### The Unknown Gift

It was a cold and wintery night in Piqua, Ohio. My father got home from work after stopping by George's Dairy Queen to pick out our Christmas tree. But he had forgotten one thing, the sand.

When I was a kid, we would stick the end of the tree into a 5-gallon bucket of sand, then water it throughout the season, hoping fewer needles would find their way into the green shag carpet of our modest living room. Placed on top of a 2' x 2' piece of plywood, the bucket would keep our tree standing upright until after the first of the year.

Since I had not been part of the tree selection process, I begged to go with him to the gravel yard to get the sand (I'm sure he had made an arrangement). At a mere eight-years-old, I wanted to be responsible, grown up, and help my dad. With six to seven inches of snow already on the ground, it was promising to be a white Christmas.

We ventured out into the darkness in Dad's Ohio Bell pickup truck. He brought two buckets: the five gallon and a one gallon. I remember watching him fill the one with the other as I sat in the truck, staying warm.

Soon, we began our way home until the truck suddenly stopped running. Try as he may, it would not restart, and it left us with only one alternative: walk home.

I still remember traipsing through snow. Few sidewalks had been shoveled. I remember trying to carry one bucket, but it was too heavy with its load of sand. I remember being cold, walking behind my dad for it seemed like forever.

I checked out Google Map just now. It was seven-tenths of a mile, but it felt like a dozen. It was a long and painful walk.

I have also walked another path, one through the streets of the old city of Jerusalem. Called the Via Dolorosa, the "Way of Suffering," it is a half mile trek from the Antonia Fortress to the traditional site of Golgotha, where Jesus carried His cross to His crucifixion. I have stopped at the fourteen stations, places where the Bible and tradition record things happened. I went contemplatively, sometimes weeping, reflecting on what my Savior went through for me, even when I was eight-years-old and knew nothing of His sacrifice.

For many, the greatest gift ever given is still unknown. People are struggling the pathway through the problems and storms of life—weary, miserable, lost—without the knowledge of a Savior that has already walked the way for them.

Midst all the hype, celebration, joy, and yes, the self-centeredness of Christmas, don't forget the eight-year-old—or eighty-year-old—who is stranded and doesn't know anything about the gift.

God had fulfilled His promise to send a Savior that would reconcile us back to Himself and end our separation from Him due to sin.

Christmas is indeed a time of joy and of hope as we remember what God has done for every single person on this earth -- offering reconciliation with our Creator God, a personal relationship with the Creator of the Universe who loves each of us way beyond our understanding, who gave us the Greatest Gift of all time in Jesus Christ, who later died for you and me to cleanse us from all of our sins yesterday, today, and tomorrow so that we can live with God not only in Eternity, but to have life in abundance now, here on earth. Jesus said in John 10:10b, "I came that they may have life, and have it in abundance" [to the full, 'til it overflows].

We remember our original Walk to Emmaus when Jesus met us right where we were, and we experienced God's abundant, unending love in a new way through the Body of Christ. # Greetings from the community agape chair

It is time to start thinking about making agape for the upcoming men's and women's walks in January and February. They will be here before we know it.

We were blessed with an overflowing amount of agape gifts for the pilgrims and teams of our last walks. Let's do it again!

This is your time to be creative in showing the pilgrims how much God loves them. If you are looking for ideas, look through the agape you received, that may help you.

Remember your name does not go on the agape gift. However, you can put the name of the church where your group is from on the agape. Our gifts are to be given in love not for recognition.

This is also the time for sponsors to start getting the agape letters together for their pilgrims. Remember: there are only to be 15 letters in the Sunday packet!

This is done for two reasons.

1. So that the pilgrims can read all the letters in the time they are given on Sunday afternoon.

2. So that each pilgrim is treated the same and no ones feels left out.

Letter agape is to be completed and brought by candle light on Saturday night so they can be put into packets if needed. If the pilgrims have all 15 letters before candle light, the sponsor will be asked to save the extra letters to give to their pilgrim as 4th day gifts on the ride home.
