President's Message

If you are a part of the 30 and older crowd, did you think the younger Americans (18 - 29) didn't read or go to the library because you were convinced that technology somehow undermined and devalued books and that there was more knowledge to find on the internet? In the article by Paul St. John Mackintosh, *Shock, horror: Technology Doesn't Destroy Reading Habits, Younger Generation Not Cabbages* (2014), it is very revealing that the "younger Americans" actually read more and use the library more than older Americans. According to this article, even though 62% of the younger Americans embrace technology (smartphones, tablets, e-readers) they feel there is "a lot of useful, important information that is not available on the internet" compared to 53% of older Americans who believe the internet has more.

How about library use between the two generations? According to a September 2013 survey from this article, the 16-29 age group reported that 50% used a library or bookmobile in the past year whereas 47% of the 30 or older had done so. As for using a library website, 36% of the younger Americans compared to 28% of those older had gone on the library website.

As far as reading a book in the past year (2013 survey), 88% of the young adults under 30 read a book, compared to 79% of older Americans. The survey also revealed there wasn't a lot of discrepancy between e-book versus print book reading.

So, what does this all mean? According to the Pew Research Internet Project "younger Americans are more likely to read books than their immediate seniors, and are at least as involved with their local libraries as their elders."

As the Summer Reading Program begins at the Rocklin Library, I hope all age levels sign up for the program and make the gap between 16-29 year olds and 30 and older closer. To the seniors (30 and older) let's show the younger crowd we love to read as much as they do!

Library Hero Kathy Lund

In Memory and Appreciation of a Devoted Community Leader and Library Advocate

Most people remember Kathy Lund as a 25 year member of the Rocklin City Council and five-time Rocklin Mayor. Along with her work on other county and state boards and a Cub Scout Den Mother and team mother for her sons' sports teams, she was an advocate for libraries.

Kathy was an avid reader. Her favorite author was James Patterson. She sought out national best seller books and enjoyed all forms of books about history.

While Kathy was on the city council, she was president of the Rocklin Friends of the Library. She started the recorded books collection before the county purchased any and she attended the White House Conference on Libraries. Also, Kathy attended library sessions at the League of Cities and came back with ideas for the Friends.

As a member of the Daughters of the American Revolution, she was very interested in history. Her early ancestors, the Byram family, came to America on the Mayflower and ended up in Minnesota. When her grandchildren asked her about anything related to history, she would pull out a book and share it with them.

Kathy was a big part of the growth in Rocklin because of her involvement as a city council member. When Kathy was mayor, she started saving money to go into the redevelopment fund account to provide for a larger library. A 30-acre park named Kathy Lund Park was dedicated to all she has done for our community. Also, the Sierra College interchange was named the Kathy E. Lund Interchange by the Placer County Transportation Planning Agency in recognition of her work of improving transportation in Placer County. She will always be remembered as a part of history herself.

Rocklin Friends of the Library want to especially recognize Kathy for her contributions in identifying an early need for the Rocklin Library and representing our interest in national and state conferences, which has helped build such a great library for our community.

Donations in her memory will be used to purchase history books for the Rocklin Library.


