This year has been very hard but that sign struck me as more beautiful than any other. I have a feeling we will hold our loved ones with intense tenderness this Christmas.

Most of this year's lessons either felt like a light scrubbing or explosive charges that left me racked with pain. All of them, events which brought my defense systems online. A willingness to examine my conscience during these times, allowed God to show me how to bury my "weapons," otherwise known as the Obstacles to Grace. For all of us the list looks different, but all are unnatural defenses offered by the flesh rather than the defense offered through the Holy Spirit. It states in Isaiah 54:17, "No weapons against you shall prosper, and every tongue which rises against you in judgment You shall condemn."

I believe this includes the weapons we brandish against ourselves and others. The weapons that ultimately BLOCK LOVE. God wants us to remember our sacred and authentic Love. God wants us to offer this Love while brandishing No weapon against ourselves or another. And what do I do? I married a woman who loves Christmas. Myra takes an entire week's vacation to put everything up. And I grumble the whole time:

"Do we have to put all seventeen strands of lights on the tree?"

"Please don't turn on that music clock that plays Chipmunk's 'We Wish You A Merry Christmas' every hour on the hour."
