Dear Beloved at Falkner Swamp:

Today as I write this newsletter it is the first day of Fall, and our days reveal the change of weather. The smoke from the West Coast fires has been swept away, and our skies now open to a striking blue. Crisp breezes send leaves fluttering to the ground. I'm stepping on the black walnuts that drop without regard to footpaths or parked cars. My allergies are kicking back in!

It's the Autumn equinox, one of two moments in the year when the sun is exactly above the equator. (The second moment is the Vernal or Spring equinox.) It's the time when the nights and the day are of almost equal length. We're heading to the time of the night lengthening, and the days growing shorter as we move toward the winter solstice – the longest night.

Our liturgical calendar somewhat mirrors these changes. By liturgical, I mean the pattern of our church life, the scriptures we read and the sacraments we observe. As we anticipate the longer nights, we gather in to re-meet our church family, returning to school, returning from summer vacations and weekends away.

Our lectionary scriptures in this second half of the Pentecost season follow Jesus in his last days of ministry as he enters Jerusalem. We'll stop short of the dramatic turns of Holy Week as we reach the season of Advent, when we return again to the anticipation of Jesus' birth, the start of our Christian journey. We take special note of Communion on the first Sunday of October, World Communion Day. It's as if the world's harvests are gathered into one common loaf from which churches all over partake of Jesus' body together. The first Sunday of November brings us to All Saints' Day, and we share in Communion highlighting the presence of all those who have shaped us and have gone before us.

Maybe Fall brings some sadness for you, as the light wanes and night darkens. Perhaps you experience a sharper longing for those no longer living, or for memories of a time that is gone. In our "Covid-tide," maybe those sensations and emotions are stronger still.

Honor this passage. Take time to notice these emotions and memories. God will use them to teach you; humble yourself to receive new perception.

There's a season for everything and a time for every matter under the heavens. (Ecclesiastes 3:1). And remember, the Christ light shines no matter the season.



Please follow the guidelines that our COVID 19 Task Force, Consistory, and Music & Worship have worked hard to develop for everyone's safety, and to promote life-giving and meaningful worship. These are below.

## RETURN TO OUTDOOR WORSHIP COVENANT AGREEMENT

When we gather again in-person, we will ask all to covenant together on the following guidelines. Covenant is biblical language rooted in God's love for God's people. When we covenant with each other, it's more than just an agreement to follow rules. It's choosing in love, before God and with each other, to abide by ways of living in community together.

To gather meaningfully and safely for outdoor worship, we covenant together to follow these guidelines:

1. Do I and everyone in my household feel well? If I/we do not, I/we covenant to stay at home.

2. I will wear a mask upon arriving and until I enter my car to go home. This applies to anyone aged 2 and older.

3. I will sanitize my hands before walking up to the worship area, and after touching my face. Please bring sanitizer with you for this purpose.

4. I will keep a physical distance of 6 feet or more from another outside my family.

5. I will graciously accept the guidance of a worship leader or other member to move my chair to be sure I am a safe distance that is comfortable for me and others around me.

6. I understand, though it may sadden me, that we will not have congregational singing during worship at this time. <u>I further understand that Choir may sing</u>, (masked, socially distanced 15-20 feet from congregation), and that their singing will stand in for our collective voice.
