And lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them... And the angel said unto them, "Fear not, for behold I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, which is Christ the Lord."

Luke 2:10-11

My mother was an accomplished amateur tennis player. I was blessed to have her as my teacher and coach. One of the most fundamental instructions she gave me on the court was, "When you swing your racquet, always follow through! If you don't follow through you will lose power and accuracy. Follow through!"

Well, it's the beginning of January. Most of us, I'm sure have already fallen short of continuing to celebrate the Twelve Days of Christmas through Epiphany, January 6. Trees, decorations, and lights have been already taken down and packed away for next year. Once again, we've failed to follow through! Now, I'm not pointing fingers—I'm just as guilty!

Of course, this time of year is the time we make New Year's resolutions. I came across an Angus & Phil cartoon recently. It showed two dogs staring off into space. One dog asks the other, "What exactly is a New Year's resolution?" His companion answers, "It's a 'to-do' list for the first week of January."

Every Christmas we celebrate the "great joy" of God's gift of Savior Jesus. In Him eternal salvation appears on the earth. His appearance is a gift of God's grace. It is unmerited, unearned, and freely given. And yet, does it not demand a response that requires follow through? A biblical scholar scoured the gospels and found thirty-eight specific commands Jesus gave his followers. First among them all is "repent" —seek a new heart and new life in God's merciful love revealed in and through Jesus. Our Walks to Emmaus have taught us that this new heart and new life is realized through a disciplined following through; I.e., practicing personal and communal piety, study, and engaging in Christian action of loving kindness.

So, as we all stumble into this new year, while the "good tidings of great joy" have not completely faded, may I suggest that we reaffirm, recommit, and follow through on a new heart and new life resolution. May our efforts add new power and accuracy to Jesus' saving work in our sin-sick, sorrow-worn world in 2021.

Don't forget! Follow through!

"And don't say anything you don't mean. This counsel is embedded deep in our traditions. You only make things worse when you lay down a smoke screen of pious talk, saying, 'I'll pray for you,' and never doing it, or saying, 'God be with you,' and not meaning it. You don't make your words true by embellishing them with religious lace. In making your speech sound more religious, it becomes less true. Just say 'yes' and 'no.' When you manipulate words to get your own way, you go wrong. (Matthew 5: 33-37 The Message)

An old friend of mine had a hard time saying no. Instead, she would say yes and then cancel out at the last minute using half-truths, "insincere-truths" and little white lies as her excuses.

After a time, people learned to ignore her empty yeses, understanding there would be no follow through. My friend wondered why she stopped receiving invitations.

We are to bring glory to God by reflecting Him with our honesty. We are to be people who can be trusted and therefore do not need to swear because our "yes" means "yes" and our "no" means "no."

I think my friend is not alone in her struggle to follow through. When I was in my twenties and thirties, I had built a reputation on being a "flake." My definition of being a flake might be different from yours, so please bear with me as I explain. My mother would say, don't try anything new, Brenda, because you will just complain and quit. She knew me by reputation.

I liked the idea of trying new things. I took piano lessons for a time and when it got hard, I quit. I joined a Jazzercize class, but when I found something new, I quit. I started several new jobs, then quit. Do you see the pattern?

When my mom called me out, it was a wake-up call. In utter frustration, I asked her, "How long do you have to do something before you can quit, so people don't think you're a flake?"

Her answer was simple. "Don't start something you don't intend to finish, and if you don't want to do something, simply say, "NO." In other words, let your yes mean yes and your no mean no."

My mother was a wise woman, and I took her advice to heart. I started playing tennis which I enjoyed for a time, but eventually wanted to quit. I wondered, "How long should I continue to play tennis since I had partners and teams who counted on me?" I decided on ten years! I know it seems like a long time, but I was done being a "flake!"

I started Bible Study Fellowship in 1996 and when I finished all eight studies after eight years, I quit. I had learned my yes meant YES! I felt like I had finally shaken the "flake" thing that had followed me around for years.

In 2017, I volunteered to fill the last year of a three-year Emmaus Board seat someone had vacated. Then in 2018, I decided to run for a new three-year term. I'm not going to say I have enjoyed every minute of my time serving as the Communications Chair, but I will say it has been an honor to serve God by keeping my commitment. As I start 2021, I will begin my final year serving as GDE Communications Chair, and I feel so blessed that God has allowed me to honor my commitment and let my yes be yes.

For 2021 my resolution is this: Be a truth-teller. Let your "yes" mean "yes" and your "no" mean "no." Don't tell half-truths, or "insincere-truths" or little white lies. When you make a promise to someone, live up to that promise. When you give your word, live your word. And then, after 30 or 40 years, perhaps you, too, can shake the "flake" reputation like I did. Even better, you will have built a reputation on being a truth-teller!
