## **Spiritual Message**

#### Hello, my name is Cleopas...

"They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus... Now that same day two of them were going to a village called Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem. They were talking with each other about everything that had happened. As they talked and discussed these things with each other, Jesus himself came up and walked along with them; but they were kept from recognizing him." Luke 24:2-3,13-16

Have you every wondered what the very first "Walk to Emmaus" was like? Can you imagine with me the very first Gathering in a quiet upper room as the first pilgrim introduced himself?

"Hello, my name is Cleopas, Greater Jerusalem Walk to Emmaus #1, table of Jesus." (\*clap\*) "What did the walk mean to me and what am I going to do about it?

This walk changed my life. When we first started on this journey our faces were downcast because of what had happened in Jerusalem. The chief priests and our rulers handed [Jesus] over to be sentenced to death, and they crucified him; but we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel. And what is more, it is the third day since all this took place. In addition, some of the women amazed us.

They went to the tomb early this morning but didn't find his body. They came and told us that they had seen a vision of angels, who said he was alive. Then some of our companions went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but him they did not see. And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he explained to us what was said in all the Scriptures concerning himself. As we approached the village... we urged the visitor to Jerusalem to stay with us, for it was nearly evening; the day was almost over. When he was at the table with us, he took bread, gave thanks, broke it and began to give it to us.



Then our eyes were opened and we recognized him, and he disappeared from our sight. We asked each other 'were not our hearts burning within us while he talked with us on the road and opened the Scriptures to us?'

That's what this walk meant to me.

And what am I going to do about it? We got up and returned at once to Jerusalem. We found the Eleven and those with them assembled together and saying 'It is true! The Lord has risen and has appeared to Simon. Then we told what had happened on the way, and how Jesus was recognized by us when he broke the bread."

What better time of year than Easter to share with others what happened on the way as you experienced your own Walk to Emmaus? And the best part of all, is that "while they were still talking about this, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you."

- 6. Remember what Jesus did for you.

Let's work together and be sure to invite Jesus to join us.



#### FROM THE KITCHEN

We all know that the food on the weekends is great tasting and abundant, but it also takes a lot of willing volunteers to make it all happen.

Some of Jesus most significant teachings and even miracles involved food. From eating in the homes of friends, dividing a few fish and loaves of bread to feed the 5000 or blessing the bread and wine at the Last Supper.

Our Emmaus weekends are life changing events for many Pilgrims and the food we serve is a big part of that blessing.

There are nine meals on the weekend and each one requires a minimum of about six volunteers -- ideally more like eight.

We are rebuilding our volunteer base after the Covid shut down cost us a number of volunteers, but the future is bright.

The last two weekends in January and February brought in quite a few new faces. Men from the January walk returned immediately in February to help with the February walk and several men and women from last June and July helped on both recent weekends.

**No experience is needed.** I have had a number of prospective volunteers say that they do not know how to cook. Sorry, but that is not an acceptable excuse. Our meals are simple and the jobs include cutting up fruit and vegetables, setting tables, cleaning up and washing dishes.

If you can boil water and wash dishes you are a valuable team member. The truth is, it's a lot like home cooking. We break occasional dishes, we burn bacon, we forget to add ingredients, we prepare a side dish and then leave it in the refrigerator, completely forgetting to serve it. In the end everyone laughs at these mistakes because we have all made them.

To continue to grow our base of volunteers, please consider signing up this summer or if you are a regular volunteer, consider inviting another Emmaus graduate from your church to join you and for sure, invite any recent weekend Pilgrim graduates to come with you.




For each meal we also need a Meal Leader, someone who can be at that same meal each weekend and lead that volunteer crew of 6-8 willing servants. You will be the first one there, the last one to leave and you will be trained to understand the menu and procedures for that particular meal. At this point we have some experienced Meal Leaders but need a few more as well. Please consider this opportunity and contact me if you would like to take on this rewarding task.

For me the highlight of each meal is eating together after the Pilgrims and Team have left the room. It's an opportunity for us to sit down and take a well-deserved rest, eat of the food that we lovingly prepared and get to know one another. We also discuss the meal preparation, how it went and if there are any suggestions for doing it better the next time.

Thank you to all of the volunteers who have contributed to our kitchen Teams and let's invite more friends to join us.

**First**, making sure the emergency medical form is accurately and completely filled out.

**Secondly**, explain Emmaus can fulfill gluten free and vegetarian dietary needs. For any other specific needs the pilgrim and the sponsor will be asked to supply specialized food.

**Thirdly**, please explore any mobility needs, it is impossible for someone who may need a wheelchair, crutches, or a walker to be comfortable at Normandy. We have an accessible weekend every year at Sulphur Grove.
