#### From the Community Lay Director



"Your faith has saved you; go in peace" (Luke 7:50).

Faith is the gift we give ourselves in Jesus Christ. The complete surrender to his will, love, and provisions. Dropping all angst, worry, and misery attached to our own human desire, to follow Him, the Great That-ness, the Great I Am, the One Be-ing in whom we are bound together as One.

We risk faltering if we stop after singing the "first two verses" of our own story. We stumble in the faith process before allowing him to claim victory over our lives! Having faith is hanging on with hopeful love and adoration so deep that we believe God WILL redeem us and help us clean up our lives completely.

God blesses me deeply when I simply continue to choose love and focus on him. And, trust me, the difficulty level is directly related to the portion of blessing. Over the past two months he has given me His healing, restored my worth, and claimed complete ownership over my heart. Wherever you are in your journey of lessons, you can have faith he will bring you to a victorious finish! That is his promise! "For everyone

who has been born of God overcomes the world. And this is the victory that has overcome the world — our faith." — I John 5:4

#### What's on the Emmaus Cross?



On one side of the Walk to Emmaus cross is the phrase, "Christ is counting on you." This phrase reminds us that Christ needs our hands and feet to share all the love God has in store for the world. On

the other side is the ancient Christian symbol called the monogram of Christ. The letters X(chi) and P(rho) are the first two letters of the Greek word for Christ (XPIETOE). Using the first two letters was shorthand for referring to Jesus Christ.

The symbol first came into use during the reign of Constantine I(360-337 AD), the first Roman Emperor converted to Christianity in 312 AD. While preparing for a battle, Constantine saw Christ in a dream and was told to paint this symbol on his army's shields. He ordered his troops to do so, and they won the battle. In 318 AD he declared Christianity to be the state religion of Rome. Since that time, this has become a commonly recognized symbol for Christians around the world.



I'm heartbroken over some of the things I've seen and heard over the last few months. Some of you know my story but for those of you who may not let's just say thanks to God I am where I am today, saved, restored, and delivered. In spite of all of the things my family didn't have I learned some invaluable lessons in a state of poverty. One of those lessons was in regard to respect for others no matter who they are.

It was on a quiet summer day as I sat watching the cars go by. I was a small child and I remember remarking about a passerby who didn't look like me. I didn't know that my father heard what I said but he did. My father wasn't a learned man but he had values. After my derogatory remark my father quickly and angrily admonished me. He asked me in his biggest and angriest voice; "What did you say?" Hesitantly I repeated my remark frightened that I would receive a beating because of it. Instead he said, "You know nothing about that man and don't you ever let me hear you call anyone else out of their name." As poor as he was, as poor as we were, as much as he didn't have, as often as our family may have appeared oppressed, he had a respect for people even when those people didn't respect him. And it helped shaped me into the person that I am.

Seeing African American men being shot down, held down, beat down, and accused of things they haven't done simply breaks my heart. This is the first time I have chosen in any format to speak about racism but my Emmaus Community seemed to be a fitting and right place.

I have served in the Dayton Emmaus Community for over 20 years and I have never been disrespected or made to feel less than anyone else and I wonder why our world can't be this way. It simply breaks my heart and tears me apart inside. The love that has been poured out for so many people through the walks and small groups is a glowing example of what people of faith are supposed to emulate. So, what I'm asking as a community of believers is that, whatever your circle of influence, I pray that love would abound and that we would be vigilant in sharing the love of Christ to everyone we encounter no matter who they are and to teach others God's love and justice. God came for everybody and that means anybody and He shares His love to us for one and all. We can make a difference. "Love, love, love, love, the gospel in one word is love. Love your neighbor as your brother (and your sister), love, love, love."

How are you faring during this Corona Storm? In my bible study, I couldn't help but draw parallels between Paul's experience and my own. Take heart! God knows this storm and he is with you in your boat.

The Book of Acts chapter 27 shares the account of Apostle Paul being transported on a prison ship to his final destination of Rome, experiencing a shipwreck at the island of Melita.

This journey started with the ship, Adramyttium, slow-sailing up to "The Fair Havens" in Crete (verses 2-8).

When sailing was becoming dangerous, Paul admonished Julius the centurion that the voyage would end in disaster for all of them (including the loss of their lives). Julius, however, believed the shipmaster (who stated that they would make it) and resumed sailing (verses 9-13).

The ship was caught and remained in a tempest for many days so that neither the sun nor stars were seen. Although they did what they could to survive, including tossing overboard much cargo, eventually all hope of their salvation was gone (verses 10-20).

But an angel of God spoke to Paul, who in turn encouraged everyone on the ship to be optimistic, declaring that no one would lose their lives (yet the ship itself would be lost). Paul even rebuked them, stating that they should not have left Crete to bring all this harm and loss upon themselves (verses 21-26).

Some of the crew attempted to sneak off the ship into a lifeboat but were stopped by the centurion under Paul's advice. The lifeboat was cut loose (verses 30-32).

Since no one on the ship had eaten for fourteen days Paul encouraged them to eat again (at daybreak Paul took bread, gave thanks to God, broke it, and ate) (verses 33-38).

276 people total were on the ship (verse 37).

The ship was eventually run aground, the front in the ground immovable and the back broken up in the waves (verse 41).

The soldiers onboard discussed killing the prisoners so they would not escape but were stopped by the centurion (who wanted to save Paul) (verses 42-43).

All came safely to land (verse 44).

So, with this major storm that they foolishly went into ... all hope of salvation lost ... starved for 14 days ... some attempting to sneak away ... prisoners under a threat of execution ... a ship half-wrecked at the island ... how many of the 276 souls were lost in the sea?

NOT A SINGLE ONE.

Just a thought.
