Gideon, J'marce, BoSheria, Clenzie, Denzel, Travelle, Jordan, Kimiyi, and Nemea;
