Many, many years ago in a different life, I lived and worked in the New York City metropolitan area. One of the odd things (among many) I remember from that experience was a record and electronics store in the city named Crazy Eddie. There was a guy named Eddie and he was crazy. Crazy Eddie blitzed the television stations with crazy and goofy commercials announcing new sales almost every week. Crazy Eddie's biggest annual sales extravaganza was his "Christmas in July" event. Eddie would be dressed up in a Santa costume, jump around, and shout, "It's Christmas! Come and get it!" Christmas in July? Really? I thought, "only in New York..."

Every year it seems retailers are shouting, "It's Christmas, come and get it!" earlier and earlier. This year I saw "Black Friday" sales ads before Halloween. I guess Crazy Eddy was a prophet ahead of his time. Yes, it seems that the day we honor the birth of our Savior and the Redeemer of our sin-sick, sorrow-worn world as the years pass becomes more and more commercialized. Of course, we know that Christmas is all about giving and not getting: "God so loved the world that He gave... My purpose is to give them a rich and satisfying life, an abundant life in all its fullness."

Bringing the Father forth

Michele & Jon Cremeans, Pam DeHart, Chris Wissinger and Gregg Hayes visited Stillwater Church on Saturday, November 9, 2019. They spoke at the "Men of God" breakfast about why men would benefit from an Emmaus walk. Multiple guests gave testimony and it was productive and wonderful.

Our soul desires unity with our One true Love, Christ himself. The best people take our hand and place us in unity with Him — the center of all rightness. We rely on each other to supplement our own path with Christ.

When I arrived, I was pleasantly surprised to see they had "Men of God" on their shirts. When I had been preparing the words to share, I dubbed them Men of God without knowing that's what they call themselves. I'm not surprised because That's How God Works. I was delineating between a "man" and "the man that has committed himself fully to Christ."

There's a stature of a Man of God that sets him apart from other men. Let me say first, it's the actions, words, and deeds that make him a Man of God not merely dubbing oneself. He is a man who displays both conviction & righteousness and compassion & love and uses them appropriately. Regardless of our "spiritual mile marker" no one will ever be perfect like Jesus; however it's the consistent commitment a person makes every day that proves their worth (in God's eyes) to carry the title.

Looking back at men I've encountered in my life, I can see a distinct difference between a man vs a Man of God. A man who steps up to protect and provide. A man who stands as a sentinel, stays up, sticks it out, and carries us through; a man who can be relied upon. We burn our tall flames against their rock every day and still they stand strong.

When I walked in and they were wearing "Men of God" shirts I knew I was in good company. Here was a room of men saying "hold me accountable to my mission" as a Man of God. They are Christians who want me to know the power of God through them. Teachers of Jesus' ways saying, "This way child, let's go find Jesus together."

These Men of God trust God as Moses did. And they abide in Him as they present themselves to the world. Praise Jesus!
