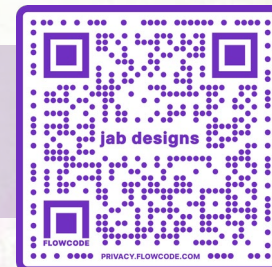

Rosetta Taylor Ware

Rosetta Taylor Ware was born on November 4, 1940, in Tuskegee, Alabama, to the late Reverend Susie Meniffee Taylor and William French Taylor, a veteran of World War I. Raised by loving, hard-working sharecroppers, Rosetta was one of eight children born to this union and learned early the values of faith, perseverance, and family.

In 1958, Rosetta relocated to Orlando, Florida, with her beloved husband, Leo Ware, to begin a new chapter of their lives. Together, they raised a beautiful family and helped lay down roots in the growing community of Richmond Heights. In fact, Rosetta was one of the very first residents to live on Aaron Avenue when the neighborhood was being developed, and she remained one of the last two living neighbors in what became a close-knit neighborhood family—affectionately known as the 2100 Block of Aaron Avenue.

Rosetta's schooling began at Chambliss Children House in Tuskegee. Her heart for service led her to a career in Healthcare, where she worked as a nurse aide at Sunland Hospital from 1960 to 1965, followed by a position at Florida Hospital from 1965 to 1969. She later returned to Sunland until her retirement in 1977.

Rosetta joined Bethel Missionary Baptist Church in the early 1970s under the leadership of Rev. Rollie Murray, Jr. Some of her favorite scriptures included Proverbs 3:5–6, Matthew 15:2-9, and 1 Peter 5:6–7, verses that reflect the strength and endurance she lived out daily.

She was a loving mother, and her home was always full of laughter and joy. She loved entertaining and—yes—driving fast! Her kitchen was a community haven, always filled with the aroma of home-cooked meals and the warmth of conversation. She was known throughout the neighborhood for her support, her generosity, and her legendary family gatherings. Whether it was a birthday party, a neighborhood celebration, or just a good reason to come together—Rosetta made everyone feel like family.

In her quiet moments, she enjoyed reading *The Enquirer* and *Jet*, singing and listening to gospel music and R&B, and watching her favorite game shows—especially *Let's Make a Deal*, *The Price Is Right*, and her absolute favorite, *Family Feud*. (She always said Steve Harvey was a sharp dresser!) Her children & grandchildren will forever remember her as the fun heartbeat of their home and the glue that held the family together.
