Our scars tell the stories of our lives, reminding us of a time when we were injured or harmed and not all of these scars are seen. Whether seen or unseen they represent pain and are also symbolic of our humanness.

I'm reminded of the Apostle Paul and the pain he suffered. In 2 Corinthians chapter 12, Paul first begins to talk about the futility of his boasting. He shares that boasting in himself will accomplish nothing in fact instead of boasting about his accomplishments he chose to boast about his weaknesses. Notice I said "weaknesses" because he recognized that he had many. He said to boast about himself would not necessarily make him a fool because the things he would boast about were true.

To prevent Paul from becoming conceited, he was given a thorn, a scar (a thorn) if you will, in the flesh and that thorn, that scar would be a reminder that the very thing that was meant to torment or destroy him allowed the power of Christ to rest on him.

Oh if we could only look at our scars and see the power of Jesus rise up in us helping us to recognize that we are stronger than what happened to us, stronger than what someone did to us, stronger than the world that seeks to suppress us, stronger than

any weapon Satan seeks to attack us.

Here in the Emmaus community many of you have shared your scars and it is because of your bravery and most of all your ability to see the power of God in the circumstance that you have become bolder in your witness about Christ; men and women who realize the strength of their testimonies. It encourages others to do the same.

So what message do your scars tell? Do they tell the story of a sinner who sought a Savior? Do they tell the story of how you persevered in darkness? Do they tell how you rose up in the midst of adversity? Do they tell the story of how God delivered you from the direst of circumstance? I hope they tell the story of perseverance, of confident trust in an Almighty God, of an irrepressible faith in the God who keeps His promises, and most of all I pray that your scars tell that you are alive and that what happened to you didn't define you but gave you a bolder witness and testimony of your confident faith in God.

Scars may tell us of our past but they don't tell us about our future!

I know what it is to be beaten, so I hold people in Love.

I know what it is to be talked about, so I don't gossip.

I know what it is to be cast out, so I include everyone.

I know what it is to be hated, so I LOVE.

God is SO GOOD. Whenever you feel separated at times from His Love, just look around for the one who knows pain and is there to help. You'll find the Holy Spirit ready and waiting to put your pieces back together and return you to your natural state — LOVED.
